# Horses and Halters

Horses are Smart. Well, that's an opinion that's up for grabs. Oh, I've been around horses to some greater or lesser degree for most of my life. When I was a kid, Monty, our bay mare could open any gate I devised. I can't tell you how many times I have awakened in the night to hear the clippity clop of iron shod hooves on the pavement as she headed to parts unknown. We'd get calls from around town describing the location of our wayward mare. We'd find the mare on the city park lawn or foraging in a neighbor's garden. All the while our gorgeous Palomino would be standing inside the corral with the gate wide open wondering what he should do next. I never could understand if he was just so dumb he couldn't figure out how to get through an open gate or if he was so smart he had more sense than to get out in the road.

I put up with these forays into the unknown until Monty disappeared for more than three weeks. After putting up posters and calling everyone who had gotten acquainted with her tactics, I got a call. A lady who owned a small farm deep in the American River canyon had tied Monty up in a patch of grass scattered with the remains of her crop of turnips.

The thirty-five mile drive was the easy part. It was getting to bed at three in the morning and having to get up for school that took its toll on me. And Monty? She just smiled across the fence when I took her a sheaf of hay before I left for school. I'd had enough and wired the gate shut so it took a pair of side cutters to get it open. I often saw Monty working on it, but she never got out again.

In the summer we'd put our horses out to pasture. A couple of afternoons a week we'd throw our saddles in the back seat of my brother's '50 Ford convertible and drive the twelve miles for a fun ride through the hills.

Loading the saddles and tack was the easiest part short of catching Pal. It didn't matter where Pal was when we drove up. He'd hear the glass packs on that hopped up flat-head and come on the run knowing he'd get a bucket of grain.

Monty? She took advantage of every hiding place in the seventy-five acres not caring a whit for that grain. So, we'd saddle up Pal and rope off a boxed in area among the rocks and trees. My brother would work to drive Monty into our make-shift corral until late in the evening. Monty must have known when there was little time left to ride because she'd calmly walk into the closed in area and stand like a real lady with her nose in a bucket of grain while I readied her for the fifteen minutes left to ride before dark.

Again the question arises, are horses smart? Again, the same answer is up for grabs. My horses and donkeys know exactly what time to come in each evening for their allotment of sweet feed and grain. The horses come plodding down the lane with the donkeys bringing up the rear. When they get to the open side gate, the mares will often just keep on walking, but not the donkeys. They turn in to the shed where they know the grain will be. It takes the mares several minutes to realize they have gone too far and end up at the front gate waiting for me to let them in.

It's the donkeys and our mule that are fascinating. Donkey Hotey will find a way to get in the front yard while the mares will stand watching wondering how he did it. Rocky Donk couldn't care less which side of the fence he's on. He's just one of the crowd. He knows how to get on the other side of the fence, but why should he. There's plenty to eat where he stands.

Horses and the rest of the equine community have some instincts that we humans have yet to catch up to or fully understand. Several times I've fallen off my horse and instantly the horse stopped. On one occasion, Monty stopped with her rear foot held above my leg. How did she know and why didn't she get frightened and run. My older brother and I thought we'd be cowboys and learn to rope. We drove a stake in the ground and would gallop by and toss a loop at it. In his slow gallop by, my brother got the loop over the stake and whipped a loop around the saddle horn. Off came the saddle and under her belly my brother went. Monty left skid marks when she put on the brakes. As cantankerous as she was, bucking and carrying on when we first saddled her up, she was careful to keep us out of danger. Smart? There are some instincts built into these animals that mystify me.

I have often seen Blu, our yearling mule, in a pestering mood tugging on a donkey's halter or for no apparent reason biting one of the mares on the butt. I went out the other day and Blu's dam had her halter pulled over her nose and hanging down around her neck. How do I know she didn't just get it hung up on a branch? Because Hotey's halter was also pulled over his nose and hanging down around his neck.

Smart? In my book, that's still up for grabs.

# “The Cavern”

There was a time period in which Arkansas, as also Missouri and Texas – (Parts within, were not separated. The Louisiana Territory and the Spanish Possessions were separated by only natural boundaries. Oklahoma was also a part of the Louisiana Territory. Spain had different arrangements and possession, and traveled from Santa Fe down to the Rio Grande, on to Natchitoches, Louisiana, crossing the Sabine River. Patrols had heard there caves in and out of the Louisiana Territory in which they could hide arms and ammunition, gold, silver, and other commodities.

The Cherokee were coming into existence as a civilized tribe, although war parties did so exist within the nation. During this time period the late 1700's and early 1800's, the profits of furs were considerable, even by the likes of John Jacob Astor. He would consider horse travel to the “Missouri”, from the Spanish, to the Columbia River and eventually on to Hawaii and China. The Columbia River pointed directly to great fur trade profits as Astor presumed.

It was learned, although the hills of Arkansas were not in the plan and Arkansas was not established as a state, it was only a part of the Louisiana territory; that a certain cave had been discovered by the Spanish through trade with the Cherokee and the Osage. It was of special interest to the Spanish as the French were bearing down upon them as well as the United States.

The Indians were enticed by the methods of bargaining power the Spanish allowed. They knew it could go sour at any given moment and the Spanish were known to simply take whatever they wished. The French were not far away, as well as the United States. The United States was in a tense quarrel already with the Spanish concerning borders of legality. Spain would argue that the border of their territory extended from the Red River to the Santa Fe, then along the southern border of Oklahoma.

Between the Arkansas River and the Kansas River lay the Osage. The Cherokee were positioned initially in Tennessee, parts of Georgia and Kentucky, the Comanche in Louisiana Territory. The Spanish had already claimed West Florida which is today part of Mississippi. The “Cavern” was the perfect hiding place that no would suspect because it was off the beaten trail, yet actually not too far in distance from all political activities. A treaty was supposedly in the wings, awaiting approval between the United States and Spain, in neutral area, between Natchitoches, Louisiana and the Sabine River. Martial Law was declared in New Orleans.

As we know today everything is now established and in order – as far as we know! Much of everything prior written was actually decided by private effort of “concerned citizens”, such as Aaron Burr, Zebulon Pike, and John Jacob Astor; if you get my drift!

The French, the Spanish, and United States during this interval had one concept of thinking. The borders of which each presumed were theirs! The order of concern did not necessarily include the American Indian, although some members of Congress did fight for the Indians concerning certain territories. Indian concerns were always “put on the back burner”. The sad thing is that the United States which entailed the Eastern seaboard, was interested in but one desire – to dissolve all and any titles of land presented

by the American Indian. England, France and Spain followed also in their concept of any thought process, although all presented bargaining qualities.

The French were possibly the instigators of considerable manipulation by presenting treaties that would prove later to be worthless. The French provoked the American Indian into war, the “French and Indian War” and other minor skirmishes. Then the French would turn their efforts towards other whites that wished to expand to other land arrangements; all had pretty much to do with the fur trade. Just as today the economics, the profits of any commodity determines how far we will go to beat our neighbor out of a dollar. George Washington, himself, used “land warrants” to enter forbidden Indian territories

The warrants, themselves had nothing to do with actual titles of land owned by the Indian – imagine that! It, the warrant, did register, a claim in the land office, but was not established with any Indian concerning his territory. In other words; it was considered free land to certain people that could take it!
