Because they lived so far from town, Vera and all her brothers were sent, in their turn, to board with families in Cedarville which were paid to keep the kids so they could go to high school. Vera graduated from Cedarville High School at age 16 and attended college for two years. The Superintendent recommended her to go teach 1st-12th grades at Kenny, located between Sunset and Bidville. She taught there and later taught in the Bidville Church. She was a gifted teacher in the Sunday School Class too.

She stayed with our Dad's older brother, helping Uncle Clive Shepherd and his children, because his wife was very sick. Ersel came home from World War II, and had slept in his brother, Clive's barn where he said he could see Vera through the window stirring gravy at the stove, and he fell in love. Mother was not too fond of Daddy telling that story, but on March 24th, 1945, Vera married Ersel Shepherd, and they purchased some land and the house at Mountain Crest. With a LOT of hard work, they turned this into HOME for us four kids-Donald Douglas, David Ersel, Shirley Jean, and Roger Glen, who eventually bought this homeplace.

The plan was Mother and Daddy would move off the mountain and build or buy closer to town. When it got down to Daddy leaving the farm, he just didn't want to leave, so Roger asked them to please stay and live out their lives with him. He was our Dad's caregiver in his later years, and after Mother broke her hip a little over nine years ago, Roger became Mother's caregiver too with assistance from us other kids when needed. Vera and Ersel had 58 years together before Ersel passed away at age 88 in October 2003.

Vera was also preceded in death by her parents, her brothers Ralph, Norton and wife Sue, Earl, Glen, Doyle, and very recently, Vernon's wife, Barbara.

Vera is survived by her brothers Vernon, Carrol and wife Paddy, along with Ralph's wife Ima, Glen's wife Doris, and Doyle's wife Janette. 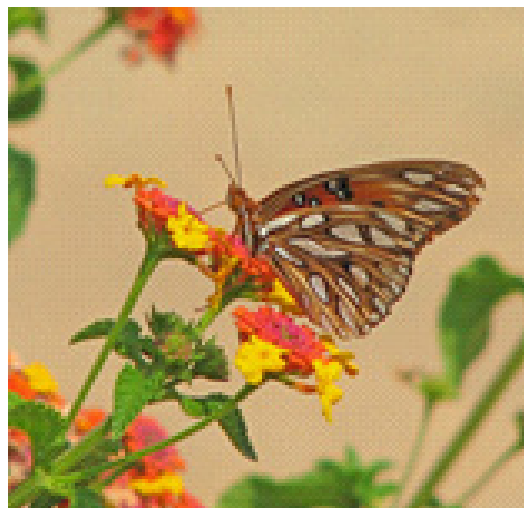
Winslow Community Meals:

In May, the Muxen Building, home to Ozark Folkways, was added to the National Register of Historic Places along with the Our Lady of the Ozarks Chapel and Shrine next door.

Built in the 1940s to be a crafts school for local residents as part of a mission envisioned by Catholic nun and former schoolteacher Clara Muxen, the building was purchased by the Ozark Native Craft Association in 1972. In 1994, the ONCA was reformed as a nonprofit charitable organization and renamed Ozark Folkways.

Today, we remain devoted to the preservation, development, instruction, and celebration of Ozark arts, crafts, and music by hosting workshops, concerts, art shows, crafts displays, and more. With the help of tireless volunteers, generous investors, and our energetic board of directors, we are Keeping the Dream Alive!

Winslow's Third Year as Tree City USA

This is the third year since Winslow was named a Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation in honor of its commitment to effective urban forest management.

Winslow achieved Tree City USA recognition by meeting the programs four requirements: a tree board or department, a tree care ordinance, an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita, and an Arbor Day observance & proclamation.

"Tree City USA communities see the impact an urban forest has in a community first hand," says Dan Lambe, president of the Arbor Day Foundation. "Additionally, recognition brings residents together and creates a sense of community pride whether it's from community engagement or public education".

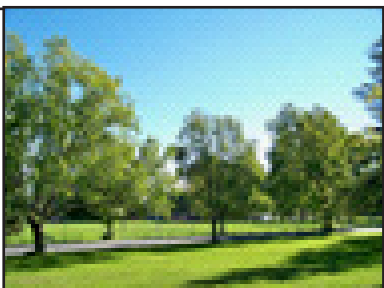

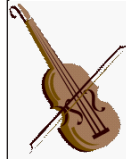

A NATION UNDER A GOD?

Historian Alistair Cooke warned that America today exhibits many of the same signs seen in the decline and fall of ancient Rome: "A mounting love of show and luxury. A widening gap between the very rich and the very poor. An obsession with sex. Freakishness in the arts... The general desire to live off the state... And most disturbing of all, a developing moral numbness..." (America, p. 387.)

Is America more likely to be blessed or condemned by God?

1) **Righteousness Exalts A Nation.** The Bible insists that the strength of a nation lies in its moral condition! "Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a disgrace to any people." (Proverbs 14.34.) Repeatedly, history has seen this principle demonstrated. Because of their iniquity, God allowed the nation of Israel to fall in 722 B.C. America in the 21st Century would do well to learn from their experience.

2) **America Began As A Nation Under God.** The American founders saw a need to acknowledge God in our national life. Donald Lutz and Charles Hyneman reviewed thousands of books, pamphlets, articles and monographs printed between 1760 and 1805 to determine the major influences on the political thinking of our founding fathers. They identified 3,154 quotations from various sources—34% of them from the Bible—by far the largest influence! (John Eidsmoe, *Christianity and the Constitution: The Faith of Our Founding Fathers*, pp. 41-45.) Lincoln's Gettysburg Address, described America as "This nation under God," a concept deeply embedded in our national fabric.

3) **America Has Lost Its Way.** Modern America has largely turned away from God. We live in moral anarchy: Pornography... Immorality... Drugs... Every day in America, 4,493 illegitimate babies are born... 55 people are murdered... 2,456 babies are aborted... Our moral and spiritual foundations are rapidly eroding. "If the foundations are destroyed what can the righteous do?" (Psalm 11.3.)

4) **We Must Call America Back To God!** There is still hope for America! But we must return to God! "Yet even now," declares the LORD, "return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning" (Joel 2.12.) Our hope is not in our buildings, but in our Bibles! Not in riches but righteousness... Not in attainment but in atonement... Righteousness exalts; sin destroys!
