Last year's event raised over eight thousand dollars and attracted more than three hundred race participants from Northwest Arkansas and across the country. Race organizers hope to build on past year's successes and have set an upper limit of five hundred runners for this year's race.

The certified and chip timed Half Marathon starts at 8:00 at the Winslow Library and follows a challenging in an out course ending at the finish line at Peek's Park. Runner's, visitors and locals will once again be treated to a community expo at the park. Park festivities include displays by local artists, non profit and community organizations, live music and a barbecue luncheon provided by Winslow Community Meals. Festivities wrap up around noon, just in time for the 31st Annual Winfest local music festival.

Laura Kelly and Dan Dean – Why We Moved to Winslow



We met in architecture school in 1998 and soon discovered we shared a common dream of finding a place to build a homestead. Though we love the long growing season of NW Arkansas, we aren't especially fond of hot summers, so Winslow offers a compromise with the fresh breezes that come from the higher elevation. We wanted sunny, breezy, hillside land that's perfect for growing fruit—especially raspberries, grapes, and pears. Not many places can offer 20 acres within walking distance of a Farmers' Market for an affordable price.

In 2009, we bought land on Railroad Street and began constructing deer fences and planting a berry patch, a vineyard and a pear orchard. We built a cob (think adobe) greenhouse and a screened-in fruit processing kitchen before we finally got serious about beginning a stone and cob cabin just this year.

We absolutely love our new community! From Ozark Folkways to Community Meals and the Brentwood Community Center, we have met dozens of fantastic, wise and friendly folks. We appreciate the Winslow Library with its connection to the entire Washington County library collection, and the free internet access. Saturday mornings at the Farmers' Market and Mercantile are the highlight of our week. We've grown addicted to Mercantile coffee and Ruby and Cippy's home-baked treats.

When not building the farm, we play music together or ride bicycles. This year Dan is serving as the Race Director for the Winslow Run. For now, we camp out full time in the kitchen and commute to part-time jobs in Fayetteville, but we look forward to the day when we can commit to full-time farming in downtown Winslow.

Hunter's Education Class

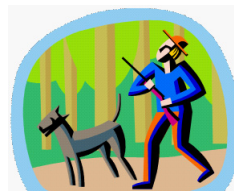

Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) is a parent involvement, school readiness program that helps parents prepare their three, four, and five year old children for success in school and beyond. The parent is provided with a set of carefully developed curriculum, books and materials designed to strengthen their children's cognitive skills, early literacy skills, social/emotional and physical development. A trained, home-based educator meets weekly with parents to role-play lessons and support the parent's important role as their child's first teacher. This program is free for qualifying families. By the end of the upcoming school year, your child will have completed 30 weeks of fun activities that help prepare for school, received 9 free books that follow these activities, met for 9 group meetings where you have a chance to visit with area parents and children, and attended a fun, free field trip - such as our popular train ride.

Donnie Ray Styron **May 7, 1933 - July 19, 2013**

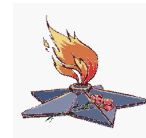

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Grandparents Raising Grandkids

New census data shows an increase in children being raised by extended family. If you look around you will find several examples even here in Winslow. The following article ***More Grandparents Raising Grandkids***, by: Amy Goyer, from: AARP, December 20, 2010 was very interesting and informative.

“The number of children living in a grandparent's home has increased significantly over the past decade, according to new data from the U.S. Census Bureau. I've been following this issue closely for many years and wanted to share some of the highlights of this report.

4.9 million children (7 percent) under age 18 live in grandparent-headed households. That's up from 4.5 million living in grandparent-headed households 10 years ago. I suspect this increase has to do with challenges in our economy over the past five years, including the housing and foreclosure crisis, the loss of jobs and general economic woes. Clearly, grandparents are increasingly providing the stability and security of home for their families.

Approximately 20 percent of these children (964,579) have neither parent present and the grandparents are responsible for their basic needs. This is a decrease from 2000, when approximately one-third lived without parents. This is most likely because of the increase in multi generational homes headed by grandparents that include grandparent, parent and grandchild, and another likely result of economic conditions.

