# **IT'S OPEN AND IT'S FREE**

On April 18<sup>th</sup> the Friends Of The Library Internet Café opened for business and it's free.

The Internet Café makes access to the Internet available at NO COST to the residents of Winslow. The goal has been to provide as a community service, internet access; a place to type a report or a letter; somewhere to research problems; a means of sending electronic mail (better known as Email) and also a chance to pickup a snack and a cup of coffee at the same time.

The Internet Café currently has 12 computer terminals available to the public. All of the computers have high speed connections to the internet. Currently we are averaging 20 users per day.

The Internet Café was put together with the thought in mind that many of the families and individuals in Winslow with a computer do not have access to the Internet or even a computer for that matter. As any student in Winslow (grade school, junior high, high school or college) can tell you, without a computer with Internet access, their education may suffer. Homework assignments come over the Internet. College enrollment can ONLY be done over the Internet. It is becoming difficult to do a class required report. If you are in college much of the work must be turned in over the Internet. Some colleges provide "report cards" only via the Internet.

As well as the usual boring school work, most of the young people in town can tell you all about the games and music available with a computer.

All of this is fine and dandy but we need the help and the support of the community if the Internet Café is to remain open. Rather than charge a fee or set a time limit for users we are accepting donations of BOTH money and time.

We know that the school crowd doesn't have money with them every time they come in to use the Internet Café but most adults do. If you think your children are benefiting from the use of the computers we wonder if occasionally you could send a contribution with your children when they come up to the library or the Internet Café? We're not talking a big contribution – maybe a few dollars if it's affordable.

Charging a per use fee puts a hardship on those that need the Internet Café the most and can least afford it. We're here for the community and to keep the Library thriving!

More than anything else WE NEED VOLUNTEERS to help out by putting in 2 or 4 hours a week as an attendant who will register and sign in users. There is absolutely no need to be familiar with computers, but without more volunteers, were are not going to be able to be open 7 days a week during the summer or in the evenings this fall after school starts like our users are requesting.

## Winslow Gardener

Winslow Farmer's Market is off to a great start. Charlie is bringing lots of wonderful vegetables and greens. We've had flower bouquets, bedding plants and herbs for sale the past couple of Saturdays. There's also delicious fresh baked goods. It's a lot of fun to shop at the Market and then stop by the Mercantile for a cup of coffee and visiting and catching up on what's happening around town. Our friends brought over some fresh strawberries today that are just delicious. We had fresh asparagus a couple of weeks ago – yummy! My okra plants are just taking off and all of the tomato plants have good-sized tomatoes on them. The green beans and squash are doing fine. We'll have more and more vegetables at the Farmer's Market as time goes by so keep dropping by to see what's new and delicious. There are no fees, no executive board, and no membership dues for being a part of Winslow Farmer's Market. No parking or setting up or vendor fees, and everyone is welcome to bring produce to sell. The Winslow Farmer's Market is not a get rich quick plan by any means, but it sure is a lot of fun to share with friends and neighbor

The Washington County Master Gardeners have almost completed their spring planting in Winslow. We have put all new flowers and bulbs in the barrels along the main sidewalk in downtown Winslow, added lilies and other perennials to the Winslow Rock, replaced the caladiums and impatiens under the Winslow city tree, added some perennials to the two big beds in the park. We were delighted to find that virtually everything came back in the park beds this year, but it was a mild winter and we had used lots of mulch.

I have become a firm believer in the benefits of mulch: straw, hay, cottonseed hulls, pine straw – all are great mulch. A Master Gardener over near Devil's Den puts newspaper pages under the mulch around her plants, which gets worked back into the soil as it disintegrates. I believe serious gardeners would warn against using the funny papers,

advertising pages or any colored newsprint as the dye is not healthy for plants just as food coloring in hummingbird food isn't necessary and is harmful to the hummingbirds. I took the old carpet out of our house when we remodeled, cut it in strips and laid it down between the rows of vegetables for weed control. This is the second year and the carpet is holding up well and at least the paths are weed-free. The carpet also makes it easy on the knees when I'm weeding and digging in the dirt. From what I hear this is going to be another dry summer and anything we can do to conserve water and keep the plants from drying out is a good thing.

