### Paint, Polish and Elbow Grease Restore Old High School Building

Work has begun on the Old High School Building. The building will be the home of the Winslow Agnes M. Stockburger Library, the Friends of the Winslow Library Book Store, a new Winslow Internet Cafe, the proposed Winslow Historical Museum and possibly other ventures in the future.

The Winslow Library will expand from the 750 square feet it now has to about 2200 square feet, almost three times its present size. It will still have two public access computers.

The Winslow Internet Cafe, sponsored by the Friends of the Winslow Library, will be a computer cafe with high speed public access computers. It will have four computers to start with more to be added soon.

The last few Saturdays several Winslow residents have volunteered their time cleaning, scraping paint, patching holes, painting, and doing a multitude of other things that have to be done before the the move can

be made. The weekends in March will be no exception. There are several rooms that still need to be painted. Come on out, meet your friends and neighbors and let's make this a fun community project.

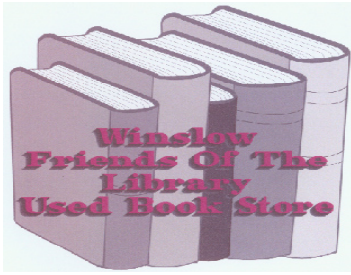

## **SURVIVING KATRINA**

I suppose that the best way to begin is by introducing myself. My name is Carla Frisard and my family and I are new to Winslow. We were what you might call blown in from Hurricane Katrina. My husband, LJ and our three children, Michael, Montana, and Ashlynn, survived what some have said to be the worst storm of our time. To be perfectly honest, I could not agree more.

I grew up in Louisiana, so I was no stranger to hurricane season. I had heard my parents and grandparents talk about Hurricane Camille and all the damage she caused. However, nothing could have ever prepared me for what lay ahead with Katrina.

We had been watching the news and the weather channel just to keep an eye on Katrina. Of course we took some precautions, extra batteries, candles, canned food, bottled water, that sort of thing. But, I think the worst mistake we all made was thinking that we would be spared once again at the last minute. What a grave mistake it truly turned out to be for all of us.

My husband, the kids, and I had already been through a few storms in the mobile home where we lived in McNeill, MS. So, we had every intention of staying right there for Katrina as well. But then the most blood curdling sound I have ever heard in my life ripped through the rain; the rain that only moments before had been a soft melody tapping on my tin roof. Within what seemed like an instant, the intensity with which Katrina began to manifest her true self, had begun. Something within me knew right at that instant that Katrina had come to the Gulf Coast looking for a fight and the only defense we had was prayer.

My husband's employer lived only a few miles from us in a beautiful brick home. He offered us to come and ride out the storm there. Not only was Greg my husband's employer but both our families attended church together, this was very comforting for all us.

As we got settled in at Greg and Angie's, Katrina got settled in over us. I watched as the sky turned from a sickening gray into a fierce and sinister, thick blackness that seemed to close in around everything. Only sporadic shots of lightning would flash to show that everything had not truly been

swallowed up by the dark. The rain itself had even transformed from entire solid sheets of unrelenting rain into pounding hail that hit everything with the speed and impact of bullets being fired from thousands of machine guns all at once. However, one of the truly hair-raising characteristics of this storm was one that in itself was invisible but nonetheless formidable. The wind, was the bloodcurdling sound that had initially horrified me into the reality that this storm was not like all the others. But, it didn't stop with just that unforgettable sound, the sheer power that the wind brandished was a sight that would haunt my dreams for months to come. I saw one hundred year old oak trees ripped from the ground as easily as a child would pluck a dandelion from a spring field. Debris flew from everywhere, rooftops, sheets of metal or tin, tree branches that had been snapped into. The front yard now looked like a war zone. At one point, the barometric pressure dropped to 902 millibars. To me at the time that was just another weather term, within minutes the definition became very visible to me. My husband and son had been sitting on a couch in the living room. Directly behind them was a huge plate glass picture window. What happened next seemed to be all in slow motion but also instantaneous at the same time. Like a horrible nightmare you can't wake up from. The first thing I heard was a deafening pop like that of a cork flying from a bottle. I turned to see the picture window shoot straight out of its frame in one piece and then drop to the floor where it shattered. Thank God my husband reacted with true fatherly instinct. He threw his arm around Michael and went to the floor, on the opposite side, out of harms way. It was in that moment that I realized, this is out of our hands. I needed only to peer out the fresh wound of that wall to see the mighty power of God. It was then that we all prayed and asked God to protect and keep us safe through the endurance of Hurricane Katrina. Little did we know that our prayers would not end there. The real test and tribulation was yet to come. The aftermath of the storm would bring the true devastation to our lives. Lives that would be changed forever, whether good or bad, peace or insanity, would rely on the most important factor of all, would we trust in God to rebuild our lives through His grace and mercy.

I'm convinced that if humans could control the weather, Earth would be a barren planet in a matter of a few years. We would have nothing but warm, sunny days throughout the year with no rain or snow to keep us cooped up inside or to keep us from outdoors sports and recreation. When people talk about how wonderful the weather is or what a lovely, sunny day it is, or how unseasonably warm the temperature is for this time of year, I have to resist the urge to say, "No, this is not a lovely day, this is lousy weather, this is a drought!" To me, a rainy day is a lovely day. A thundershower is worth celebrating. Snow is welcome in my garden even if means cold feet and staying off the highways.

When I first moved to Northwest Arkansas three years ago, the first thing I did was to complete the training program to become a bona fide Washington County Master Gardener. Armed with my certificate and boundless enthusiasm, I bought all the plants and flowers and trees and shrubs that were "forbidden" in Arizona, a state that is in perpetual sunshine, i.e. DROUGHT! I bought dozens of different packages of seeds, because I finally lived in a place with enough water and a growing season long enough to permit growing flowers and vegetables from seeds. It was a dream come true.

This winter, I look out over the yard and wonder which plants will survive the drought, knowing, of course, that it will be the expensive ones that bite the dust – literally. I start thinking that somebody should have warned me that February is 73 days long and March is 92. I swear that I will never garden again or I resign myself to buying just a few, very drought-tolerant plants. I start wondering how global warming became a political issue rather than a possible factor in drought. Mostly - as you can see - I just get cranky and whiney. I am reminded of the words of Henry Mitchell, "A gardener must

not feel sorry for himself, even in winter, and no matter how great the cause."

Then the mail comes. With impeccable timing, all the seed and plant catalogs that I signed up for last year arrive in the dead of winter, in the middle of a drought. A veritable garden, a cornucopia of horticultural delights is delivered to my mailbox, and I trudge through the snow to see what treasures await. I spend hours pondering, sorting, selecting, making lists, taking notes, arranging, visualizing a yard full of flowers and a freezer full of green beans, visions of sugar peas dance in my head. Once again I am revived and rejuvenated. I can hardly wait for spring. As Katharine S. White wrote in her book, *Onward and Upward in the Garden*, "For gardeners, this is the season of lists and hopefulness; hundred of thousands of bewitched readers are poring over their catalogues, making lists for their seed and plant orders, and dreaming their dreams."



## Barefoot Peddler

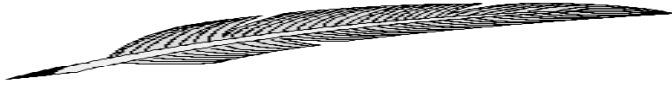
