## The Alliance for Winslow

The Alliance for Winslow was originally organized to have representatives from all our non-profit organizations (such as the Winslow Community Center Association, Community Meals, Winslow Community Development Council, Ozark Folkways, etc.) meet and get to know each other and to learn what the others' groups are all about.

At the first meeting last spring, one of the first topics to come up was how we all—non-profits, church groups, and individuals--could join together to make it easy to clean up the trash, junk, and old, unused cars in Winslow and the immediately-surrounding area. This also was a major concern discussed in last year's mayoral election.

The Alliance met Thursday (March 21) evening at the old Winslow School with eighteen people in attendance. The feeling was that this spring was the time for action!

And instead of just asking folks to "put things out at the curb", we would in addition have volunteers from the community available (with trucks, etc.) to HELP people who NEED some help in cleaning up their yards and getting things to the curb for Trash-Away to pick up. Residents only have to call City Hall to arrange for volunteers to come help them get rid of things.

The City Council meets at City Hall at 7:00 PM on the 2nd Monday of the month and the meetings are open to the public. We have to have a quorum to have a meeting, which means that four of the six City Council members must be present. However, the Mayor can count as one of the four to make the quorum. Occasionally there may be the need to call a Special meeting. If so, there will be public notice and the meeting will only cover the topic of the subject for which the meeting was called.

You may have noticed the City's Ordinances posted at various establishments around town such as the Post Office, Library bulletin board, Mikey's, Winslow Community Meals, or City Hall. After an Ordinance or Budget is passed, it is required to be posted for public view for thirty days to provide the public the opportunity to ask questions about it to the City Council.

That is all for now, except our Spring Clean-up is scheduled to start mid-May. More information will be posted around town. Next time, hopefully, we will write about something more informative, rather than nuts and bolts.

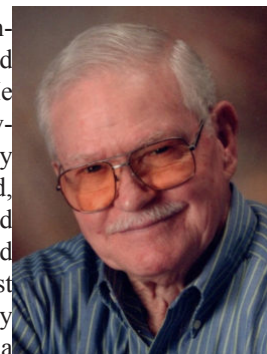

Properly storing your fruits and veggies can really help cut down on your grocery bills while letting you enjoy the health benefits of these items.

# 1 – Tip:

When selecting fresh product, always buy only what you think you will use before it spoils. If you do end up with a large quantity (from gardens, friends, or a deal you can't resist, pick out the best quality items and preserve the rest by canning, drying or freezing.

We hope the following information will help:

### Produce to Store at Room Temp

Bananas, Basil, Cucumber, Eggplant, Garlic, Grapefruit, Green beans, Lemons, Limes, Onions, Oranges, Potatoes, Summer squash, Sweet potatoes, Watermelon, Winter squash, Zucchini

### Store These on your Counter, then move to the Fridge when Ripe

Apricots, Avocados, Kiwi Fruit, Mangoes, Melons, Nectarines, Papayas, Peaches, Pears, Pineapple, Plums

### Produce to Store in the Fridge

Apples, Asparagus, Blueberries, Corn on the Cob (in the husks), Broccoli, Brussels sprouts, Cabbage, Carrots, Cauliflower, Cherries, Cilantro, Dark leafy greens, Grapes, Leeks, Lettuce, Parsley, Peas, Pomegranate, Raspberries, Strawberries

# 1st Annual Pride in Winslow Cleanup Starts May 11

There was a meeting March 21 of the Alliance for Winslow (representatives of the non-profit organizations in town) and interested individuals, about the issue of cleaning up junk, trash, and other debris in Winslow. The conclusion: Let's clean up Winslow!!

Here is what we came up with for the "1st Annual Pride in Winslow Cleanup" schedule:

## Saturday, May 11 Through Tuesday, May 14:

### 1. FOR RESIDENTS INSIDE WINSLOW CITY LIMITS:

Winslow volunteers will be available (call City Hall 634-3901) to help clean up yards and bring trash and bulky items (boards, mattresses, furniture, machine parts, etc.) to the curb for Trash-Away to pick up.

For larger items, a front loader may be scheduled to assist.

(Remember: Trash-Away does NOT take tires, E-waste, freon, or hazardous waste.)



### 2. FOR RESIDENTS JUST OUTSIDE CITY LIMITS:

They may take their trash and bulky items to a large dumpster in downtown Winslow—or—they may call City Hall (634-3901) to request volunteers and their trucks to help them bring trash and bulky items to the dumpster. For larger items, a front loader may be scheduled to assist.

## Wednesday, May 15 Through Saturday, May 18:

### FOR RESIDENTS INSIDE CITY LIMITS

--Trash-Away, as usual, will pick up trash inside the city limits

AT THE CURB, May 15-18 (remember: volunteers can help you--call City Hall), but ALL TRASH must be put out by Tuesday night! May 14!