1.9 million children are living in households headed by other relatives (2.5 percent of the children in the country). This number is up from 1.5 million in 2000. This figure speaks to the fact that aunts, uncles, cousins and even siblings are also stepping in to support America's children when they need it the most.

51 percent of grandparents who have grandkids living with them are white (up from 46 percent in 2000); 24 percent are Black/African American (down from 28 percent in 2000); and 19 percent are Hispanic/Latino (down slightly from 20 percent in 2000). I think these changes could be an indicator of the broad swath of families, in all socio-economic categories, who have been affected by the economy. For grandparents reporting responsibility for grandchildren 67 percent are under age 60, which is down from 71 percent in 2000. And 20 percent live in poverty; up from 18.8 percent in 2000.

As increasing numbers of grandchildren rely on grandparents for the security of a home, their grandparents are taking on more of the responsibility for raising them in a tough economy — many with work challenges of their own. For these grandparents, raising another family wasn't part of the plan. But they step up to the plate when their loved ones need them.

Most of these grandparents and other relative caregivers will tell you they gain great joy from their role. But they also face financial, health, housing, education and work challenges that often foil their retirement plans. These new figures magnify the need for more supports, resources and services for these "grandfamilies" so they can more effectively do this important service to their families,

and to our country, while building their own security for the future.

From personal experience, I can tell you grandparents do not get extra money like foster parents do. There are very little resources, however there are more now then when we started this adventure in 2005.

For the curious here in Winslow that want to know information about my family, please just ask instead of talking behind our back. We have nothing to hide and we are very proud to have our grandchildren. They are great kids.

There have been more and more cases of what is being called the "Super Bugs". These are infections that are resistant to the common antibiotics that have been used for years. We received a request to help make people more aware of the most common of these infections. The WEBMD site on the internet is a good resource for checking out health related issues. WHAT ARE STAPH INFECTIONS

A staph infection is caused by a Staphylococcus (or staph) bacteria. Actually, about 25% of people normally carry staph in the nose, mouth, genitals, and anal area. The foot is also very prone to pick up bacteria from the floor. The infection often begins with a little cut, which gets infected with bacteria.

These staph infections range from a simple boil to antibiotic-resistant infections to flesh-eating infections. The difference between all these is the strength of the infection, how deep it goes, how fast it spreads, and how treatable it is with antibiotics. The antibiotic-resistant infections are more common in North America, because of our overuse of antibiotics.

One type of staph infection that involves skin is called cellulitis and affects the skin's deeper layers. It is treatable with antibiotics.

This type of infection is very common in the general population -- and more common and more severe in people with weak immune systems. People who have diabetes or weakened immunity are particularly prone to developing cellulitis.

What is methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA)?

Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) are a type of staphylococcus or "staph" bacteria that are resistant to many antibiotics. Staph bacteria, like other kinds of bacteria, normally live on your skin and in your nose, usually without causing problems. MRSA is different from other types of staph because it cannot be treated with certain antibiotics such as methicillin.

Staph bacteria only become a problem when they cause infection. For some people, especially those who are weak or ill, these infections can become serious.

MRSA infections are more difficult to treat than ordinary staph infections. This is because the strains of staph known as MRSA do not respond well to many common antibiotics used to kill bacteria. When methicillin and other antibiotics do not kill the bacteria causing an infection, it becomes harder to get rid of the infection.

MRSA bacteria are more likely to develop when antibiotics are used too often or are not used correctly. Given enough time, bacteria can change so that these antibiotics no longer work well. This is why MRSA and other antibiotic-resistant bacteria are sometimes called "super bugs."

What causes an infection?

MRSA, like all staph bacteria, can be spread from one person to another through casual contact or through contaminated objects. It is commonly spread from the hands of someone who has MRSA. This could be anyone in a health care setting or in the community. MRSA is usually not spread through the air like the common cold or flu virus, unless a person has MRSA pneumonia and is coughing.

