STREAMBANK RESTORATION TO START SOON IN PEEK'S PARK

Folks driving past Peek's Park across the tracks from City Hall will soon see a huge pile of rocks surrounded by orange fencing. This is not an art installation!

This is actually the beginning stage of the stone to be used to restore the badly eroded streambed of what some call "Squirrel Branch".

This effort—by the City of Winslow and Winslow Community Development Council (WCDC) and supported since the start by the Beaver Watershed Alliance--began back in March 2014 when Winslow volunteers prepared the stream embankments and planted some 70 native trees and shrubs to slow the erosion. Nearly all these plantings provided by Arkansas Forestry Commission have survived. Several at the west end will be moved, due to the restoration work.

In 2015, the City funded a water line to the stone planters, and volunteers on the plantings along the stream did more work. And in 2016, the Highway Department provided signs announcing a zone just off Winslow Blvd. on either side of Squirrel Branch to ban mowing, in order to prevent erosion.

Late this February, representatives from Beaver Watershed Alliance, Arkansas Highway Department, and the WCDC, along with Mayor Randy Jarnagan, met with Director Sandi Formica and Matt Van Eps of the Watershed Conservation Resource Center to review Director Formica's design to improve the stream which runs through the heart of beautiful and historic downtown Winslow.

The improvement work will take a couple weeks, and should be completed in June.

Maybe forgiveness will work for you too, but it takes a lot of work and it has to come from your heart and soul. Hallelujah!

Eualdene Knapp Files (Dene), November 4, 1926~May 6, 2017

Eualdene Knapp Files (Dene), age 90, of Springdale, passed away after an extended illness on Saturday, May 6, 2017 at her home at The Gardens At Arkanshire Retirement Community in Springdale, Arkansas.

She was born in Poteau, OK, November 4, 1926, the daughter of the late Ual Knapp and Myrtle (Smith) Knapp Mock. The family, at the time of the birth of their daughter, together owned a cattle ranch near Albion, OK.

Dene graduated from Albion High School in 1944 and was employed at Tinker Air Force Base when she married Dale Files on November 14, 1945. Dale had recently returned from World War II, serving as a nose gunner, flying 51 missions on a B-24 bomber.

Over the next several years, the young couple lived in Oklahoma, Oregon and Texas, but eventually returned to Oklahoma and ranching when Dale's dad retired. A small cattle ranch, sitting below the Kiamichi mountains, would become their home where they would spend a major portion of their lives, working hard to make a living and raise their family. They would remain there, in the home built by Dale's grandparents, until a serious illness on his part eventually led to a move to be closer to children and medical resources.

One of Dene's greatest family and life accomplishments was the care that she provided Dale after he became ill. Dene's children will never forget their mom's faithfulness and love given to their dad, knowing that the road was a long and challenging one.



HELP KILL THE KUDZU IN TUNNEL PARK: THE NEXT PHASE

The project to kill the remaining kudzu in Tunnel Park continues! (Kudzu is the invasive vine which is taking over the Artists' Point area on Mt. Gaylor, killing the trees it covers.)

The project started last August, with a grant to the Winslow Community Development Council from the Beaver Watershed Alliance with funds through the Arkansas Forestry Commission. An arborist was hired to cut down the kudzu vines and the dozen trees they had killed.

The second phase was December 10th, when nearly 24 volunteers showed up from Winslow and surrounding areas to dig up the kudzu crowns from which all the vines come.

The third phase was on March 18 of this year, when again, many volunteers showed up, this time to plant native tree seedlings for erosion control on that section of hillside above Tunnel Park.

On Saturday, June 24, from 9 am to 12 noon, volunteers from Winslow and area are again invited to help in the next phase: to protect the newly planted trees by digging out the remaining kudzu crowns.

We will meet 9 am sharp at Winslow City Hall (108 N. Winslow Blvd.) at go the short distance uphill on Main to Tunnel Park. Tools, gloves and drinks will be provided. Wear shoes or boots with good tread for working on a hillside. Sponsors are: Patagonia, Pack Rat Outfitters and Beaver Water District.

Transformations: Children's Summer Art Camp

This summer art camp will engage students in a variety of processes that transform everyday objects such as fruit, vegetables, wood scraps, found objects, and plastics into new pieces of art. Students will explore the work of three artists from different periods: contemporary glass artist Dale Chihuly, mid-20th-century assemblage artist Louise Nevelson, and 16th-century fantasy artist Giuseppe Arcimboldo.
