Raising the bar in public safety, CodeRED Weather Warning is a unique service that automatically calls citizens in the path of severe weather just moments after a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service. This limited CodeRED Weather Warning subscription is available to you at no direct cost. Warnings are available when Tornado, Severe Thunderstorm and Flash Flood warnings have been issued.

For residents inside the Winslow City Limits you will need to pick up a registration form from Winslow City Hall, Community Meals, Winslow Library, Mikey's, and Winslow Post Office. These forms need to be filled out and returned to Winslow City Hall. For more information about registration for inside the city limits call Winslow City Hall at 634-3901

For residents outside the Winslow City Limits you need to register with Washington County. There are 3 ways to register with the county:

WHO WERE THE VICTIMS OF THE HOLOCAUST?

Were the Jews the only victims of Adolph Hitler's hatred?

The Jewish victims of WW 11 are the best-known group to be exterminated by the Nazis. There were over 6 million Jews captured, killed and experimented on but the total number of deaths in the death camps and concentration camps will never be known.

The Roma/Gypsies was also targeted for extermination. These nomadic people, without written language and without a secure place in society were taken by the Nazis. It is estimated the Roma who were killed during WW11 ranged from a couple of hundred thousand to 1.5 million.

Prisoners of War were also victims. Soviets, Poles, and Western Allies who were captured as Prisoners-of-war and were sent to Nazi concentration camps.

Gay men and lesbian women were sent to concentration camps. Some were sent to regular prisons but the majority was sent to concentration camps.

Jehovah Witnesses were sent to concentration camps mainly because they wouldn't conform to Hitler's beliefs. That was true for any religion. If you didn't conform you were arrested.

Criminals or any one that was deemed undesirables were arrested and sent to concentration camps. This included the elderly, disabled and mentally ill. Many blacks, Hispanics and anyone that did not fall under the Nazi rule of "racial purity" was arrested and sent to camps.

Any one caught helping any of these people were either killed or sent to camps.

We need to teach our children about this awful time and how dangerous it is to fall under one man's psychopathic power.

HONORING MAUD DUNCAN AT OZARK FOLKWAYS

With close to one hundred people in attendance, Ozark Folkways was the setting of the last performance of two dramas depicting the life of Winslow's own Maud Duncan. Folkways was celebrating its annual Arkansas Heritage Day on September- 19th. There was plenty of good food, great music, and wonderful spinning and weaving demonstrations to enjoy at this beautiful Ozark Mountain retreat.

The dramas were hosted by the Winslow Museum in celebration of Arkansas Heritage Month. Earlier this year, the museum received a \$2000.00 grant from the Arkansas Heritage Foundation to support special projects for Heritage Month.

The theme for this year's program was "Arkansas in the Workplace--Dreams and Determination". The museum decided there would be no one better to spotlight than one of Winslow's most famous and hardest working citizens Maud Dunlap Duncan.



Starting at age sixteen, Maud began her career as a school teacher, after receiving her teaching certificate from Cane Hill College. She taught several years at Mt. Pleasant and Signal Hill schools. In 1894 she married

Hallum Pearce and they began their family. In 1895 she gave birth to a daughter and named her Helen. A few years later, another daughter was born to the couple. Not long after the birth of this second baby girl named Virginia, Hallum Pearce was likely transferred



on his job with the railroad, for he seems to have disappeared from Maud's life, only to return for the funeral of this same baby girl. At the urging of her foster mother, Maud had her marriage annulled but continued to use the Pearce name, as in 1906 when she took her pharmacology exam and became a licensed pharmacist under the name M. D. Pearce. She had learned to mix medicines helping her foster father, Dr. Albert Dunlap, in his office.

This story was the subject of the first drama performed. Maud was portrayed by Sandy Branson, who is a Winslow native. In the first scene, Maud is in dialogue with Dr. Albert Dunlap, played by Winslow's own Ron Scoville, as she prepares for her examination.

WINSLOW-Kids throughout Northwest Arkansas are beginning to look forward to the end of another school year and what they hope will be an endless summer. It's also a time parents are scrambling to sign up for various camps. If you're looking for some new ideas for summer camps, you may want to check out Ozark Folkways developing calendar of offerings. A week-long art camp, a camp for fiddle players and a basket weaving class are among this summer's line-up. All of the camps are taught by Ozark artists and musicians and are priced affordably thanks to a generous grant from the Pat and Willard Walker Foundation.

The camps will be held at Ozark Folkways, which is located about 25 minutes south of Fayetteville on Hwy. 71 just outside of Winslow. Ozark Folkways is a not-for-profit organization dedicated to the preservation of Ozark arts, crafts and music.