I've been asked by several people what the lovely yellow, white, and purple flowers are that are planted in the various Winslow Rock flower beds. They are Dutch iris. They are a very hardy plant to have such a fragile looking bloom. I call them the "poor man's orchid". And the deer do not like them or daffodils. Towards the end of summer, the Dutch iris are available at a cheap price at Lowe's. If you can wait until late, late in the season, you can usually buy these at 50% off. I'm going to do a mass planting of them this fall in the woodland area next to our house and see if I can get them to naturalize. They do not have to be dug up in the fall as they are very hardy in our zone. I like them because they bloom when the irises are just about finished and the peonies are just beginning to open up, and because they are so incredibly beautiful.

When American Milling went out of business, one of the real deals I bought was a deer repellent spray. So the first time I saw deer tracks (scouts sent out by the rest of the herd??) in my garden beds this spring, I got my husband to spray all of the hostas and Japanese painted fern, Celandine poppies, columbine, and caladiums that are laid out buffet-style for deer at the front of our house. While Lee was doing that I wandered over to the vegetable garden to work for a while. When I headed back to the house, my nostrils were confronted with a vile, ugly smell. It got stronger towards the house. It was nauseating. Then I remembered the deer repellent spray. I had to hold my breath while I ran into the house. The porch was uninhabitable. My husband

told me there was some really weird smell coming from the air conditioner. I told him what it was and that I thought we are going to smell to high heaven all summer. I told Lee it was an effective repellent because the smell was so bad I'd rather have the deer eat the whole garden to the ground than have to put up with that stench. We read the label again. It said the smell would dissipate in about four hours. Sure enough it did. I was out on the porch about 1:00 a.m. this morning checking to see if the thunderstorm was going to come our way. I watched while two young deer marched right into my front yard, wandered past the peonies and the petunias and looked like they were heading for the hostas. I forgot that I had this fool-proof, never-fail deer repellent protecting the hostas and clapped my hands to shoo them away. They just stood there and looked at me, so I yelled at them and they finally moseyed off at their own good pace. Our ferocious attack cats slept through the whole thing. Now I think I should have waited to see if they came up to the front flower beds to munch on the hostas. I have a feeling there will be other opportunities this summer for us to test the effectiveness of the deer repellent. I understand that deer will eat just about anything if they get hungry enough, and I notice that nurseries use the word deer-resistant now more than they do deer proof. Deer are great for sampling a variety of plants to see if they like them.

My husband has been shooting at the squirrels on the bird feeder with an air rifle to scare them away. When the squirrels leap on to the feeder, Lee tries to sneak out the back door to blast away at them. He hasn't hit any of the squirrels yet, but they learned the sound of our back door in a hurry. Now all he has to do is open the back door and they go scurrying. We wouldn't mind feeding the squirrels their fair share, but they are greedy and not into sharing with other creatures.

For Mother's Day I received a six-foot dawn redwood (*Metasequoia glyptostroboides*) that is now planted in the middle of the front yard. This plant, thought to be extinct, was discovered in China in 1941 and brought back to the United States to be reintroduced. They look like soft-needled redwood

trees and are much faster growing than the giant redwoods. The bald cypress (*Taxodium distichum*) that I bought last year for Lee's birthday - it's his favorite tree with mimosa being his least favorite tree - is fully-leafed out now and just gorgeous. I kept it watered all winter and it made it through just fine. My friend, Helen, from Phoenix just laughed at me for buying and planting a tree in the middle of a forest, but she has to understand I don't have THIS tree in my forest, she is NOT a gardener, and she lives in a desert where they don't even remember what a real tree looks like.

So, I'm off to plant and water and weed. See you at the Market.

share them with us. We pray that you will join us in celebrating 65 years and see what we have done to the church. Everyone is welcome.

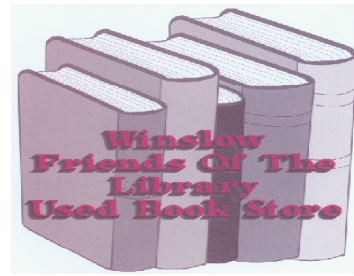

*father that they didn't know what they were doing and to forgive them and God said O.K."*

