### How To Quit Smoking

In last month's column, I described the problems with weight gain after quitting smoking but didn't mention the method I used to help me quit. How well I know the importance of any help whatsoever, because kicking the nicotine habit is a very difficult thing to do, especially if you have been a smoker for a number of years.

I started out using a patch but couldn't tell that it did anything to curb my craving for nicotine, and it itched the first day and kept getting worse. After about a week, my arm started swelling like I had been snake bit, so I had to quit using patches; but I had an ace in the hole.

I had experimented with roll-your-own cigarettes for some time and was convinced that they could help as a pre-quit strategy, or to ease the misery for the first few weeks. They did indeed, as I expected; and I would recommend the practice to anyone who wants to quit.

Homemade cigarettes will cut your smoking at least in half or more because they are flat-out slow and messy! You must be in the right setting before you even start rolling one. If you try to roll one while driving, you will probably cause a wreck; and at the least you will make a big mess.

Tobacco typically falls out of both ends all over your clothes, food, furniture or floor. There is a world of difference from what you are accustomed to, which is just flipping a ready-made out of a pack. If you don't have any ready-mades, you must be prepared to take the time to roll one, and then it doesn't last as long because the tobacco is more loosely packed than factory-made cigarettes.

I had tried to quit several times and was never able to smoke two packs one day and not even one puff the next. I have told many people to cut down first by smoking roll-your-own for a few weeks, and they always ask about the taste or flavor. All smokers have a favorite brand, and they don't think they will like roll-your-own cigarettes, but I tell them to go without for a week and see how a roll-your-own tastes. After a few days without, the nicotine content is all that matters.

I have yet to see a woman smoke roll-your-own - tobacco that is - but I suggest putting aside all unladylike concepts or embarrassment if it will help you quit smoking.

I said a few weeks, but I smoked homemade cigarettes for six months before quitting completely, and it was much easier. I had cut down my nicotine intake significantly, and I think the final act of quitting was aided partly by frame of mind. Having to take the time to roll one every time I wanted a cigarette and put up with the mess had become a king-sized pain, and to quit was then no longer just for health purposes but to also eliminate a big inconvenience in my life.

The real danger is, of course, going back to ready-made cigarettes, but if that happens, try it again in a couple of weeks. If you are still unsuccessful try again and again and again until you are successful! I believe that every time you try to quit you gain just a little bit more of an advantage.




January and its neighbor, February, are not my favorite gardening months. A recent ice storm and the ever-present Roadrunner took its toll on my sunny disposition. So we just stayed inside for three days, and I spent a lot of time on the computer. In addition to playing Scrabble long-distance with my daughter, I've had the chance to browse one of my favorite websites: [www.davesgarden.com](http://www.davesgarden.com).

I highly recommend "davesgarden"; it's free and it's comprehensive. I'd definitely give it a "G" rating as acceptable viewing for all age levels. I like the fact that it is written in down-to-earth language, and I like the range and variety of information resources, including a section on garden humor.

One of the most valuable services to me when I first started accumulating plants for our yard was the plant identification database with over 36,000 species of plants and 140,000+ images. And there are over 200 forums "dedicated to just about every type of gardening pursuit and plant issue you can think of". Also interesting is the "Garden Watchdog" in which the 300,000 members have rated hundreds of mail order seed and plant nurseries complete with personal comments. Talk about some scorching reviews! There's great information available at this site, which I find very handy when browsing for plants in our local nurseries and greenhouses. Of course it helps to read up on the plant BEFORE you buy it. I try to get background information on plants online and then buy them locally. Dave's Garden has helped me resist some expensive temptations—except for books!

As a librarian and a gardener, I treasure the book section. Once I find the book I absolutely must have--my garden will die without it--it's just a hop and a skip over to Amazon.com where it's possible to "Buy with One Click". And all of this in the warm coziness of indoors. Browsing through Dave's Garden and ordering gardening books also helps stave off S.A.D To me, seasonal affective disorder (S.A.D.), basically means it's winter, the sun doesn't shine for weeks, you get grumpy, and sometimes you are overcome by an overwhelming need to bake a chocolate cake. I'm off to the kitchen.

This is the fourth year we have offered Turbo Tax on the computer.


The Family Tree Maker helps you organize your genealogy records. We have disks available for \$1.00 each so that you can back up your information or if you have a flash drive you can back it up on that.



