City Council Corner

November 2023

The project to replace outdated water meters with new remoteread meters is 75% complete. In October, Winslow Water employees read 200 meters in just one hour! This will free up a lot of time for our water crews to work on leaks and other projects.

The new billing software for water system accounts is up and running. This will help with accuracy and finding leaks. It will also allow customers to keep track of water usage in real time.

Repairs to hail damage on the roofs at the ball park pavilion, concession stand, and stage and the roof at the Winslow Community Center gym will all be finished within the next 2 to 3 weeks.

Construction of the 6 foot wide, 1/3 mile long asphalt trail around the ball field at Larry "Tiny" Jarnagan Park (a.k.a. Slicker Park) will be done soon. The loop, paid for in part by a \$100,000 Arkansas Department of Parks, Heritage, and Tourism grant, will provide exercise opportunities for our community and accessibility to amenities for people with disabilities. Sales tax funds will cover remaining project costs.

The metal marker designating the Downtown Winslow Commercial Historic District is installed. Stop by the Winslow Museum, read about our historic city, and enjoy the new museum exhibits.



The family continued to live in the beautiful mountains and valleys of Arkansas. They lived on a river and every time it rained hard the creeks rose. Norma's dad, Jim, would have to cut down a tree so they could cross the swollen creeks to get to the store and school. Despite the flooding, Norma loved the family home until one year the river finally washed out their two-story rock house. The post office was located in their rock house but they were forced to move due to the flooding.

Norma attended Hazel Valley School through the eighth grade. She married Noah Gabbard in 1947. After moving to Fayetteville in 1948, she enjoyed raising her two boys and keeping up with her large extended family. Even though the family was growing in number, they still managed to have at least one family reunion every year hosted by different family members each time. Aunts, Uncles and cousins from all over the country would make their way back to Arkansas to enjoy home-cooked meals spread out on long tables in homes, community buildings, or just on the lawn under shade trees!

In 1956, Norma attended LPN school and subsequently was employed by the surgical group of Murry and Wood where she continued to work until

retirement in 1997. At 13 years old Norma chose to accept God's free gift of salvation; she was a member of Calvary Baptist Church in Fayetteville where she loved the Lord and served Him faithfully. She has now entered into Heaven to be with him for eternity!

In 1971 infamous cult leader Charles Manson was found guilty as the mastermind behind multiple murders in Los Angeles. 
