## **City Council Corner**

In late July, Winslow resident Dianna Price suffered a terrible, unprovoked attack by two dogs in Peeks Park. She sustained multiple deep puncture wounds, micro fractures, and lacerations that required stitches. We wish Dianna a fast and full recovery, both physically and emotionally.

Winslow city government is motivated to do everything in its power to foster the safety of residents and visitors. Because we don't have a police force or animal control officer, the Washington County Sheriff's Office provides these services. Even so, for years Mayor Jarnagan has gone above and beyond his official duties to help with the problem of loose dogs, including contacting owners and taking strays into his own home. In return, he has received threats of violence as well as complaints that the city isn't doing enough.

In December 2020, the council passed an ordinance prohibiting the running-at-large of dogs. It requires all dogs in the city limits to be under control of an owner or owner's representative by means of a leash, cord, chain, fence, or other physical restraint. It also authorizes Washington County Animal Control Officers to impound dogs whose owners are not in compliance with the ordinance. The City is charged a fee for each impounded animal. Since the ordinance was adopted, the city has paid the Washington County Animal Shelter \$2,040 for impounded dogs.

Washington County Code of Ordinances spells out the process of having an animal deemed as hazardous, potentially dangerous, or dangerous, and the accompanying requirements for owners under each level of designation. Any dog obstructing a right-of-way, menacing, biting, attacking, or known to have been deemed hazardous, potentially dangerous, or dangerous that is not constrained to the owner's property, may be reported to Washington County Animal Control at (479) 444-5700. If it can be done safely, WC Animal Control says taking photos of any unconstrained animal is helpful.



## WINSLOW LOVED ONES WE HAVE LOST

### NORMA MYRTLE GABBARD

August 12, 1930 - August 23, 2023



Norma Myrtle Gabbard, 93, of Fayetteville, Arkansas went home to be with the Lord on Wednesday, August 23, 2023. She was born in Hazel Valley, Arkansas on August 12, 1930 to James and Myrtle Shackelford Skelton. When Norma was still quite young, her mother became very ill and the responsibility of raising Norma was taken on by her older sister Hazel and her brother Harold. Later in

life, Norma would be like a big sister to her nieces, Donna Parrish and Sharol Skelton.

The family continued to live in the beautiful mountains and valleys of Arkansas. They lived on a river and every time it rained hard the creeks rose. Norma's dad, Jim, would have to cut down a tree so they could cross the swollen creeks to get to the store and school. Despite the flooding, Norma loved the family home until one year the river finally washed out their two-story rock house. The post office was located in their rock house but they were forced to move due to the flooding.

Norma attended Hazel Valley School through the eighth grade. She married Noah Gabbard in 1947. After moving to Fayetteville in 1948, she enjoyed raising her two boys and keeping up with her large extended family. Even though the family was growing in number, they still managed to have at least one family reunion every year hosted by different family members each time. Aunts, Uncles and cousins from all over the country would make their way back to Arkansas to enjoy home-cooked meals spread out on long tables in homes, community buildings, or just on the lawn under shade trees!

In 1956, Norma attended LPN school and subsequently was employed by the surgical group of Murry and Wood where she continued to work until retirement in 1997. At 13 years old Norma chose to accept God's free gift of salvation; she was a member of Calvary Baptist Church in Fayetteville where she loved the Lord and served Him faithfully. She has now entered into Heaven to be with him for eternity!

Norma was preceded in death by her parents, her oldest son, Carl Dean Gabbard; siblings, Doran Skelton (Ruby), Doris Cooper (Claude), Nola Cress, Ruby Shade, Harold Skelton (Rose), Bernice Dean, Hazel Parrish Bozeman, James Skelton (Mary), and Paul Gene Skelton (stillborn).

Quarterly Sales tax for Washington and Crawford County has come into the general fund for the Fire department. This will help pay for the new turn out gear and equipment purchased for 2023.

The yearly engine pump testing for 2023 was done at our department meeting. BMFD has 5 engines that passed for service.

The new Fire Gear Extractor has arrived and we hope to have it installed for service soon.