## Thursday, May 16 through Friday, May 17: County Cleanup

--residents of Washington County can take trash and bulky items to Boston Mtn. Solid Waste for FREE (no tires, E-waste, freon, or hazardous waste) in Prairie Grove or the Tontitown landfill.

--We also discussed having an E-Waste trailer (electronics like old tv's, copiers, computers, cell phones, etc.) and maybe a paper shredding service out here during a Winslow Recycling Saturday.

--And we're looking into a car donation service to come out during the year to pick up old cars (with titles), regardless of condition.

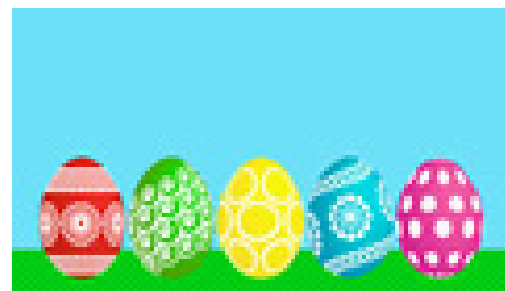

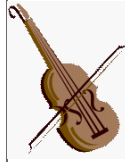

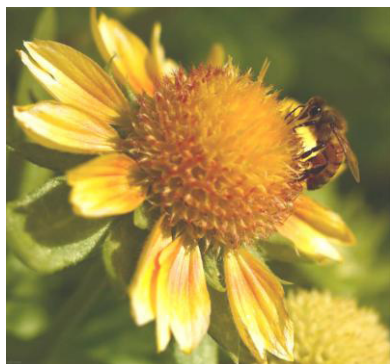

#### WHEN LIFE BEGINS IS NOT A DEBATABLE ISSUE.

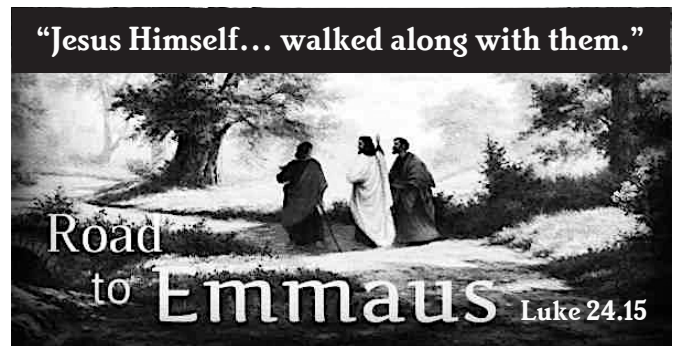

## THE CHURCH OF ME

“Let’s talk about me!” was the theme of a song by Toby Keith a few years back. For millions, that is more than a song — it is a whole philosophy of life! It’s the credo of their religion; the nursery of their personality; the driving force of their existence. And many modern churches have shamelessly opted to go along. They recruit members under the banner: “Have it your way!”

This arrogant egoism permeates every area of modern life. It is the appeal of most advertising. One commercial simpers, “This I do for me.” Another opines, “I’m worth it.” Best-selling books advise us on how to feel good about ourselves, get what we want, and do what we please. Even much of what goes under the name of religion today panders to personal preference: What I like... What I want... My felt needs... The impact of this mentality can be readily seen...

**1) IN SOCIETY.** An atmosphere of selfishness poisons many social relationships. Marriages disintegrate because husbands and wives are unwilling to alter their ego-centered demands. Friendships are sacrificed to the ruthless drive to enlarge self. The nation faces political chaos because every special interest is determined to bend policy its own way! How completely unlike the Christian concept of love which “does not insist on its own way!” (1 Corinthians 13.5.) The focus of Christ-like living is: “Let no one seek his own good, but that of his neighbor.” (1 Corinthians 10.24).

**2) IN MORALITY.** The “Church of Me” approach exalts the individual as the final authority in everything. There are no absolutes; the individual is left to decide “what is right for himself.” The Bible insists, however, that morality has an absolute basis in the absolute holiness of God. (1 Peter 1.15.) The folly of “me-based morality” is well summed up in the Biblical warning: “There is a way which seems right to a man, But its end is the way of death.” (Proverbs 14.12).

A new church in Santa Rosa, California, proclaimed: “We are basically Protestant, but with a few differences. We approve gay people... We also think it is all right to drink... and to smoke marijuana.” Jesus rejected the “Church of Me” approach to religion when He said: “In vain do they worship me, teaching for the doctrines of men.” (Matthew 15.9.)

The Bible warns that self makes a very inadequate God! The litmus test of authentic Christianity is: “Father, not My will, but Yours be done.” (Luke 22.42)
