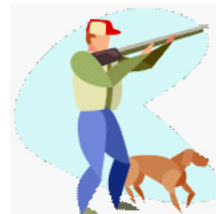
between the hours of 9:00AM and 3:00 PM and pick one up.

Hunting Season is fast approaching. Anyone born after December 31, 1968 must have a Hunter Education Card to hunt in Arkansas. The classes are FREE and offered in this area. A class will be held September 9, 10, & 11 at the Boston Mountain Fire Station # 2 across from the Winslow Ball Park on Hwy 71. This is a Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday night class from 6 PM to 10 PM each night. You must attend all three nights and stay in class until it is over each night to receive credit.

This class is set up for 12 years and older. Anyone under 13 must be with an adult.

"All The Land To Hold Us "by Rick Bass is one of the many new books we have at the library.

Rick Bass is the author of many acclaimed works of fiction and nonfiction. He has received O. Henry Awards, Numerous Pushcart Prizes, awards from the Texas Institute of Letters, fellowships from the National Endowment of the Arts and the Guggenheim Foundation, and other honors. Recently, his memoir, "Why I came West," was a finalist for National Book Critics Circle Award, and his novel "Nashville Chrome" was a finalist for the Los Angeles Times Book Prize.

"All The Land to Hold Us" is a sweeping tale of those who live in West Texas on the desert's edge, where riches- precious artifacts, oil, water, love - can all be found and lost again in an instant.

Roaming across the salt flats and skirting the salt lake, Richard, a geologist working for an oil company, hunts for fossils under the spell of Clarissa, the local beauty who plans to use her share of their plunder to get out of small, dusty Midland for good. A generation earlier, a Depression - era couple, Max and Marie Omo, numbly mines for salt along the banks of the briny lake until the emotional terrain of their marriage is suddenly and irrevocably altered. The strange, surreal arrival of a runaway circus elephant, careening across the sand, sets in motion Marie's final break from Max and heralds the beginning fo her second chance. Consequences reverberate throught the years and dunes when Marie becomes indelibly linked to Richard's own second act.

With a cast of characters rounded out by a one - legged treasure hunter, a renegade teacher, and an unforgettable elephant trainer, "All the Lands to Hold Us" is a vivid portrait of a fierce place and the inimitable characters that possess the capacity to adapt to and also despoil it. The novel boasts all the hallmarks of Bass's most enduring work- human longing and greed, nature endangered, and the possibility for redemption are all writ large on his desert canvas.

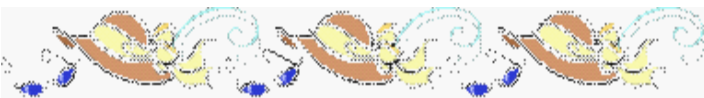


## Winslow HIPPY News

## Velda's Words

This summer has been a busy one for me. I signed two contracts for books already written. One is a mystery that takes place in a fictional Ozark County in Arkansas. Readers will recognize much of the surroundings I add to the fictional town, as well as some of the happenings. They were all taken from my experiences during the time I spent writing for the Washington County Observer. The two characters are of course fictional, so no one has to worry that I'm writing about them. One is a reporter for a small county weekly newspaper, the other is a burnt out NARC from Dallas who takes a job with the county sheriff's new Crime Investigating Team. He is Cherokee and has a talent for communing with those who have died violently. The title is *The Purloined Skull*, a play on Poe's title *The Purloined Letter*. Hopefully, this will begin a series. It's a gritty, sensual story line, so don't expect a sweet cozy mystery.

The other book, which will be released next year, is a mainstream love story that takes place in 1985, about two people searching for meaning to their lives. The heroine is in her forties who has been involved with her husband's cult-like church and escapes to spend a summer camping alone and finding herself amid the wreckage of her life. The hero is a Vietnam Vet wandering the country with two buddies on motorcycles. When these two clash the universe tilts, so to speak. Their adventures and the ultimate climax will have readers in tears. I hope.

I'm currently working on the second of the series *The Victorians*, the first of which, *Wilda's Outlaw* came out earlier this year. It's about Lord Blair Prescott and Rowena Duncan, the emigrants to Victoria, Kansas, who brought their way of life with them rather than embracing the Western life. Prescott suffers from soldier's heart or nostalgia, what we call today PTSD, and Rowena loves him with a passion that surpasses all his problems. They struggle to build a life in America and deal with his problems stemming from fighting in the elite unit, Les Zuoaves under Napoleon III in the Franco-Prussian War,

All my books are available as both print and Ebooks on Amazon, including my early books published with Penguin in the early 1990s, which are only available as Ebooks. You can also find *The Boston Mountains: Lost In The Ozarks* online as print and Ebook as well. Two are available as audio books as well. I think you'll enjoy *Montana Promises*, recently issued in audio, and still available as an Ebook.