Additional camps will be added throughout the summer. Last summer's line-up included a stone masonry camp for teens. Registration is now open for the following camps:

Two Day Fiddle Camp, May 26-27

This camp is designed for fiddlers aged 10-18 and will be taught by Babette Allen, the 2005 Arkansas State Fiddle Champion, and a member of the Symphony of Northwest Arkansas and the Arkansas Philharmonic. The fiddle Camp will be held Saturday, May 26 (10 a.m.-4 p.m.) and Sunday, May 27 (Noon-4 p.m.) at Ozark Folkways. Allen promises two days of pure fiddle fun that includes learning to play fiddle tunes by ear, and adding harmony and improv. The cost of the two day camp is \$100.

Basket Weaving Class, June 9

On Saturday June, 9 (10 am- 3 pm), kids will weave a traditional Ozark basket in a single day that they can take home with them. Local weaver, Freda Miller will teach participants how to make a cylindrical shaped stovepipe basket. Children under 10 need to have an adult participate with them; there is no charge for the adult. The cost of the one day camp is \$25 and includes all of the materials.

Week-Long Art Camp, July 10-14

Ozark Folkways will host its annual art camp this year from July 16-20 (9 am-Noon). Themed "Dream Big", kids 6-14 will create flying machines and dream catchers in a camp that has participants creating unique pieces of art every day. Students will host an art show and reception on the last day of camp for parents to show-off their creations. The camp is taught by the Center for Art & Education in Van Buren and costs just \$25 for the week-long camp.

Some scholarships are available for all three camps for those with financial need. Ah, the sun – she is shining. People are stirring and a few birds are singing! Springtime is near, and life is, oh so grand! Then – I wake up. I’m sitting on what appears to be a park bench in a police station. It’s minus 450 outside with snow on the ground. I am a good 8,000 miles from home and can’t speak one word of Russian! My truck is being detained with a “boot” strapped to the front tire, out in the middle of a Moscow Avenue. Hallelujah!

No one at the Police Station can speak English. “Wonder what the family is doing back home?” An American consulate appears on your behalf if you are from America, and there he is! Six hours later I sign some papers and receive a little cardboard card – an international driver’s license, suitable to drive the streets of Russia! No eye exam, no written test, and I’m on my way.

Eighty miles later, a “bush” plane picks me up and flies me 265 miles to a frozen lake. I climb aboard a truck that weighs 120,000 lbs. As I drive over the ice, I can hear it creak and crack as a prayer or so is needed. Four feet over on either side of the Heavy Equipment Truck is disaster. The ice is too thin off the main straightaway to carry the load. I’m on the deepest lake in the world! Hallelujah!

Sixty miles later, I’m back on solid ground. Eight foot snow banks and ice. Some hours later I pull up to my new home for the next thirty days - a fenced-in compound. I am 1500 miles into the Siberian Tundra! I’m at a Chevron Oilfield, which is 2000 square miles around. A few miles up the road is a village with about 200 people in it. Suddenly all that money I’m making doesn’t look so appealing anymore. Well, here I am, might as well make the best out of it.

Days go by, and I see across the Tundra what looks like an arctic fox, but can’t be sure. Villagers ask some friends and me to dinner and we accept the invitation. We eat something I do not recognize. It has no taste – bland, if anything, a lot of potatoes and beans. Soon we’re back in “camp” and thank goodness we have natural gas to warm ourselves. It’s a minus 580 outside! Hallelujah!

During the day, while working, Iranian jets do “target-practice in the middle of the field. The “good Guys” fly in and run the “bad dudes” off, and all of us are no longer as nervous as we were. I’m beginning to think Saudi Arabia would have been a better choice of locations. I’m the only American in this group of guys, some are from Switzerland, and Sweden, one from Ireland and a couple from England. We have one hec’ of a conversation at times!

Well, now I’m headed home for thirty days. After miles of driving, I board an Airbus. Coming into Frankfurt, Germany, we land and have a flat. We stay on the plane while a crew taxis out on the runway, and fixes it. Then we’re off once again and land in a town I cannot pronounce. There’s a McDonald’s and I order a burger, small coke and French fries -\$12.00 American! While in Moscow, I stayed in a hotel that cost \$112.00 a night. Sometimes the water was warm and sometimes there was running water! We landed in one town that had letters and the number 8 in its name – nope, couldn’t pronounce that one either – a couple of the letters were backwards! Hallelujah!

Can’t say I miss all of that experience, but do miss the money. Course, one worked for it, that’s for sure!

Folks in Russia eat French fries with mayonnaise and they do talk strange. I think the warmest it ever was, was about 310 F on a clear summer day out at the compound!

Some of the folks over there don’t appreciate Americans, and though I couldn’t speak the language, their “sign language” is pretty much like ours! There’s no doubt what they’re saying to you if they don’t like you. And it’s not Hallelujah!

Going to Russia is like getting married – an experience “one” will never forget! It can be good, bad and even ugly, depending on the people or circumstances at the time. I think everybody out to try it at least once, but \go in their summertime, the winters are definitely frigid! Brrrrrrr!! Hallelujah!






