ANOTHER BATTLE AGAINST KUDZU IS COMING ON NOVEMBER 11!

The Kudzu War on the hill above Tunnel Park continues! There will be another big volunteer day on Saturday, November 11, from 9 am to 12 noon, complete with hot coffee, and pizza near noon.

Folks from Winslow and the northwest Arkansas area are invited to join in the digging up of kudzu crowns, and, in some cases, the roots of this invasive plant. A special invitation goes out to those in area organizations, like the Winslow Community Development Council (WCDC), Ozark Folkways, the Winslow Community Center Association (WCCA), and 4-H.

Unattended, kudzu grows amazingly fast. Some say the vines grow a foot a day!

To see the vast damage it can do in a short time, one has only to drive to the top of Mt. Gaylor and note the “topiary” that is killing hundreds of trees around Artists’ Point. Residents of Winslow may even have it in their yards, in which case, it would be valuable to come help us in order to learn how to control and eradicate it on one’s own land.

This “war” began in August of last year, when a grant paid for an arborist to cut down the more than a dozen dead trees and the killer vines on a section of the hill above Tunnel Park just up from City Hall.

December of last year, volunteers congregated on a Saturday for the first effort to dig out the crowns. In March 2017, volunteers organized by Beaver Watershed Alliance planted about 80 seedlings of native trees on the bare hill. Then, in June, another BWA volunteer effort cut some of the remaining kudzu away from the tree seedlings to prepare for a targeted herbicide spray of the kudzu leaves by a trained landscape contractor in July.

Finally, the November 11th “Invasive Kudzu Removal” will focus on eradicating the kudzu on the remaining part of the hill. The WCDC and the City of Winslow, and our new status as a Tree City USA have all been critical supports in this effort.

This new PowerPoint presentation and foraging fungi workshop will focus on techniques used to identify which fall mushrooms are worth picking. 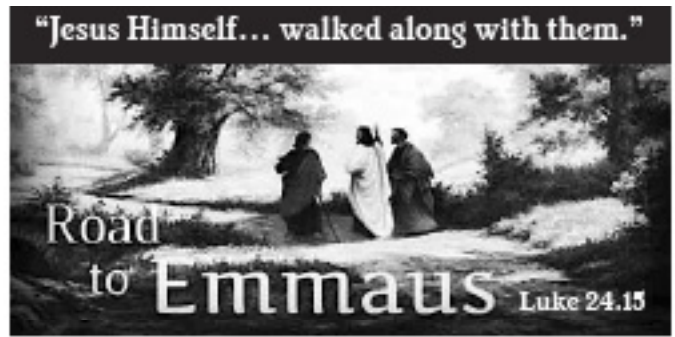

More than 350 years ago, amid the darkness of the Thirty Years' War, Martin Rinkart, a German pastor, wrote a hymn that is still sung. It was a time of war, starvation and death. His own family suffered terribly. But, in that time of darkness, he wrote, as a table grace for his children, this hymn of Thanksgiving for which he is still remembered today:

*Now thank we all our God
With heart and hands and voices,
Who through His saints doth show
His wonders to our eyes.*

It is one thing to talk about Thanksgiving and an altogether different thing to be genuinely thankful. Real Thanksgiving is not ritual or ceremony but the outpouring of a grateful heart to God. Rinkart's hymn reminds us of those awesomes through which our gratitude should find expression:

1) *We must give thanks with hearts.* Thanksgiving arises from within. It begins in the mind and in the heart. The word "thank" comes from the same Anglo-saxon root word as "think." One reason our Thanksgiving is inadequate is that our thinking is inadequate. We must see that Thanksgiving is an attitude before it is ever an action. May we learn to say, "We have thought on Thy lovingkindness, O God." (Psalm 46:9)

2) *We must give thanks with hands.* It is not enough to give thanks in word only, we must also give it in deed. (cf 1 Peter 3:18.) Thanksgiving serves; it reaches out. Those who have been blessed with God's bounty must share that bounty with others. We must strive to be conduits through which God's blessings flow on to others. As we have been blessed by God, let us become His means of blessing others.

3) *We must give thanks with voices.* Thanksgiving must express itself in worship to God. In fact, there is no real thanksgiving without it. God must be worshipped and served in the way He Himself has appointed. (John 4:24.) That's what is wrong with much so-called "thanksgiving" — it is offered without any real commitment to worship God as He desires to be worshiped.