## Half Marathon & 5k Run, 9/14/2013

Dear Winslow Resident,

The third annual Winslow Run Half Marathon and 5k will be held Saturday, September 14<sup>th</sup>, 2013 from 8 a.m. until noon.

Proceeds from this race support local organizations that benefit Winslow and the surrounding area. Please help us make it a success.

Half Marathon runners will come out of the main gate of the former Winslow schools on US 71 at 8:00 a.m. and will immediately turn left onto School Street. The 5k will start 10 minutes later and will follow the same course. We expect up to 300 runners.

From Main Street, the runners will turn right onto Van Buren. Within 45 minutes, Van Buren to Center Street should be clear of most runners.

Runners will continue along Van Buren to Bunyard Road. There will be runners on this part of Van Buren and Bunyard Road from just after 8 a.m. until close to noon. There will be runners on Center Street from about 8:30 a.m. until noon.

By participating, the runners are contributing financially to our community. To thank them and to keep our community and the runners safe, the Winslow Community Development Council is asking residents to:

- Please avoid driving on the course if at all possible on Saturday the 14<sup>th</sup>. If you can, leave home before 8 a.m. or wait until after noon.

# Flying Beneath the Torrent

To watch the American Dipper (*Cinclus mexicanus*), also known as a Water Ouzel is a treat that few have had the privilege to observe.



Sitting on a rock beside the headwaters of the Kern River squeezed from a glacier high in the mountains of the Sierras, I watched a tiny gray bird with a crest tinged with a very light halo of reddish brown. He was sitting on a rock just inches from my feet with the icy water of the gushing stream swirling around all sides as it rushed to the sea. His head would cock from side to side as he scanned the turmoil surrounding him, then without warning or a splash he would disappear. I would lean over the edge of my perch and gaze into the depths of the crystal clear water and watch as this tiny stout winged bird would “fly” below the surface, his head bobbing back and forth in the swift current. I watched the little guy sitting demurely on that rock. His head would snap to the side and cock over as he peered for a second into the depths of the stream. Then with no apparent cadence, his head would snap to the other side as he searched for the next grasshopper or worm being pushed his way by the torrent that would provide a meal to satiate his appetite.

With no warning, he flitted off the rock and flew pell-mell as if shot from a bow at the base of a massive tail of water falling from a rock bluff sixty feet above into a roiling pool. A second before plunging head long into the liquid wall, he darted straight up into the spray and disappeared above the crest.

I searched in the blazing light above the watery ridge for any sign of his destination. He had disappeared. I sat for several minutes pondering this amazing creature whose life was lived in harmony with the freezing rapids of a high mountain stream. I marveled at the skill with which he had been endowed and his ability to see a fast moving meal that to me was invisible.

The thunder of the nearby cascading water and the slipstream of the current pushing relentlessly against the rock, had ensnared me in a trance as I watched a lone leaf being pummeled in the foam blanketing the rills pushing from rock to rock. It was a subtle shift from my hypnotic state that I became aware that my little friend was there sitting calmly on the rock at my feet. His head was flitting from one side to the other to capture in his sight a potential meal. Then he was gone, flying beneath the surface of the water ready to grab that next delicate bite that he had spied

rushing at him from upstream.

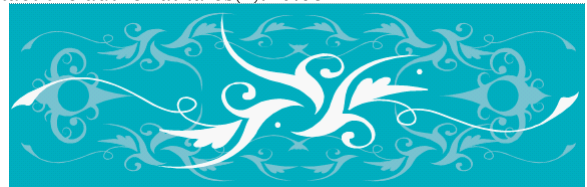

Watching a myriad stars move slowly between the tops of the giant pines, I fell asleep knowing that in this world there are mysteries that reach far beyond the confined world of human beings who just think we are the “higher beings” in the natural world.

