Hello Winslow Community!

I have so much great news to share about the progress on the community center and where we currently stand in acquiring the property. Unfortunately, you won't get to find out what all we've accomplished these last few weeks because this article has been hijacked by vandals and thieves.

I'm ticked. The WCCA board members are frustrated and angry. The sheriff's department has been called, and complaints have been filed with the prosecutor's office. The destructive actions of a few are about to derail this project for the many. The reflection on our community is abysmal. And it's going to take the communities commitment to stop its continuation.

\$50,000.00. That's the estimated amount of damage that has occurred just since the WCCA was formed and we began our attempts to reclaim the property.

Vandalism and thievery are not new to the abandoned buildings. Much of the damage has happened over the last few years as the property sat unattended. But sadly, the destructive activities seem to have escalated in the last few months as we try and move forward with our restoration project.

Why? I ask. What kind of person gets kicks and thrills from destroying someone else's property?

Our property. The community's property. The vandals deserve a thistle. I miss "Roses and Thistles".

After speaking with the prosecutor's office this morning I learned a lot about this crime. It's not actually "vandalism" at this level. It's actually a crime called "Felony Criminal Mischief in the 1st Degree". And it's serious.

A Class D Felony falls between one thousand and five thousand dollars in damage. Class C falls between \$5,000 and \$25,000 dollars in damage. And anything over \$25,000.00 in damage – that's a Class B felony and can get you 20 years in jail and fines starting at \$15,000.00. And here's the thing...there's been hundreds of thousands of dollars of damage and thieving going on at the Community Center. Someone is going to get caught and it's not going to be good.

This isn't some teenager tagging with a can of spray paint. Light fixtures have been torn from the ceiling. Repeated attempts to break the glass backboards of the basketball goals have been successful. Windows are being broken; doors are being ripped from their hinges. Arson was recently attempted in the elementary school as well. Arson! Imagine the damage if they had got this fire going! Photo attached.

Someone has defaced the iconic Squirrel in the gym. And what they've done to the precious children's mural in the elementary school is crude and heartbreaking. The photos are not necessarily suitable for everyone because of language.

And parents – take note. If your children are caught on the property participating in this vandalism – charges will be filed. Your children and teenagers will be arrested, prosecuted and held accountable. As summer months linger and boredom sets in – remind your children that behavior has consequences and sometimes those consequences can be costly and devastating to their futures.

This is not the relationship that the WCCA believed we would

have with our community. No one on the board wants to threaten our neighbors with fines and jail time. We naively believed when the community learned that we were trying to take the property and do something positive with it, that we would have the support of our neighbors and the thievery and vandalism would cease and desist. Disappointingly, this is not the case.

As we continue to move forward, these acts are pushing us back. Money's that could have been spent getting the facilities open, safe and ready for use will have to be spent on security, fencing, gates, locks and repairs that weren't needed a week ago.

We are a small community. But I have seen with my own eyes what a close community we can be. I've witnessed the generosity and love and support of so many at our fundraising efforts these last months.

I'm not asking for money today. I'm asking for help. These acts of vandalism and thievery are not happening in a vacuum. Someone has seen something. Someone has heard something. Someone knows something. I understand if you don't want to report a neighbor or a friend for these crimes. And make no mistake – these are crimes and there are victims involved. But if this is your brother, your mother, your great Aunt Bessie on your daddy's side – tell them to stop. Before they are caught. Before they are prosecuted. Before they are jailed and fined. Tell them to stop!

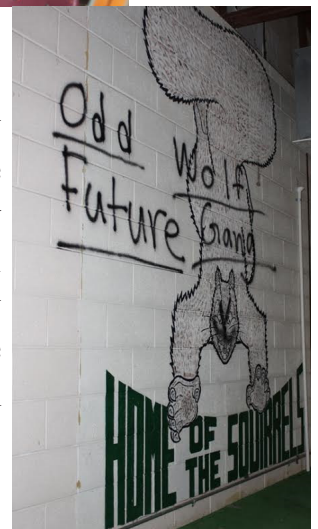
There is progress to report. Let's hope it's nothing but good news in August. Until then.

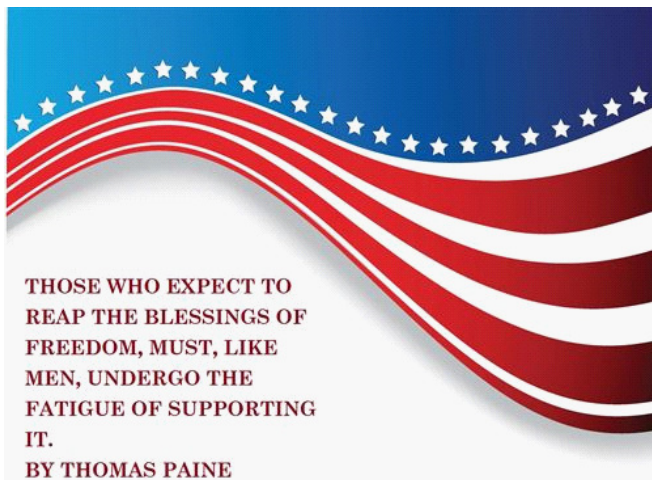

I’m retired. Why should I take on another job. I can’t say I don’t like working. I can’t say I don’t like working on engines. In fact, I rather enjoy cleaning and scrubbing and dismantling especially the big ones I can crawl into and take fifty gallons in the crankcase.

