

2018 has brought old man winter with a vengeance! Now I know that many of my neighbors look forward to the frigid winter months and I wish that I could enjoy them with you. But honestly, the heavy coats, scarves and hats, the endless hauling of firewood, the freezing bowls of water for the pets and livestock and the having to let a car run for 30 minutes before you can get into it, all make the tropics call my name.

But here we are facing January. And the WCCA must keep going. December brought us unwelcome news, one of the heating units decided to stop working. Now in the tropics, that wouldn't be a problem, but sadly, Winslow is more than a few miles from the tropics! We hosted several events in the cafeteria in December (before the real cold came) and, though the attendees had fun, they were bundled up and it was uncomfortably cold.

The air conditioning (who cares about A/C when we've got projected highs in the teens?) on top of the building was vandalized and parts stolen and the unit unrepairable. The Board was aware of this appliance issue in late summer, but felt that we could wait to address AIR CONDITIONING closer to the time when we needed to cool the facility. But the heater died, and it died just weeks before winter arrived. After hours and hours and thousands of dollars getting the plumbing repaired, heat is a necessity for the safety of water pipes! Putting off heat can't wait.

So, we do what WCCA seems to do best. We found a company willing to get our heater replaced and take care of the A/C simultaneously. This won't be cheap, but we made a great deal with the folks at Air Control in Springdale and they are replacing both the A/C unit and the heater with warrantied equipment for a fraction of the cost we were expecting. It's still a very costly endeavor and we are asking our neighbors to lend a hand.

If each household will donate \$1.00 per family member (and we won't say no to more and we won't say no to less) — those dollars will add up fast and pay for these very necessary appliances. Challenge your alumni to meet or beat other classes in donations. Make giving money to the WCCA a contest. Make it fun. Just make our bank account balance out so we can keep the bills paid and the facilities open.

Gym activities in January are available, but no heat is available so dress accordingly. February 23rd we'll be hosting a gospel concert fundraiser in the Cafetorium and all proceeds go to the WCCA.

Y'all stay warm and don't forget to donate to our heat/air conditioning fund to any board member.

OH MY! Where has the time gone? On Feb. 1st 2018 I will have had my Winslow address for 25 years....a quarter of a century. Goodness, I remember Sunset Road wasn't even paved then! It sure was a long trip up that hill on dirt!

Romine's store was open and when you didn't want to run all the way 'into town' (meaning West Fork to the now closed Super Foods, or to Fayetteville to Walmart)...you could always stop in there for some needed items or even last minute snacks and cards/ gifts for parties. Mikey's parents ran the gas station here in Winslow back then...boy could his momma cook up some good food! The kids went to school in Winslow back then too. I remember Mr. West on his bike up and down Sunset... I was always watching out for him and praying no one hit him on one of the blind turns...took awhile after he passed before I stopped looking out for him, it was such a habit. And speaking of bikes...I really liked the bicycle display he had up on the side of the road. Sadly, he had to take it down because it was too close to the road. People liked it or they didn't...I liked it because I saw the bikes were not just tossed up on that frame...they were specifically placed so that the reflectors all over the bikes would light up when your headlights hit them at night whether you came from one direction or the other. The little kids in town are now married and have kids of their own. Some of the 'old timers' have since passed. I enjoyed visiting with Barbara Ashbaugh when she ran the museum...every time I went in I learned something new about Winslow and the area. Ironically...I made a bit of Winslow history myself...as I am a true 'homesteader'. I'm the first person to own my land and make it a residence with an address. The last family that lived anywhere near me was the Salas family about 1/2 mile down my driveway...and that was 150 years ago! The school has closed...but the Farmers Market opened up. Highway 540/49 opened up and traffic on 71 died....but the gardeners came out and have planted lovely things all around town for anyone who comes to visit to enjoy. The Christmas parade goes on as usual. Some stores closed up after the 71 traffic ceased...but with a big Squirrel Run in town traffic comes in once again!

So many things to write about but the thing that comes to mind with Winslow is this...it's the little town that will not die! It just keeps reinventing itself! The history information on Winslow in the museum bears this out. Look at the Winslow community center going up in the old school. Keep on keeping on Winslow. I hope I have another 25 years here and can write a little article for the paper then too!



At the very center of of the cosmos, there is a throne. And at the center of the throne is the Lamb, the One slain from the foundation of the world!

What does this say to us? It says that Jesus is God to be worshiped and served. It also says that He has a right to claim a place in the midst of our lives!
