Mike Beebe Makes a Whistle Stop in Winslow

Reminiscent of the political campaigns of the late 1880's through the late 1940's, The Mike Beebe Whistle-stop Campaign Train made a stop in Winslow on Friday the 13th, 2006. A quartet of brass instruments played in the Pavilion, the people crowded around the train eager to hear what Mike Beebe had to say. Jerry Hunton, our Washington County Judge, introduced Mike Beebe to approximately 200 people who listened to the Arkansas gubernatorial candidate speak about his views on education, and other current issues, especially the importance of pre-school in today's world and the drug crisis facing our state.

After the speech from the caboose of the train, Michaëlle Jarnagan, the wife of Mayor Randy Jarnagan in his absence, escorted Mike and Ginger Beebe across the street to Winslow City Hall. After visiting the diorama in City Hall, Mike and Ginger Beebe strolled down Main Street visiting with the residents of our little city.



Vera Jean Rhoads compared the day and the setting to a Norman Rockwell painting, the sun was shining, the leaves just barely turning, and the enthusiasm of the people was contagious. Old-fashioned, red, white and blue faux-straw campaign hats donned the heads of several people in the audience, bumper stickers and yard signs were passed out for people to display until the election.

The tour stemmed from a request by local citizens in Van Buren and along the train route. There was a train, a railroad track, and people along the way that might not hear his campaign message without this tour. The train left Van Buren about 9:00 on Friday morning. It did slow-downs in Rudy, Chester, and Mountainburg, with the first major stop and speech in Winslow. After an hour plus stop, the train traveled north to slow-downs in West Fork and Greenland. Then it was on to Fayetteville, Springdale, and Rogers for the other major stops along the route. The train was scheduled to return to Van Buren that evening.

WINSLOW'S UPCOMING EVENTS IN DECEMBER

Eminent Closing of Winslow Elementary School

My Friends, it appears the time has come for the Greenland School Board to make the decision to close the Winslow Elementary School. As you know, Winslow was annexed by Greenland in July 2004 after the state passed a law mandating that small districts with less than 350 students consolidate.

Winslow Elementary School currently has only 89 students enrolled this year which may likely be the last year the

School will remain open. The bottom line is MONEY. For the WES to remain open it will cost the District \$281,720 more than what is generated to keep the school open. This simply translates into the Expenses exceed the Revenues. The cost per student is as follows:

Cost per student at Winslow Elementary

\$13,027.00

Cost per student at Greenland Elementary

\$ 5,062.00

This cost per student at WES far exceeds Arkansas state average of \$7112.00 per student. The only answer would be to drastically cut the operating expenses at WES or drastically increase the revenues. Either answer does not appear feasible. Since Winslow and Greenland are all part of the same consolidated School District, even if a Special Millage-Increase Election were held with a "Save Our School" theme, it is likely even if the measure passed with Winslow residents, the Greenland residents (with their ample numbers) would flatly vote against such a proposal since keeping the WES is not necessarily a high priority to them, especially with the cost required for such few students.

Last month the Winslow patrons voted 80 Against and only 17 For the millage increase during the regular school election. This type of poor support from the community for our schools does not indicate Winslow is serious about keeping the only remaining School. Granted, the election was not run with a "Save our School theme", however Winslow residents cannot expect to have it both ways. Terry Reed and myself are the only 2 Greenland School Board Members in the Winslow zones and will certainly vote "NO" to closing Winslow Elementary School. It should be understood that there are a total of 7 Greenland School Board members and it is likely the vote will come down to 5 For and 2 Against closing WES. This should be reminiscent of the Greenland School Board vote that closed our Winslow High School in 2005. Greenland also understands the 89 students from WES will not likely choose Greenland after WES has been closed. Most will exercise their right, use the "School Choice" program, and opt for West Fork or even Mountainburg School. West Fork currently is running bus routes in the Winslow area to pick up High School students from Winslow. To pick up additional Elementary Students should not be a problem for them.

Please understand I do not take this lightly and have lost several nights of sleep over this. I love my town and will work hard to do everything we can to change the course of this outcome. I simply believe it is very important to let the Winslow residents know of what is currently in the works and appears to be the eminent closing of our Elementary School. I don't want to sound like I've already conceded defeat, it is just simply the odds are not honestly in our favor. This should not be a big surprise to most of us, only a matter of when. Storming the castle with rakes and shovels will get us on the 6:00 PM News – but that's about it. Any questions, comments, or legal advice is certainly appreciated and needed. If any action can be taken, now is the time and not later.
