

#### FRIDAY, MAY 4

9:00 – 9:30 a.m. LET'S GO BIRDING! Devil's Den State Park is home to many different kinds of birds from vultures to Carolina wrens. Meet Park Interpreter Mystina to go on a birding stroll to look for the many birds in the park. Please bring binoculars and birding field guides if you have them. Meet at the Lake Trailhead in the picnic area near the Hwy 170 Bridge.

6:00-8 p.m. EVENING HIKE ON DEVIL'S DEN Join Park Interpreter Terry for an evening hike along the Devil's Den Trail. We will see some of the evening critters as they start to wake up, historical home sites, and natural formations on this 1.5 mile moderately strenuous hike. The students will have specific acoustic equipment that will allow us to not only hear the echolocation sounds but we'll identify what species of bats we are hearing. 6:00-6:30 p.m. BATS: SKILLED IN THE DARKNESS Bats are not blind, but how are they able to live in the dark? Meet Park Interpreter Mystina for a few activities to discover just how skilled bats are in the darkness as they find their food and their babies. Meet in the Visitor Center Audio-Visual Room.

9:30 p.m. BAT NETTING RESEARCH Join Dr. Tom Risch and his graduate students as they mist net for bats to learn more about what species inhabit the park and how they are doing. This very special program will give you an up close look at the bats of Devil's Den State Park. The meeting place will be announced at Dr. Risch's earlier talk or check with park staff.

Please know that Dr. Risch and his students are trained professionals with proper permits for sampling bats for scientific data. Do not tamper with their nets or try to handle a live bat. They will answer your questions about this very fascinating mode of study.



#### The Feather Pillow

Romans 3:13 Their throat is an open sepulchre; with their tongues they have used deceit; the poison of asps is under their lips: James 1:26 If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain. James 3:5 Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth! James 3:6 And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell. James 3:8 But the tongue can no man tame; it is an unruly evil, full of deadly poison. Gossip and the Waging Tongue has destroyed many many lives and human nature. The best example is demonstrated in the story of the feather pillow. On a windy day, a housewife intending to change the feathers in her pillow took the pillow to an upstairs window; opened one end of the pillow and shook it outside the window. This gossip/tongue wagging is more prevalent among Church members than outside the Church. This ought not to be. There will be a Judgment day and you will be there to answer for "Your" own personal actions.

#### **GUN-BARREL CHRISTIANS**

An old, and wise preacher once remarked: "Some church members are just as straight as a gun barrel — and just as hard and cold as a gun barrel, too!" Sadly, that is not such an isolated condition. In fact, honesty compels us to admit that most of us, in certain situations, are guilty of a "gun barrel" mentality. We need to be reminded, from time to time, of the following...

1) We Must Be Doctrinally And Morally Straight. Moral and doctrinal correctness are indispensable elements of Christian living. There is "right" and "wrong" and God's people must seek the right and shun the wrong. We must be concerned about doctrinal truth because Jesus said: "...you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." (John 8.32.) Truth is there; it may be known; it alone provides a way to freedom and God. It is also important for us to be morally correct because God insists: "You shall be holy, for I am holy." (1 Peter 1.16.) The Bible also commands: "Only conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ..." (Philippians 1.27.) God's standards are never optional. We must strive to be models of soundness, decency and righteousness.

2) We Must Not Let Commitment To Moral And Doctrinal Integrity Make Us Hard, Or Mean, Or "Holier-Than-Thou." This can often be a problem with the best people on earth. We can pride ourselves on being "gun barrel straight" without realizing that we have also become "gun barrel" hard. We may be able to give the right answers doctrinally and still have the wrong kind of hearts. We may allow our concern for personal holiness to degenerate into a "Pharisee" mentality.

Genuine Christianity never makes a person anything but tenderhearted! (*Ephesians 4.32; 1 Peter 3.8.*) Doctrinally, we must learn to "...speak the truth in love." (*Ephesians 4.15.*) Morally, we must learn to hate sin while loving sinners. (*Jude 22, 23.*) We must not only live by truth, decency and fairness; we must also consider what is merciful, generous and kind. To be cold, unforgiving and hard is to miss the whole emphasis of the gospel!

The point is: You can't measure a Christian life with just a plumb line. You also have to consider largeness of heart, depth of humility, and breadth of compassion. Because, after all, it is entirely possible to be just as straight as a gun barrel and just as hard... cold... and empty...!