Watching all the pieces go back together and hearing that piece of machinery burst into life makes it all worth the effort. So, I said I’d do the work.

It was kind of like eating ice cream and knowing that a “brain freeze” is imminent. Then...! You take another bite anyway? Well in retrospect that’s how I have felt about a number of projects I have taken on. A friend needed help and knowing this might be an impending brain freeze, I took another bite.

I had lots of time to reconsider, but no time to back out. This one started out as a valve job, you know a top end. Just pull the heads and get them rebuilt. But one piston was hammered with some junk that got in the cylinder and I discovered two others had rings that were frozen. Ok, so now I have to pull three pistons. I wouldn’t consider doing that without putting rings and bearings in all of them.

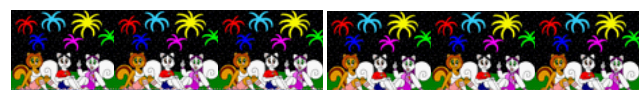
Then I got a call and was told the heads were cracked and I needed new ones. I was assured they’d be here in three days max! Eight days later they were sitting in my shop. Next the water pump was shot but that was sitting on the shelf of my auto parts store. Changing it’s no big deal except the power steering, air condition compressor, idler pulleys and the ignition module have to come off to get the water pump off.

It took about a minute and fifty-one seconds to realize I’d be better off pulling the engine so I can get at it and do the job right. Removing the transmission bell housing bolts and a couple of wires now made complete sense.

Cleaning up and replacing the bearings and rings, was no longer a major ordeal crawling around underneath to pull the pan, etc. But..., that hammered piston was broken. Finding a piston to match didn’t pan out so it meant a completely new set that should arrive in two days. Nope! Ten days later they were located by the shipper and brought to my door. When they arrived I discovered they were not the same as the original. After analyzing and measuring and fitting one rod, I decided they would work OK which put me back on track to start putting things back together. Oh yeah, I might as well check the timing chain that was borderline and get a new transmission seal and serpentine belt.

Now....! I’m back on track to put it back together. I am feeling good. It’s kind of like that brain freeze. After jamming my thumb against the roof of my mouth and breathing out heavily through my mouth for a minute or so, that ice cream is back to tasting pretty good and the brain freeze is forgotten until the next time! Besides, I found a guy that did most of the work!

Hmmm! I wonder if I’ll remember this lesson the next time I’m offered a project that will take me out of retirement? Truth is it felt good to be back in the groove!

So, I've been back several times in and out of Winslow and had a few folks follow me, but folks, I have to tell you something. If you followed me in and out of the forest, took your eyes off of me for any length of time, I could lose you real quick; like I did on my last visit. I don't really mind folks following along, but don't be surprised if every one of us winds up confused, or totally lost! My memory is somewhat a tad off actually quite a bit, although my instinct is still pretty accurate.

The odd thing is, I am actually hoping someone does find the cavern, then it would save me the time and effort of wondering if I'm going up the right path to get to it.

The forest – she does change! Well, pretty much everyone is on his own, but it is very hazardous to this existence. "Slide-offs" and rocky regions from within, ol' bears here and there, etc., etc., etc. . . . The snakes are out and about as usual. Seen a few interesting people of major concern-not sure if they are trying to find the cavern, also.

I can only pray no one gets hurt attempting to find it. I have warned everyone, I do not know how many times, that this adventure is extremely dangerous. Then there's that other thing about not entering any caves because of those stupid bats! If you walk too close to a "drop-off", you could break your neck or worse. Hidden wells do exist and some are pretty deep. Few if anyone

Maybe today, it won't be found for a reason, then again it may be no reason why it shouldn't be found, today. Confusing - isn't it so?