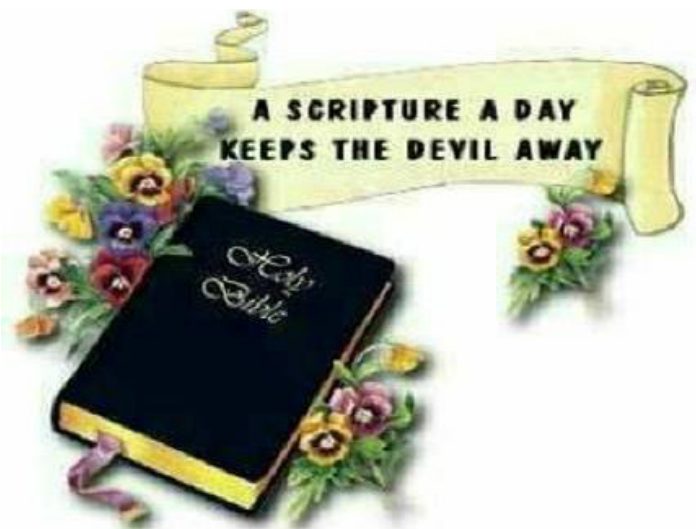
*"His dad (God) appreciated everything that he had done and all his hard work on earth so he told him he didn't have to go out on the road anymore. He could stay in heaven. So he did. And now he helps his dad out by listening to prayers and seeing things which are important for God to take care of and which ones he can take care of himself without having to bother God. Like a secretary, only more important."*

*"You can pray anytime you want and they are sure to help you because they got it worked out so one of them is on duty all the time." "You should always go to church on Sunday because it makes God happy, and if there's anybody you want to make happy, it's God!*

*Don't skip church to do something you think will be more fun like going to the beach. This is wrong. And besides the sun doesn't come out at the beach until noon anyway. "If you don't believe in God, besides being an atheist, you will be very lonely, because your parents can't go everywhere with you, like to camp, but God can It is good to know He's around you when you're scared, in the dark or when you can't swim and you get thrown into real deep water by big kids."*

*"But...you shouldn't just always think of what God can do for you. I figure God put me here and he can take me back anytime he pleases.*

*And...that's why I believe in God."*



# Did You Miss Medicare, Part D?? Maybe Not!

**So you may be qualified as low-income and can still enroll?** Just this last week, Social Security announced that they will give low-income beneficiaries until December 31, 2006 to enroll in the Part D program without penalty. To qualify for low-income subsidies, single beneficiaries must have an income under \$14,700 and total assets under \$11,500 (not including your house, household goods and car) and couples must have an annual income under \$19,800 and total assets under \$23,000 (not including your house, household goods and car). Currently, approximately half of the 5.7 million senior citizens who have not registered for the Part D prescription drug plan are eligible for the low-income subsidies. People who qualify under Extra Help may have very low premiums, or in some cases, may not have to pay any premiums, to have Part D Coverage. This is called Extra Help and you have to apply for it from Social Security. Don't delay. You can sign up for Extra Help tomorrow.

**So you don't have your 65<sup>th</sup> birthday until June, 2006, and you have not signed up for Part D?** You are still in luck!! If you are not eligible for Medicare until after May 15, 2006, you can still sign up. You can sign up three months before your eligibility month (the month of your 65<sup>th</sup> birthday), during your eligibility month, or up to three months afterwards. Don't let your sign up period slip past you. You will never have premiums lower than when you sign up when you just turn 65. If you meet the above requirements for someone who can still enroll in Part D, you may call Medicare Toll Free at 1-800-MEDICARE.

**If you are already on Medicare and you really missed the deadline of May 15<sup>th</sup> to sign up for your Medicare Part D?** What happens now? If you are already on Medicare, you cannot sign up for 2006 prescription coverage any longer. The next time to sign up for Medicare Part D is November 15, 2006 and that will be for coverage beginning January 1, 2007.

Open Enrollment Period, which starts November 15 and lasts until December 31, 2006, is the earliest time you can enroll. There will be a penalty of 1% of the national premium average per month for each month after the May 15<sup>th</sup> deadline. This penalty will carry through for the rest of your life.

For instance, someone on Medicare now that signs up for a drug plan on November 15 will face a penalty of 7% (seven months from May to January) of the average of the national drug plan premium each month for the rest of their life (the 2006 national average has not been declared, yet, but if the national average premium is \$40.00 or less, then the monthly penalty will be less than \$2.80 a month). Even if you don't take a lot of prescription drugs now, you should consider joining. You might be able to protect yourself from big drug bills in the future. That way you can lock in the lower rates, even with the mod-est penalty.

The monthly penalty can increase in future years. The longer you wait, the higher the penalty will go. We urge you not to miss your next Open Enrollment Period from November 15, 2006 to December 31, 2006, if you are already in Medicare, and do not meet the income limits for Extra Help.
