Rain Garden

Rain Garden Workshop Winslow Library Saturday May 23, 2015 1:00 PM

Have you visited the Rain Garden at the Ball Park at the north end of the cement slab where the tables are located?

The Winslow Library will be presenting a Workshop on how to create your own Rain Garden at home.

A rain garden is a garden which takes advantage of rainfall and stormwater runoff in its design and plant selection. Usually, it is a small garden which is designed to withstand the extremes of moisture and concentrations of nutrients, particularly Nitrogen and Phosphorus, that are found in stormwater runoff. rain gardens are sited ideally close to the source of the runoff and serve to slow the stormwater as it travels downhill, giving the stormwater more time to infiltrate and less opportunity to gain momentum and erosive power.

Stan the Man

To say Stan was a little strange would not be fair.

I grew up as a distant family member who spent many weekends with Stan and his family when I was young. My parents and his had been friends since their days in college and though their paths had gone in different directions they had kept in close touch.

Stan's mother and father were both physicians who practiced in the same office for years Even so, his mother was a dedicated house-wife who always said her job was raising her family. She kidded me often saying that I was her only patient that never got a shot in her office because she and my mom always had to deliver them in the hall.

I was introducing the family to a friend and stammered about, saying this is, uh, er, Doctor and Doctor uh...! She patted me on the arm and said quietly, "You can always introduce us as Doctor and Mrs. Always remember, my husband is the head of this household. I am his dedicated and loving wife who also just happens to be a doctor."

That was the family in which Stan grew up. It was an informal home in which there was never a doubt that he, his siblings and I were always deeply loved.

Stan was not what I would call an avid athlete, but he was willing to compete at anything. When we played checkers, he wouldn't leave the table until I won just as many games as he. Ping Pong was my game. Again, he didn't lay down his paddle until I let him win as many games as I. Well, I said I let him. The truth is, the times I got ahead, I had to work for it.

That was Stan. Kind to a fault and always wanting to be fair.

Over the years I lost track of Stan. I heard from time to time about him or his family, but had not seen them for many years. Then one day I received a post card. It had a photo of a large California Hospital close to where I went to college. On the back was a single note in his horrendous handwriting.

"This is where I work."

That was it.

Several years later, I was in the cafeteria line at his hospital and saw him bring out a huge pan of steaming vegetables. As I got near, he turned away and faced the wall then said quietly, "Hello Arlen."

I greeted him and tried to carry on a conversation. Without turning to face me, he answered a couple of my questions with one or two words then turned and walked away.

I couldn't get Stan out of my mind and began asking about him with some friends.

Stan had married and divorced three times. A short time later, he remarried the same woman he had just divorced.

He had worked at the hospital for almost forty years where he rarely missed a day of work as an orderly carrying food trays to patients and cleaning up their rooms. He rarely spoke to his fellow workers often looking away as he passed them in the hall.

A woman who worked with him said you might say Stan was a little odd. He had no friends with whom he associated. "But," she said, "I must tell you about the real Stan."

He loved Christmas. Every year he spent time making out cards that he took to the Post Office for patients he had cared for during their stay in the hospital. It was not just a box. It was several large boxes of cards and letters. A few days before Christmas, a mail truck would arrive at his home and the driver would tap on the door. Stan would go out to retrieve his mail. It didn't come wrapped with a rubber band. It came in four or five huge mail bags with thousands of letters and cards. My friend said Stan spent the holidays reading every one.

When Stan passed away several years ago, the mail trucks began to arrive and bags were unloaded by two men whose eyes filled with tears when they lined them up along the wall of his tiny home. The table was heaped with casseroles and salads and desserts were piled up on the counter tops. At the cemetery several police officers were on duty to direct traffic that lined the roads that wound among the lawns and trees.

Yes, Stan was a strange man that many thought had no friends. But when the end came, in the archives of this earth a niche was reserved where his simple life merged perfectly.

Stan was a man whose life we should emulate so each of our lives can be defined as "strange" as was his.

Many land grants were issued by a colonial secretary in London. Warrants were not worth the paper written upon, but politicians of the era were not willing to voice opinions concerning them. The American Indian lost out throughout the land, pushing for any justice on their behalf. If the Indians did not cede any land that someone wanted or claimed the party in question began skirmishes to provoke the tribe or tribes into war.

The Proclamation of 1763 only stated that common individual citizens could not legally buy land from the Indian tribes. Although it's still not the right time to reveal its exact location, we all hope that whoever does find it (the cavern) will feel the same way we have – if they should find it on their own. Spending a lifetime on a Hawaiian vacation would not even come close to the peace of mind that exists in that hole in the hills!



fellow who was "stoned". He said he thought I was moving when I was at a stop light, it can cause you to misjudge speed and distance.


