On the bright sunny morning of Friday, October 24th, three Winslow 4-Her's took five Nigerian Dwarf does to Fayetteville. But, this wasn't a show... More like show-and-tell. Sagely, Sierra,

and Sicily Burnett, along with their mother, 4-H main leader Shannon Burnett, participated in a workshop at Walker Stone House. This dairy goat workshop was held for adults who want to start milking, and raising Nigerian Dwarfs, who along with Pygmies are the only breed allowed to be kept inside the city limits of Fayetteville. There were fifteen people attending, and it was organized be Linda Coffey of Prairie Grove, AR.



The five Nigerians the 4-Her's brought were used for a hands-on learning experience. The girls and Mrs. Coffey showed the participants how to handle, and the actual size of these Dwarf goats. Some of the topics in this workshop were:

- - Nutrition during lactation as well as when dry (not milking), hay quality showing examples of Bermuda, Alfalfa, Orchard grass.
 - Breeding and gestation
 - Kidding
 - Vaccinations
 - General care such as grooming, hoof trimming, udder care, and milking
 - Deworming and basic idea of how to use FAMANCHA system

My favorite part of this workshop was being able to share my knowledge of my goats with people

new to this business. Learning from each others mistakes, helps us make less mistakes. I got to meet new people, and make connections that without workshops like this would be impossible.