## DOES DRINKING COFFEE SHORTEN YOUR LIFE?

### Heavy Coffee Drinking Tied to Shorter Lives for Younger Adults in Study

Skeptical experts cautioned that the study of over 40,000 adults has major limitations and the findings don't show that coffee actually causes an early death. But study co-author Dr. Carl Lavie, professor of medicine at the John Ochsner Heart and Vascular Institute in New Orleans, believes there's reason to be worried if you down a lot of joe.

"Small amounts of coffee, up to 28 cups a week, seem to be safe," he said. "But there's a reason to try to keep your intake at below four 8-ounce cups per day, particularly for younger people."

At issue is the hotly debated topic of whether coffee is good for you, and if it is, how much is too much? In recent years, scientists have pored over existing research and found signs that coffee drinking -- even heavier consumption -- actually reduces the risk of cancer, heart failure and other conditions.

It's hard to know for sure, however. It would be difficult to launch the most rigorous type of research in which scientists would assign some people to drink large amounts of coffee and have others avoid it. It's also possible that coffee drinkers may share something other than a taste for brewed beans that affects their health. Hyperactive personalities? Trouble staying awake? Money to spend on hot drinks?

For a Starbucks-studded nation, this is not encouraging news. In the United States, more than 60 percent of adults report drinking coffee daily, consuming just over three cups a day on average, according to the National Coffee Association.

For the new study, published Aug. 15 in Mayo Clinic Proceedings, researchers tracked nearly 44,000 people aged 20 to 87 for an average of about 16 years. About three-quarters were men, and they entered the study between 1971 and 2002.

During the follow-up period, 2,512 people died from all causes. After adjusting their statistics for factors such as smoking and fitness, the researchers found that those who drank more than 28 cups of coffee a week were 21 percent more likely to have died. The risk was 50 percent higher in men and women younger than 55.

Lower levels of coffee-drinking didn't seem to affect mortality. "We were honestly hoping to find that low amounts of coffee were beneficial," said Lavie, "and we were hoping no dose was toxic."

Many questions remain unanswered, however, and the study authors said further research is needed. Lavie said it's possible that coffee might contribute to cancer, but researchers can't confirm that unless they dig deeper to see what killed participants in the study. It's also possible that certain genetic factors put heavy coffee drinkers at greater risk, the study suggests.

Rob van Dam, an associate professor at the National University of Singapore, said the study has significant shortcomings. Among other things, he said, it didn't examine dietary habits or look at causes of death in depth. "There have been several previous studies on this topic, and recommendations about coffee consumption should consider the totality of the evidence rather than only the results from a single study," he said.

Rachel Huxley, chair of epidemiology at the University of Queensland in Australia, cautioned that smoking -- much more common among heavy coffee drinkers than others -- may have thrown off the results by contributing to death rates. The study results don't do enough to take this into account, she said.

Huxley added that previous research as a whole suggests that the level of coffee consumption in question actually helps people live longer.

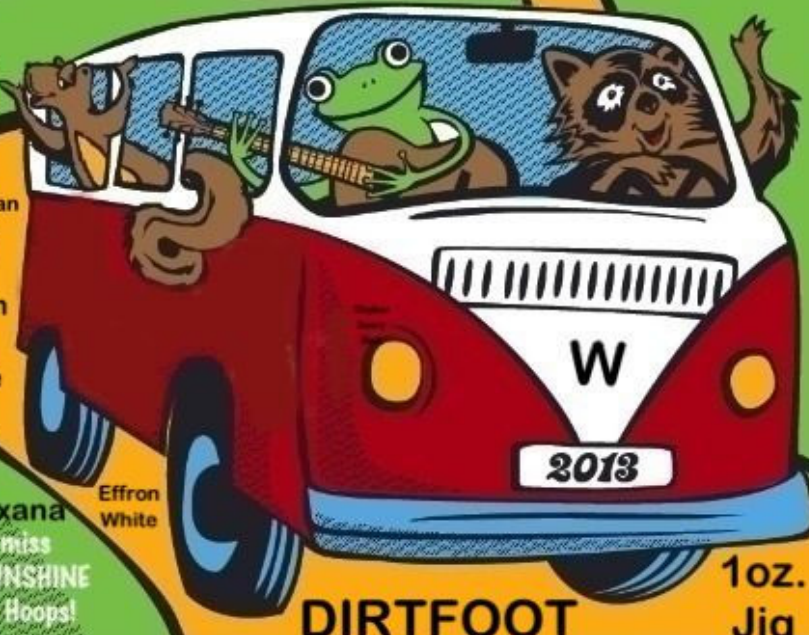
