## Winslow Community Center Association – November News

October was a very busy month for the WCCA!

Our 1st Annual Fallfest Fund Raiser was a resounding success with many, many community members coming out and generously showing their support for our Community Center.

The success of this fund raising event was entirely due to the many hours of volunteer work from so many in our community that there would not be enough space in Within Winslow to thank everyone individually for their time, donations, and participation. And an entire rose garden would have to be planted to give roses to all of those who've helped.

A special election member meeting was held on October 15th and Dr. Bill Smith and Rick Reed were elected to the board of directors. Tanya Farris is now acting Secretary as well as continuing public relations duties.

The October 18th meeting focused on planning the fall festival. Also detailed discussions about grants and grant writing, a possible partnership with FEMA for a storm shelter, the feasibility of partnering with Arkansas Better Chance to create pre-K classes at the community center, and the never-ending repairs to the various buildings.

The next few months will be all business as we address our needs for grant writing, building repairs and planning an event for springtime.

## MARTIAL ARTS IN WINSLOW

# Ongoing “Green Projects” In Winslow

**First is the Winslow Master Gardener (of Washington County) project** which oversees and maintains our public gardens, including Peek’s Park (the two stone planters and the plantings along the creek); the oak tree stone planter across from City Hall; the flower barrels in front of City Hall, Museum, and Mercantile; the plantings around the Train Pavilion; the Welcome Rock garden; and Slicker (ball) Park which has the Tiny Jarnagan stone planter (off the bridge) and the rain garden at the Park Pavilion. This summer the City extended a water line to the Welcome Rock garden and the WCDC funded an irrigation system there. At 8 am on Monday mornings (season and weather permitting), Master Gardeners Donna Stout, Jean Cosgrove, and Dianna Price meet to work on the gardens. Volunteers are encouraged to help (and learn). Call Donna Stout at 634-5791 for more information. They resume work in the spring.

**The second is the streamside erosion control project (in its third year) down at the stream (referred by some as “Squirrel Branch”)** running along the north edge of Peek’s Park, which is across the tracks from City Hall. This 230 foot long stretch has involved planting native plants on the park side whose roots are intended to hold the stream bank, and then allowing the banks on either side of the stream to grow up with native plants and grasses, also to prevent erosion. So, in case you’ve wondered why it is unmown, that’s all intentional, in order to help hold that embankment from eroding any further. It is still maintained by volunteers who periodically remove the really large plants. Watershed Conservation Resource Center is scheduled to work on the flow of the stream and shoring up of the banks this winter and/or next spring. All of this project has been paid for through grants from the Beaver Watershed Alliance and the Arkansas Forestry Commission, along with the work of Winslow volunteers.

**The third project was completed on August 24 with a \$14,250 grant from Beaver Watershed Alliance and the Arkansas Forestry Commission.** It involved three parts. The first part was the hiring of an arborist to take down about a dozen dead trees and masses of kudzu and privet (both invasive plants) on the hill above Tunnel Park just off Main Street, as well as two dead sycamores at Slicker Park, one of which was possibly 125 years old and stood between the pavilion and the concession stand. The second part was the commissioning of a professional to do G.I.S. mapping of land features, notable structures, and land usage in Winslow and surrounding area. The final part involved purchasing and planting three trees, all of them native to our region: a Kentucky coffee tree and a fringe tree in Peek’s Park, and a sycamore in Slicker Park to replace the one just taken down.

The Arbor Day planting ceremony of this sycamore was declared by Mayor Randy Jarnagan on August 24 as a last step in Winslow’s attempt to be recognized as a Tree City USA. Ken Stout and Dave Leisure assisted seeing through this project, with plenty of help from Executive Director John Pennington and Program Director Jennifer Ogle from Beaver Watershed Alliance, support from the Winslow City Council and Mayor Jarnagan, and advice from the Winslow Community Development Council.
