# PAST, PRESENT, & FUTURE: VALENTINE'S DAY

The month of romance is upon us; though the history of Valentine's Day is shrouded in mystery, many people around the world will celebrate their love by the traditional exchange of flowers, candies, gifts, and of course, greeting cards.

Although the Catholic Church today recognizes three martyred Saints bearing the name Valentine or Valentinus, do we really know which Valentine gave us this romantic holiday? One of the Valentine stories is about a priest during the third century in Rome and during a time when Emperor Claudius II decided to outlaw marriage for young men, because he thought they would make better soldiers than men with wives and families. Valentine defied Claudius and performed secret marriages for young lovers but his actions were soon discovered and Claudius ordered his death. Other stories suggest he may have been killed for helping Christians escape Roman prisons where they were often beaten and tortured. Yet another story declares that Valentine may have actually sent the first "Valentine's Day" greeting while he was in prison. It's believed that he fell in love with a young girl, rumored to be his jailor's own daughter, who would often visit Valentine during his incarceration. The legend says that he wrote to her before his death, signing his letter, "From your Valentine", a statement that is still used today for this day of romance, we call Valentine's Day. According to my research, none of these so-called legends have ever been fully substantiated but it's not surprising that the Saint, being portrayed as heroic, more importantly, romantic led to his being one of the most popular Saints by the middle ages in both England and France. Though some believe that Valentine's Day is celebrated in mid-February, to commemorate Valentine's death or burial which probably occurred around 270 A.D., Pope Gelasius didn't declare February 14th, St. Valentine's Day until around 498 A.D.

Let us not forget one famous Valentine's day that emanated a great deal of things, but romance wasn't one of them. In 1929 gunmen, suspected to be in the employment of crime boss Al Capone opened fire on seven members of the George "Bugs" Moran North Siders gang in a garage on North Clark Street in Chicago. This "St. Valentine's Day Massacre" stirred the media storm centered on Capone's illegal activities and prompted the F.B.I to double their efforts in their search for incriminating evidence to take Capone off the streets once and for all. Today 141 million Valentine's Day greeting cards are exchanged according to Hallmark research, making Valentine's Day the second most popular occasion for giving cards (Christmas being the first). Valentine's Day cards gained popularity in the U.S during the revolutionary war, though most of them hand written notes, mass production of the cards began in the early 1900's and Hallmark began selling the cards in 1913. According to their research over fifty percent of those cards are not purchased until the final six days leading up to Valentine's Day, research also shows that more than half of the U.S. population celebrates the holiday by purchasing a card. Each year on Valentine's Day, it's sure that the candy companies, florists, jewelers, and card companies around the world are rolling in it. In 2010, an estimated 14.7 billion was spent on Valentine's Day related purchases.

The future of Valentine's Day shouldn't be about the amount of money that you spend on luxurious gifts; it should, however, be about whom you spend it with. Be it your soul mate, your family or friends, the occasion is about love in all forms, so don't be afraid to tell people you love them, make someone's Valentine's Day special. Only those of us that have ever truly known love, know what it means to be with a person unlike any other and sharing a special holiday centered around the celebration of love with that person is all that really matters.

Until next time: It's easy to become enamored with earthside stuff, but when you make the choice to follow Jesus, He'll show you the joy of collecting eternal treasures.

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
## Building at Mountain Crest

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# Favorable Public School Leadership Model

## \*OPENING DAY OF HIGH SCHOOL\*

This speech was given by a new H.S. principal in Florida to the students and faculty of a high school:

"I am your new principal, and honored to be so. There is no greater calling than to teach young people.

I would like to apprise you of some important changes coming to our school. I am making these changes because I am convinced that most of the ideas that have dominated public education in America have worked against you, against your teachers and against our country.

>**First**, this school will no longer honor race or ethnicity. I could not care less if your racial makeup is black, brown, red, yellow or white. I could not care less if your origins are African, Latin American, Asian or European, or if your ancestors arrived here on the Mayflower or on slave ships. The only identity I care about, the only one this school will recognize, is your Individual identity -- your character, your scholarship, your humanity. And the only national identity this school will care about is American.

This is an American public school, and American public schools were created to make better Americans. If you wish to affirm an ethnic, racial or religious identity through school, you will have to go elsewhere. We will end all ethnicity-, race- and non-American nationality-based celebrations. They undermine the motto of America, one of its three central values -- e pluribus unum, "from many, one." And this school will be guided by America's values.

This includes all after-school clubs. I will not authorize clubs that divide students based on any identities. This includes race, language, religion, sexual orientation or whatever else may become in vogue in a society divided by political correctness.

Your clubs will be based on interests and passions, not blood, ethnic, racial or other physically defined ties. Those clubs just cultivate narcissism -- an unhealthy preoccupation with the self -- while the purpose of education is to get you to think beyond yourself. So we will have clubs that transport you to the wonders and glories of art, music, astronomy, languages you do not already speak, carpentry and more. If the only extracurricular activities you can imagine being interesting in are those based on ethnic, racial or sexual identity, that means that little outside of yourself really interests you.

>**Second**, I am uninterested in whether English is your native language. My only interest in terms of language is that you leave this school speaking and writing English as fluently as possible. The English language has united America's citizens for over 200 years, and it will unite us at this school. It is one of the indispensable reasons this country of immigrants has always come to be one country. And if you leave this school without excellent English language skills, I would be remiss in my duty to ensure that you will be prepared to successfully compete in the American job market. We will learn other Languages here -- it is deplorable that most Americans only speak English -- but if you want classes taught in your native language rather than in English, this is not your school.

>**Third**, because I regard learning as a sacred endeavor, everything in this school will reflect learning's elevated status. This means, among other things, that you and your teachers will dress accordingly. Many people in our society dress more formally for Hollywood events than for church or school. These people have their priorities backward. Therefore, there will be a formal dress code at this school.

>**Fourth**, no obscene language will be tolerated anywhere on this school's

property -- whether in class, in the hallways or at athletic events. If you > can't speak without using the f-word, you can't speak. By obscene language I mean the words banned by the Federal Communications Commission, plus epithets such as "Nigger," even when used by one black student to address another black, or "bitch," even when addressed by a girl to a girlfriend. It is my intent that by the time you leave this school, you will be among the few your age to instinctively distinguish between the elevated and the degraded, the holy and the obscene.

> **Fifth**, we will end all self-esteem programs. In this school, self-esteem will be attained in only one way -- the way people attained it until decided otherwise a generation ago by earning it. One immediate consequence is that there will be one valedictorian, not eight.

> **Sixth**, and last, I am reorienting the school toward academics and away from politics and propaganda. No more time will be devoted to scaring you about smoking and caffeine, or terrifying you about sexual harassment or global warming. No more semesters will be devoted to condom wearing and teaching you to regard sexual relations as only or primarily a health issue. There will be no more attempts to convince you that you are a victim because you are not white, or not male, or not heterosexual or not Christian. We will have failed if any one of you graduates this school and does not consider him or herself inordinately lucky -- to be alive and to be an American.

Now, please stand and join me in the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of our country. As many of you do not know the words, your teachers will hand them out to you."

20. Listen to a tape while driving that can help improve your quality of life.


21. Write down thoughts and inspirations.