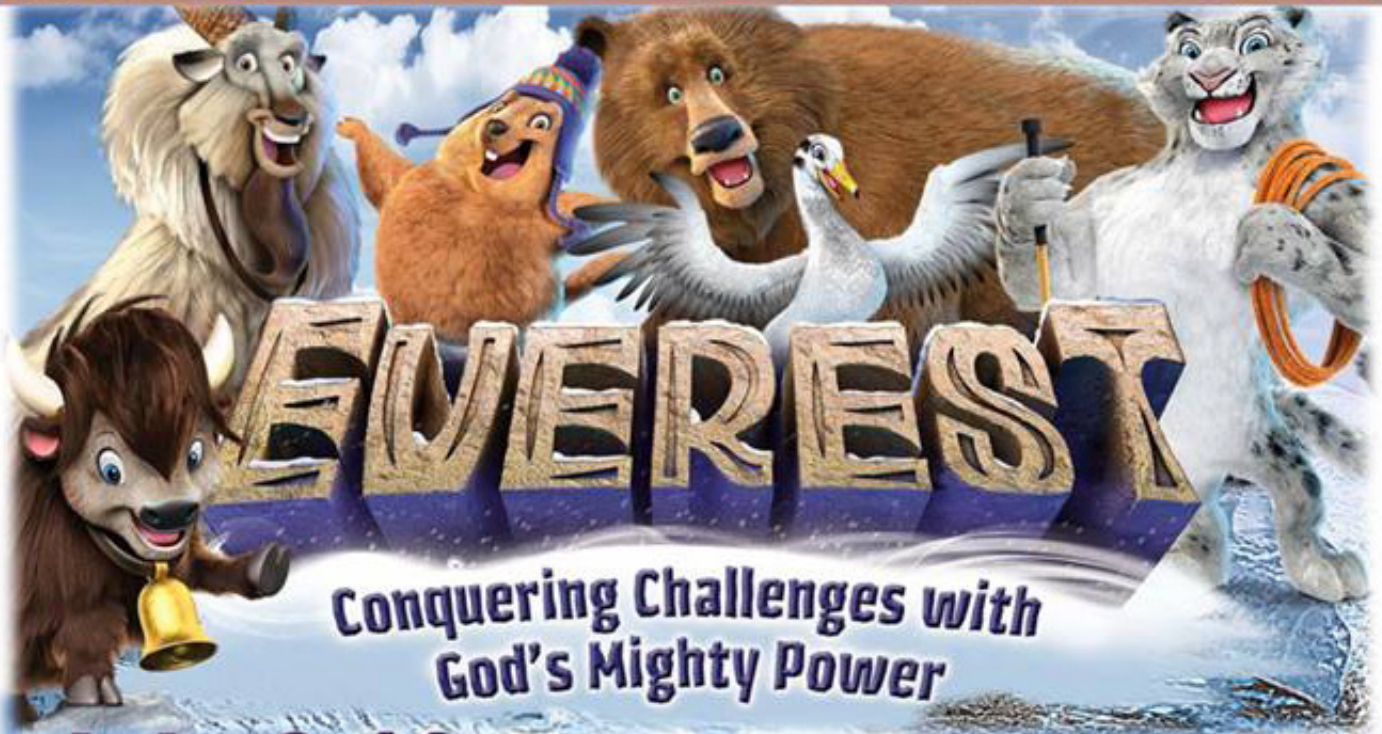

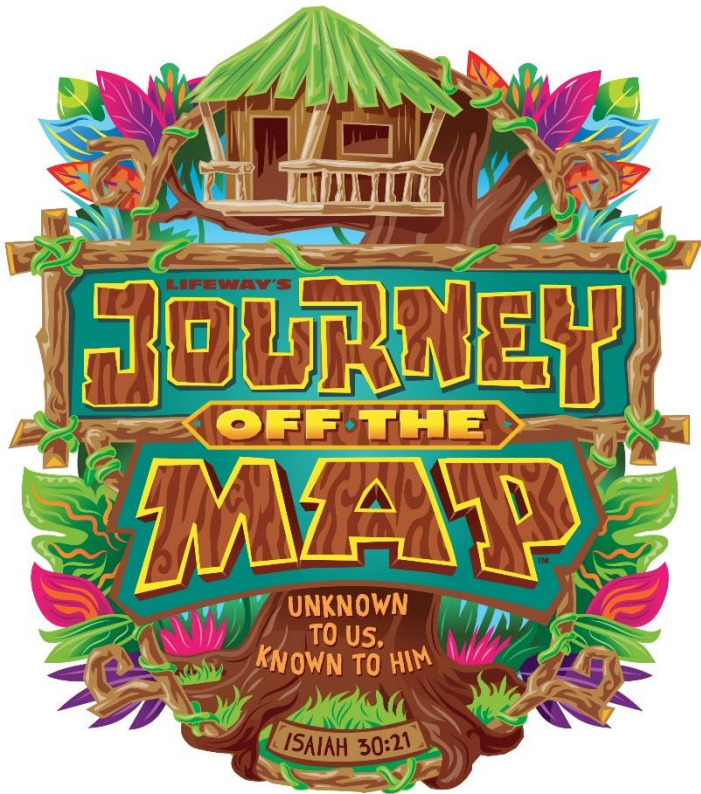
