HISTORY OF FLAG DAY

Flag Day is June 14

Flag Day is a celebration of the adoption of the American flag by Continental Congress in the First Flag Resolution of June 14, 1777. Although the 200-year anniversary of this date was celebrated by flying flags on public buildings and holding remembrances in several cities, Flag Day wasn't officially recognized until President Harry Truman signed it into law in 1949.

Bernard J. Cigrand, known to the general public as the "Father of Flag Day," worked as a school teacher at Stony Hill School in Waubeka, Wisconsin. He held the first unofficial observance for Flag Day at that school in 1885, and today a bust of Cigrand stands in Waubeka at the National Flag Day Americanism Center.

Cigrand delivered speeches around the country about patriotism and holding an observance for the flag on June 14. He later became the president of the American Flag Day Association and the National Flag Day Society. He continued to promote his cause with backing from those organizations. According to amateur historian James L. Brown who wrote the booklet, "The Real Bernard J. Cigrand: Father of Flag Day," Cigrand once claimed he had given 2,188 speeches on the flag and patriotism. The Chicago Tribune noted that Cigrand "almost single-handedly" established Flag Day.

Although Cigrand is perhaps the most recognized candidate, several others have also claimed to be founders of Flag Day. In 1889 the principal of a free kindergarten, George Bolch, celebrated the anniversary of the Flag resolution at his New York City school. Soon the State Board of Education of New York, the Betsy Ross House in Philadelphia and the New York Society of the Sons of the Revolution celebrated Flag Day too.

In 1893 Elizabeth Duane Gillespie, a descendant of Benjamin Franklin and the president of the Colonial Dames of Pennsylvania, attempted to have a resolution passed deeming June 14 as Flag Day. That same year the Colonial Dames of Pennsylvania were responsible for a resolution passed requiring the American flag to be displayed on all Philadelphia's public buildings. In 1937 Pennsylvania was the first state to make Flag Day a legal holiday.

After much persistence and the support of many individuals, organizations, mayors, governors and five presidents, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation requesting that June 14 become National Flag Day. In 1927 President Coolidge issued a second proclamation, and finally in 1949 Congress approved it and it became a law.

Soon after Flag Day became official, another law passed requiring the state superintendent of public schools to make sure patriotic holidays like Memorial Day, Flag Day, Lincoln's birthday and Washington's Birthday are observed in schools.

WINSLOW TREE BOARD: NEW TREES ALONG NORTH ENTRANCE TO CITY

At each of the main entrances into the city limits of Winslow, one can see signs acknowledging our having been awarded the status of Tree City USA three years ago. This involves a Tree Board of citizens (Mayor Dwyer, Dave Leisure, and Ken Stout) that plans projects for our public areas during the year to preserve and protect our trees, and to plant and promote trees native to our area of the Ozarks.



The city's Tree Board sponsors the Winslow Arbor Day celebration each March, which includes the Mayor's Arbor Day Proclamation and a giving away of native tree and shrub saplings by a tree expert, usually provided by the Beaver Watershed Alliance.

Two of the projects that the Winslow Tree Board initiated, approved, funded, and planted in 2018 are native trees to beautify the north entrance to Winslow. They consist of the three sycamores lining the green space between the Winslow Ballpark parking lot and the highway, and, a little south, the seven dwarf red buckeye trees in the front lawn of the Dollar General Store, at its north corner, entry, and south corner.

The proposal to plant trees in front of the Dollar General Store took from March to November of last year to accomplish. The Tree Board went from builder to contractor to regional staff, and finally to the headquarters to get permission to plant these trees last November. Their administration said that this may have been the only time that a community has planted trees at one of their stores. The cost to the city of both the Ball Park sycamores and the Dollar General red buckeyes—both of which are native to our area—totaled about \$1000. The labor was free.

A "DOWNTOWN DUMPSTERS" EVENT A SUCCESS

They were clearly eager to get rid of stuff. It had been advertised on the water bills and posted around town. Folks were ready.

The dumpsters from Boston Mtn. Solid Waste were delivered two days early. Magically, people arrived right away with loaded cars and trucks and by Saturday, May 25--the first of the two-day Cleanup event in Peek's Park—they had already filled one of two enormous dumpsters!

Saturday morning, trucks were lined up all the way out to the road. Some volunteers actually climbed inside the dumpsters, repacking the first one more snugly to accommodate more things, while other volunteers were either helping folks unload couches, hot tubs, bricks, lumber, etc. or actually going to their houses to pick up loads.

By Sunday morning, each dumpster was full to the rim, so there was little left to do but post "FULL" signs.

The "Downtown Dumpsters" event was sponsored by the Winslow Community Development Council and was intended mainly for residents outside the city limits because folks within Winslow had already had their trash removed in the annual Trash Away curbside pick up on May 15 through 18, which is sponsored by the City of Winslow. But now it was time that folks outside the city, who comprise most of our First Saturday Recycling crowd, and who contribute a lot to the richness of living here, be served.

