## HIPPY and Kiddie Kampus

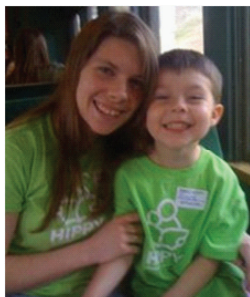

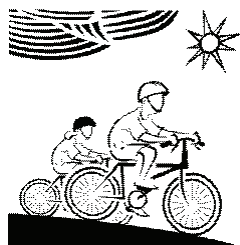

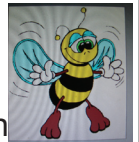

## Past, Present, & Future: Mother's Day

Festivals honoring mothers, or mother goddesses, date back to ancient times. During the Middle Ages, the custom began of welcoming back those that had moved away, to re-visit their home parishes and their mothers on Laetare Sunday, the fourth Sunday of Lent. This tradition later became known as Mothering Sunday in Britain and it continued into modern times.

Anna Jarvis of Philadelphia originated Mother's Day in America on May 12th, 1907. She held a memorial service at her late mother's church in Grafton, West Virginia. Her mother organized women's groups for promoting friendship and health. Jarvis promoted the tradition of wearing a white carnation as a tribute to one's mother, but the custom evolved into wearing a red or pink carnation to honor a living mother and white for a deceased mother. Over the years, the holiday began to include any woman in a mothering role. By 1911, many states celebrated an unofficial Mother's Day, but it wasn't until President Woodrow Wilson lobbied Congress in 1914 that Mother's Day was officially set as the second Sunday of every May. The holiday, like so many of our other holidays, turned so commercialized, with the giving of gifts, cards, flowers, and candies, that Jarvis actually spent the last years of her life attempting to abolish this once so sacred day, that she is credited with creating. Jarvis was actually arrested in 1923 for protesting a celebration of Mother's Day, and in 1948 she died blind and penniless. She was buried next to her mother in Philadelphia.

Today, Mother's Day is still very commercialized. We celebrate our mothers by buying gifts, sending flowers cards, candies, and the like, but it makes me wonder why Anna Jarvis was so against this way of celebration. Don't get me wrong, I too am against commercialization of certain holidays, but I know that all the mothers out there would hate to do away with the sentimental cards, flowers, and gifts from their children. I do however know that my own mother would probably rather get flowers from her children for no reason at all, rather than on a holiday that society dictates that she should get flowers. My own mother, an author and poet, wrote last Mother's Day, "The most important Mother's Day gift will not cost you a dime. Show your mothers that they are loved and needed, that you want them to be a part of your life. Take a walk with them, laugh with them, and hold their hand as they once held yours".

As for the future of Mother's Day, I do hope that we can become less commercialized and begin to truly honor and cherish our mothers, dead or alive. Our mothers are so much more important than flowers and cards. They gave us life, they tended our wounds, they counseled our broken hearts, and so much more. Treat your mother with great respect and love, not just on Mother's Day, but every day. For me, it's not about flowers and cards; it's not even about a single day. It's about remembering all the things that my mother sacrificed for her children. It's about my older sister who helped raise me, it's about my fiancé's mother who has accepted me into her family as one of her own. It's about all the mother figures that you've had in your life and all the things that they made possible for you.

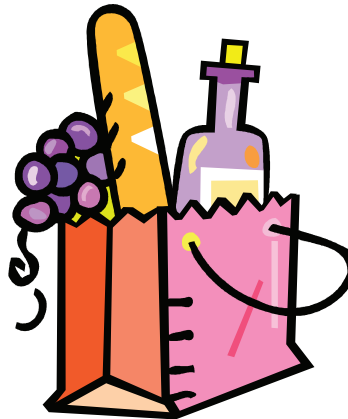
