A man applied for a job in upper level management promising to divulge a secret that would increase sales by ten percent in just a few weeks but only if he got the job. Think about it! Could you do that?

Am I missing something, or was the old math I learned wrong? Are the first and second premises a lie? Not necessarily. If you wish to bathe in foam, or scrub down your Mack truck, or decorate your half acre lawn, that baseball size wad might be barely enough. So, in that sense of "basic reality" it's the truth.

What happened to those simple ads like the woman hanging out her laundry in the back yard. It didn't take all that



All fiber media is welcome including, but not limited to, weaving, spinning, basketry, felting, quilting, papermaking, knitting, crocheting, embroidery, hand dyeing, tatting, lace, dolls, needlepoint, handspun fiber, rug hooking, apparel, accessories.

The children's category includes any fiber art form, and is open to children 12 and under.

Judges highly encourage the use of all-natural fibers and entries should have been crafted within the last two years.

There is a \$5.00 fee for each entry, with a maximum of three entries for \$15.00.

The panel of judges is comprised of highly respected artists and crafts people. Judges remain anonymous until after the judging is completed.




