## Winslow Half Marathon And 5K Run/Walk Announces 2013 Race Director

The Winslow Half Marathon and 5K Run/Walk steering committee met recently and elected Winslow resident Dan Dean Race Director for the 2013 event.

Dan Dean grew up in Little Rock and moved to Fayetteville to attend the University of Arkansas School of Architecture in 1993. He became a licensed architect in 2004 and a LEED Accredited Professional two years later.

He and his partner, Laura Kelly, are excited to join the Winslow community and are building a small home-stead farm off Railroad Street with a focus on fruit production. You may have seen them riding their bicycles as pace setters for the 2012 Winslow Run. Both are founding members of the Bicycle Coalition of the Ozarks and have organized the Highway 71 Classic road ride for the past several years



No longer a practicing architect, Dan now serves as Project Coordinator for the Arkansas Energy Corps Americorps Program, an initiative of the National Center for Appropriate Technology (NCAT) in cooperation with The Corporation for National and Community Service.

The Energy Corps was created to address unmet community energy needs by promoting sustainable energy consumption and education, fostering community sustainability and helping to mitigate the effects of global climate change

The race committee with Dan's leadership hope to build on this year's successful race and Community Expo. Proceeds from the 2012 event raised funds for various community non-profit organizations including Winslow Community Meals, Ozark Folkways Heritage Center, the Winslow Emergency Relief Fund and numerous others.

## WOMEN'S ISSUES

### Pap Test After Menopause

A Pap test looks for changes in the cells of the cervix that show cervical cancer or conditions that may develop into cancer .

Pap screen testing should begin at age 21. Routine screening is recommended every three years for women 21-65 years old. For women 30 years to 65 years who have a normal Pap test result and negative HPV test, rescreening should be done in five years.

Pap screen testing should begin at age 21. Routine screening is recommended every three years for women 21-65 years old. For women 30 years to 65 years who have a normal Pap test result and negative HPV test, rescreening should be done in five years.

Pre-cancerous conditions of the cervix seldom cause symptoms. For problems to be detected, a pelvic examination and a Pap smear are usually required.

When cancer is present in the cervix, the most common symptom is abnormal bleeding. Bleeding may start and stop between regular menstrual periods, or it may occur after sexual intercourse or douching. Abnormal vaginal discharge is another symptom. Pain is NOT an early warning sign of the disease. These symptoms can be caused by other conditions and are not sure signs of cancer; but be sure to see our doctor if any of these symptoms occur.

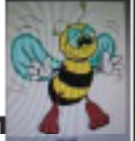

## Velda’s Words

Velda's latest book, Wilda's Outlaw, which came out as an E-book in December, will be released to print by her publishers, The Wild Rose Press, February 13. Wild Rose Press, recently voted as the #1 E-book press for the fifth time, has also contracted Velda's first book with them, Stone Heart's Woman to audio. No release date has been set for the audio book, but it will be available through Amazon and other audio book stores online. The print and E-book are both still available through Amazon and the publisher.

Velda is currently working with narrators to issue her Montana trilogy to audio books. She is accepting auditions presently and hopes to see the first book, Montana Promises released within two or three months with Montana Dreams and Montana Destiny still in the works. All are currently available as E-books on Kindle at Amazon.

The author is finishing a novella based on the legendary life of Rose Dunn and it will soon be available on Kindle. Rose Dunn was born in Kansas and educated in Wichita. Her family moved to Ingalls in Indian Territory where she was said to have become a member of the Doolin/Dalton Gang. Her legend grew out of proportion to what probably actually happened, and Velda has written what she feels might have happened after Rose disappeared into history. She has based the story on research done by her husband Don and librarian Jo Kyle as well as on her own imagination. The novella is however, fiction. It should be released by March to Kindle.

The second book in the Victorian Series which will follow Wilda's Outlaw, is also underway.

The conversation of the thief is peculiar to Luke. It is one of the most remarkable conversations in the Bible. In one flash of light the Holy Spirit revealed Christ to him and taught him of the Lord's future kingdom of glory though at that moment, he was hanging in shame and agony on the tree (cross).

The thief did not ask for any physical relief to his pain, but only for a remembrance in the future kingdom. They were I the same condemnation - him justly but the Lord only as a sin offering. He prayed that they might be together in the Glory. So the precious blood then flowing for his sins cleansed so effectively that it made him at that moment, as fit to enter Paradise as Christ Himself.

The divine nature of the thief's repentance was evidenced by six steps:

1. His concern about his companion (Luke 23:40)
2. His Confession of his own sinfulness (Luke 23:41)
3. His confession of Christ's innocence (Luke 23:41)
4. His faith in Christ's power and willingness to save him. He called him Lord and declared his belief that He had a Kingdom (Luke 23:42)
5. He Prayed to Him (Luke 23:42)
6. He asked for no great thing, but only to be remembered. This was humility. The thief's short prayer embodied a great creed he believed that his soul lived after death, that the world to come would be felicity or misery, that a crucified Jew was the Lord of Glory. He believed that his future Kingdom was better than this present world and that Christ intended to pardon sinners in that Kingdom. He believed he would receive into it the truly penitent. By resting his soul for eternal

salvation upon the dying savior, he had that Kingdom assured to him.

Near the cross of the dying thief the Apostle John, the Virgin Mary, her sister Mary the wife of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalene; but to none of these exalted saints did the malefactor turn for help. He turned from them and prayed directly to Jesus with nothing and nobody between his sin stained soul and the sin atoning Savior.

He did not cry; Oh Holy Mother of God refuge of sinners pray for me, I put my whole trust and confidence in the power of your intercession.

Nor did he appeal to her sister as being the holy aunt of God nor to John as being the beloved apostle of God. Had he trusted any one of these great Saints, he would have perished for Salvation is in Christ and in none other. He is the One and Only Refuge of sinners. (Acts 4:12)
