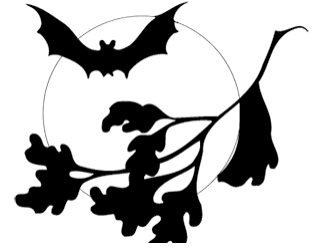

WINSLOW MASTER GARDENER PROJECT: SLIDE PRESENTATION TO WASHINGTON COUNTY MASTER GARDENERS MEETING

Beginning in 2015, the Winslow gardens received “sanctioned project” status from the Washington County Master Gardeners. With that title, an open invitation was sent to all master gardeners in the county for their assistance.

On September 3, Donna Phipps Stout presented an overview of gardening activities that have been held in Winslow over the last year.

Included were slides of the following seven projects maintained in here:

- Planters in front of City Hall, Winslow Museum, and the Mercantile
- Train pavilion plantings
- Two stone planters in Peek’s Park
- “Riparian” (ie, streamside erosion-control) plantings in Peek’s Park
- Welcome Rock garden at the corner of Hwy. 74 (Winslow Blvd.) and Hwy. 71
- Larry Jarnagan memorial at the ball field
- Rain garden at the ball field pavilion

Also shown were photos of the rain garden workshop at the Winslow School on May 23.

The Winslow Gardens could use the help and interest of folks in Winslow, but no one is expected to come every time. It’s also an opportunity for people to learn more about gardening. They meet downtown near city hall at 8 to 9:30 am each Monday, through October, and pick up again in early spring.

Thoroughly seeking definitive answers, I searched the Internet for any and all “extractions” in Northwestern Arkansas concerning any gold efforts. Little information was available and I could not find the “Wynn – Winn Creek” extractions several years ago, nor the “Lee Creek” effort. I do so realize that certain arrangements may never be found, and may be listed as “secretive priorities” at best. I also realize that something of interest can be established in but a few hours, especially at night and by dawn area will appear as if no one was ever present in the area of concern, as if not ever disturbed.

Fly-Fishing was one of my “extreme hobbies” – boat or not. It carried me to places of special interest as did scuba-diving. Adventure was merely a huge part of my life once upon a time. I lived life to its fullest, in my younger years! The Buffalo River, the Colorado, the White, the Red were but a few places I explored and fished. Alaska was enticing to me in various ways, including hunting and fishing. Canada and Mexico were also intriguing. Even by the 1980’s British Columbia had parts unknown to man, and offered opportunities of special interests.

There are states that are “gold-friendly”, but Arkansas is not one of them as such. It has been stated that there’s just not that much gold here, anywhere in the state. It’s also an “Environmental Protective” type of atmosphere. That does so make a difference. In the states that allow claims, there are various rules and regulations for all of the states involved. 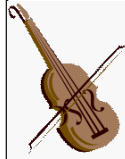

Which is precisely what you should do. Unless, of course, your passion is serial killing.