# Mixing It Up On a Cold Winter Day

The steps to my shop are covered with an inch of ice. What a great excuse to sit around the house and look for something interesting to wile away the time. This is a day that has yet to clear the ice off the trees.

There are several things that have been of interest to me, so I got out my book of formulas and began to research ways to make up a better gasoline fuel. A major problem with gasoline is ridding it of turbidity. I arranged a measuring cup and a couple test tubes on my kitchen table and carefully measured out one gallon denatured fuel alcohol. Picking up my book, I read on. Add this mixture to.... WHAT! Forty thousand gallons of gasoline.

Truthfully, I've never encountered cloudy gasoline in more than a couple decades that I've been buying gasoline, so forget it.

I'll try making gum inhibitor for my gas driven equipment. I've had some difficulty with that problem after my equipment sits for several months during the winter. It only takes a gallon of para-amino-phenols and two pounds of benzamide. I can pour the mixture into a can of gas which I have at the shop. I am slowed by the ingredients which might take me some time to find. But, I scratched that idea when I calculated that it would take me six hundred and eighty-nine years to use up a hundred BARRELS of this mixture.

I guess I'll just have to settle back to more domestic enterprises for this frigid afternoon. Baking or cooking up some candy would be a great way to spend some indoor time.

Making a gum inhibitor was a good, but impractical idea, but that

gives me the idea for making some chewing gum. It takes chicle, which I don't have but could substitute with latex rubber which I can get from a box of rubber gloves. I have the paraffin wax, and the powdered sugar, water, and I'll substitute granulated sugar for glucose. But shucks, Tolu Balsaam and Peruvian Balsaam? Oh well, how many sticks of gum can you make with 210 pounds of chicle, 80 pounds of paraffin wax, 800 pounds of powdered sugar, 350 pounds of glucose and 300 gallons of water. That doesn't include the 26 pounds of balsam which I don't have anyway. Fifteen hundred pounds of chewing gum would last the grand kids and all their friends for at least two hundred years.

Looking out the window at the icy landscape, I feel a little defeated, but know that there's an answer. I have watched my wife make divinity many times. I have also watched when due to the humidity and elevation and atmospheric pressure it mysteriously turns to taffy.

Taffy! That's it. I can make jelly beans. I could surprise the grand kids with this homemade confection. I know for a fact that I have those ingredients and I guess I can make a "drying board," whatever that is.

I thumb to the back of my book of formulas. Sure enough, there's a recipe, and I have all the ingredients right here in the kitchen; sugar, corn syrup, gelatin and water. But, it takes four to six days to cure after you mix your concoction of 90 pounds of corn syrup, 80 pounds of sugar, and 20 pounds of gelatin in 60 gallons of water. Besides, you've got to boil this mess for eight to sixteen hours!

It's about time for the news, and not being much of a cook anyway, I figure there are other things that I can do to pass the time. Besides, I've presented some great recipes that some of you might just try. If you use any of these, you'll probably have a little extra that you can pass my way because I've decided there's no possibility that I'll be mixing up any of these concoctions soon.

### TAX DEDUCTIONS FOR HOMEOWNERS

This year's infamous April 15 deadline is fast approaching- so the following tips might prove helpful.

Mortgage interest on a primary residence is usually tax-deductible, unless you took out a mortgage for reasons other than buying, building or improving a home. Fill out Schedule A, "itemized deductions," to claim this deduction. Your lender should provide Form 1098, which states how much mortgage interest you paid for the year.

Late payment charges can be deducted as home mortgage interest as long as the charge was not for a specific service you received in connection with your loan. A similar rule holds for mortgage prepayment penalties. If you pay off your home mortgage early and have a prepayment penalty, you may deduct that penalty as home mortgage interest subject to the same requirements as for late payments.

Real estate taxes also are deductible. Your mortgage interest statement may list the amount of real estate taxes you paid if your taxes and homeowners' insurance were placed in an escrow account when you closed on your mortgage. If real estate taxes aren't included, review your canceled checks to determine your deduction. The points paid on a purchase mortgage are deductible the year you made the purchase if you meet certain criteria.

If you refinanced last year, you might be able to write off any points you paid to buy down your interest rate. But, you have to deduct the points proportionately over the life of the new loan. For example, if you took out a 30-year loan, you would deduct 1/30th of the points you paid each year.

Your tax adviser can help you determine which of these deductions would apply to your situation.

Remove from heat, pour off excess oil. Stir in 1/2 cu. sour cream and serve.


## Quilt Squares of the Month