MRSA that is acquired in a hospital or health care setting is called healthcare-associated methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (HA-MRSA). In most cases, a person who is already sick or who has a weakened immune system becomes infected with HA-MRSA. These infections can occur in wounds or skin, burns, and IV or other sites where tubes enter the body, as well as in the eyes, bones, heart, or blood.

In the past MRSA infected people who had chronic illnesses. But now MRSA has become more common in healthy people. These infections can occur among people who are likely to have cuts or wounds and who have close contact with one another, such as members of sports teams. This type of MRSA is called community-associated methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus (CA-MRSA).

What are the symptoms of MRSA?

Symptoms of a MRSA infection depend on where the infection is. If MRSA is causing an infection in a wound, that area of your skin may be red or tender. If you have pneumonia, you may develop a cough.

Community-associated MRSA commonly causes skin infections, such as boils, abscesses, or cellulitis. Often, people think they have been bitten by a spider or insect. Because MRSA infections can become serious in a short amount of time, it is important to see your doctor right away if you notice a boil or other skin problem.

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Fish “swum” with an Attitude

Wow! There’s a lot to learn. Oh, but they’re just fish.

We’ve had an aquarium in our home for as long as we’ve been married. When my wife was as a child she set a bowl on the counter for a goldfish. As the years passed these tiny worlds grew larger and larger. I know, they’re good therapy and can calm the nerves, but that’s just a thin layer in the depths of this fascinating, confined universe.

Debbie began studying the atmospheric pressures which determined the level at which her fish were swimming in the tank. She discovered that fishing conditions in Galveston bay paralleled the attitude of her fish. Scientific? Perhaps not, but certainly worth observation.

According to Viktor Shauberger, Fish Don’t Swim, they Swum. A seemingly straight forward question has intrigued ichthyologists for centuries. How does a fish swim? Maybe Shauberger is right. They don’t swim, they swum which could be a completely new theory.

Is that undulating motion just simply flapping their tail back and forth in the water? Does it require a shake of the head or is it restrained to just the muscles in the tail?

A friend studied dolphins one summer off a Hawaiian island in an attempt to discover how they could attain the speeds they reach. It was believed that these amazing creatures could actually change the configuration of their skin with a muscle system that overcomes the “hull speed” of a full displacement vessel. When the hull speed is approached it takes an increasing amount of power which eventually approaches infinity in order to move the vessel faster. The Dolphin apparently can overcome this barrier to a great degree by changing the configuration of its skin’s surface allowing it to attain speeds far beyond the amount of energy it expends.

Have you ever wondered why a trout always darts upstream when frightened? And how can that trout remain in place in a fast moving stream while expending miniscule amounts of energy. It has been discovered that as water passes over the backward lay of a fishes scales it creates a current vector that wraps back around the scales creating “lift” much like the wing of an airplane. This lift actually pushes the fish forward into the stream’s current. When frightened, the trout uses this free source of energy and shoots upstream out of danger.

Simple creatures? Not according to one ichthyologist who spent his life studying the fish. When he was very ill and life’s end was approaching, he was asked if he had it to do over, would he study the fish?

“Oh no,” he said, “I’d study the fishes eye!”

I like to watch my Calico Ryukin wiggle about the aquarium as t



he king of the realm. He is the

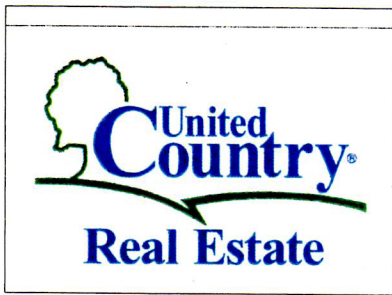

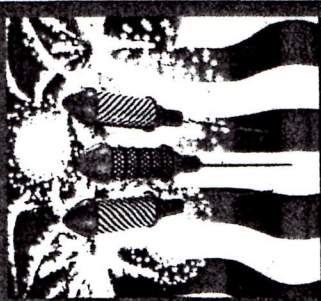