From Mayor Chuck Dwyer: "Thanks to all for making this a success, even when things didn't go exactly as planned. We weren't able to answer everyone's prayers, but we changed course, adapted and still were able to pull off a very successful campaign. Let's take what we learned, discuss and apply this to next year's effort."

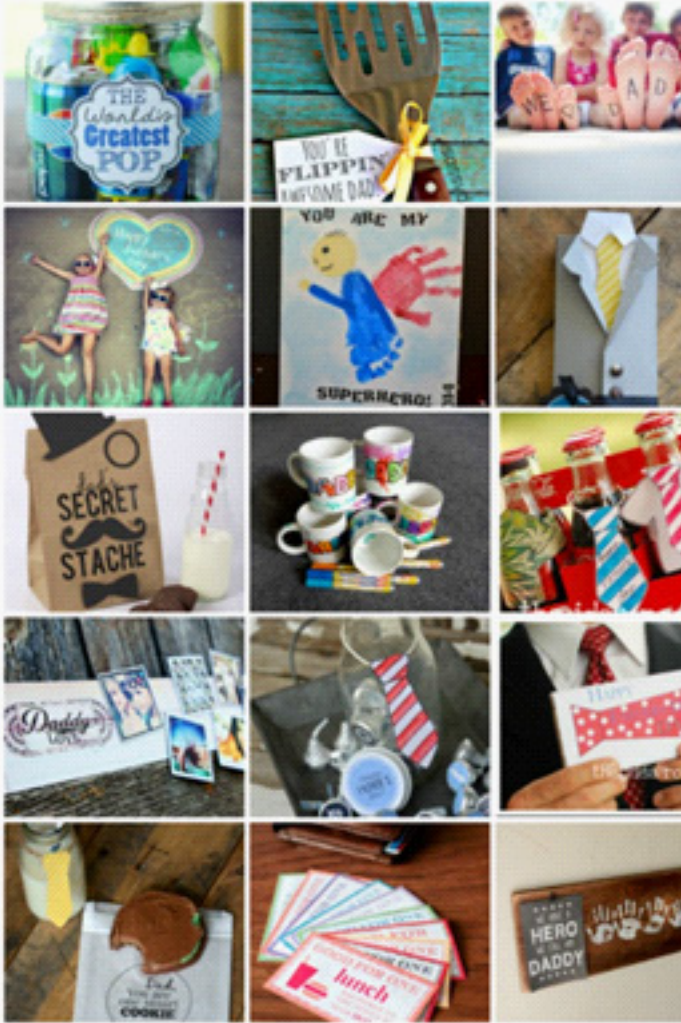
Dawn Larsen Concert

Ozark Folkways is a nonprofit organization dedicated to the preservation, development, instruction, and celebration of regional arts, crafts, and music.

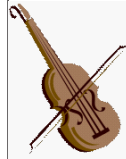

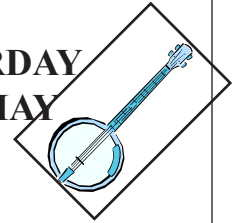

FOLLOWING CHRIST

"Then Jesus said... 'If anyone wishes to come after Me, he must deny himself, and take up his cross and follow Me.'" (Matthew 16.24.)

In no uncertain terms, Jesus set forth the terms of discipleship to His would-be followers. Following Christ is no haphazard, half-hearted, spur-of-the-moment undertaking. Christ demands an all-inclusive, wholehearted, full-souled commitment from His followers. A real follower of Christ must commit in the following ways:

Conscious Commitment. It is impossible to be an accidental follower of Jesus. One who would follow the Lord must make a conscious decision to do so. Jesus, Himself, cautioned us to count the cost — know what is involved — be aware of what we are doing when we make the decision to follow Him. (Matthew 8.19-20.)

Complete Commitment. Jesus taught that we are not fit to follow Him until we are ready to make an unreserved commitment. Personal considerations, friends, or family must be subordinated to our primary responsibility of total devotion to the Christ. The Master minced no words when He said, "No man having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the Kingdom of God." (Luke 9.62.)

Continuing Commitment. Luke's account of Christ's announcement of the terms of discipleship adds one extremely important and significant word to Matthew's account. Luke notes that Jesus emphasized that one who would be a follower must "take up his cross daily, and follow Jesus." (Luke 9.23.) It is not enough to be Sunday morning followers of Jesus. He insists on daily commitment! We must follow Him a all times and under all conditions!

John E. Bode has well summed up the demands of daily discipleship in the words of a song which say:

*O Jesus I have promised
To serve Thee to the end;
Be Thou forever near me,
My Master and my friend!*
