"Comedy Corner"



It puts a person in an awkward position to discover something that but a few people know about. He or she gains new "friends" that at times don not seem to know when it's time to go home! The phone rings off the wall on a constant basis. Yet, I love it. It's almost as good as when I worked in the oilfield. Pretty much every weekend you couldn't have stirred 'em with a stick! The one big difference is that there is no wealth to be spread out- not yet. Well,

Gold that has not been awakened in only God knows how long. I figured another way to get it out, but getting to it would be the major quest. You can't drive to it, and helicopter wouldn't be helpful, unless one had a "D-9 Cat" to clear out a good area. Course, getting a "D-9 Cat" up there would be a feat in itself! The Feds might have something to say about it. Silver and other commodities would not be an extreme to carry out – say fifty or so pieces at a time.

Snakes are a hindrance at different intervals. Copperheads and rattlers love that shade and rock going up to the entrance. Course, it's been written that copperheads only get about a couple of feet in length – wanna bet?

Rattlers can resemble a motorcycle tire when coiled, and there are definitely some whoppers up there! Back home around the Bellevue area, several years ago, a rattler was killed and came in at nine feet, three and half inches long. It had sixty-four rattles and a button. One huge snake! I haven't seen that big of one here, but did get one that measured a little over six foot. He had twenty-two rattles and a button. It was a timber rattler and the meat was pretty tasty. I didn't really want to kill him, but he had me in a bad spot and I had no choice, - him or me!

Sitting on a stump, taking a break and lo' and behold a cub bear walks about fifteen yards up from me. "Mama" walked me out and about. She stayed behind me pretty good while, but about ten yards behind me all the way. Well, I needed the exercise anyway, so we had a good walk. Didn't see a lot of deer that day – wonder why? "Duh"!!!

I always enjoyed a good adventure, seemed the more dangerous it was the better it was. Kinda' stupid, don't you think? Climbing up a straight wall of rock some 300 feet high without the right rope, or grabbing the back of a neck of a copperhead thinking it was a gopher snake – well they do look alike! How about catching a fourteen foot alligator and trying to tape up his mouth? It's definitely not for everybody! Hey you only go around once, might as well make the best of it!

Compromise is always a matter of principle. Adventure for me today, is a matter of such- I'm getting older, wiser and more decrepit. I often compromise getting out of bed in the morning. I am planning on returning to the cavern one of these days. I'm merely compromising the right time zone. Those bats better get their act together, even though there are no bats in or around the cave. It is a matter of principle – I don't want to go to jail!

Let's see now - gold is about a thousand an ounce or more, give or take a few dollars. I'm not a greedy person so three hundred pounds ought to be enough. "Ah", just kiddin'! Makes one wonder why an Indian or anyone else would trade something for some lava rock – maybe something to keep warm with on a frigid night – maybe.....

Rain Garden Workshop at Winslow Library

The recent Rain Garden Workshop at the Winslow Library on May 23 was enthusiastically received, with nine folks in the audience. It was arranged by Winslow librarian and Master Gardener Jean Cosgrove.

It was conducted by Jane Bryant and Jan Hayes, with Carolyn Griffith and Marilyn Harnish on the panel, all of whom are Master Gardeners from West Fork. Jane Bryant showed visuals of the West Fork rain gardens at their library and recycling center. She and her West Fork associates answered questions about how to do community as well as home rain gardens, and had materials to hand out.

They discussed the reason for rain gardens: to prevent erosion, to filter water before it reaches our source of water (for our region, the Beaver Lake Watershed), and to save water for our use (on gardens, etc.).

At the conclusion of the meeting, Donna Phipps Stout led a tour of the recently completed Winslow Rain Garden at the Jarnagan Ball Field, on the north end of the Pavilion. It was the result of a grant from the Beaver Watershed Alliance, and was designed by Becky Roark of the Illinois River Watershed Alliance. It was dug and planted with the aid of Winslow 4H'ers and several Winslow residents. John Pennington and Courtney Thomas of the Beaver Watershed Alliance were also in attendance.
