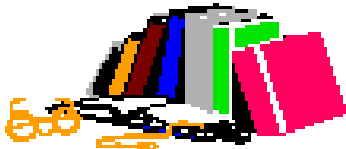

Winslow Library was a busy place in July.

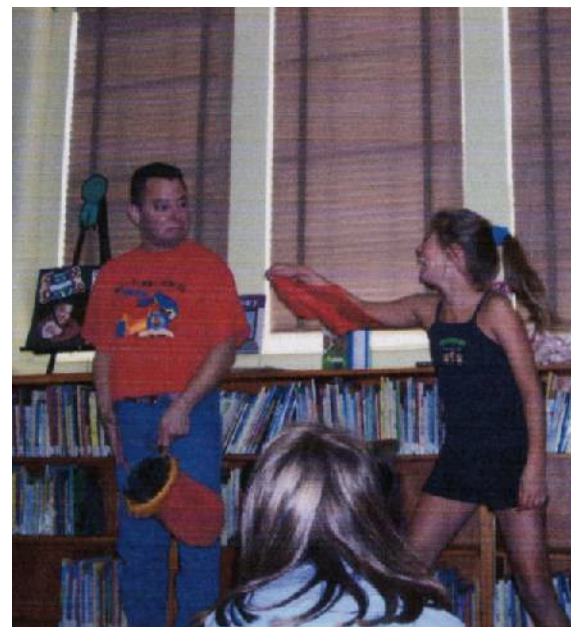
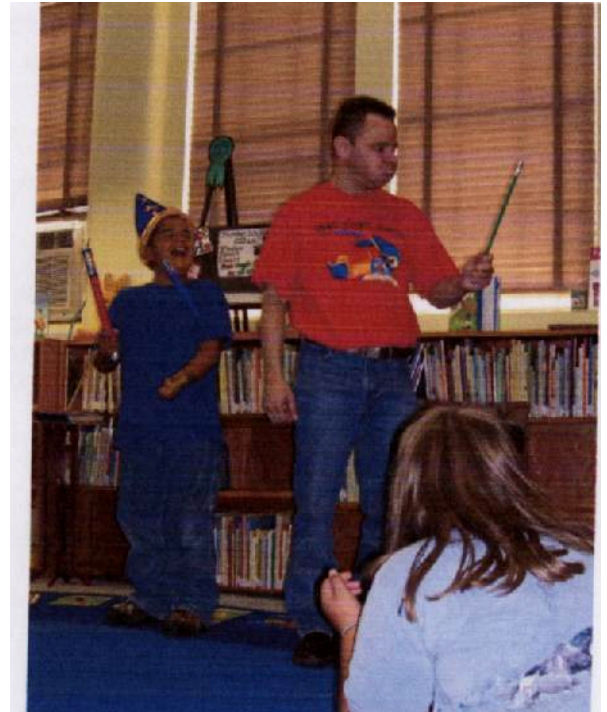

# MASTER GARDENER

Now, that was a heat wave! I mercifully forget from one summer to the next just how hot and dry it can get in Arkansas. Our two bird baths had thirsty birds on them almost non-stop. The hummingbirds were drinking heavily, and our cats lived in front of the air-conditioner. For plants in hot weather, mulch is the secret. Just about everything needs mulch and just about anything will work as mulch. I'm glad that my favorite flower – the tall-bearded iris – does not need mulch. This summer I built three more large iris beds and have ordered 62 new rhizomes from Schreiner's, Cooley's, Mid-America, and Hearthstone-Legacy, all reputable, reliable iris farms. It is my hope that I'll be able to take some of the iris rhizomes down to the Farmer's Market to share with other iris fanciers next time I divide them. Although iris have a limited bloom period, it's easy to interplant zinnias, marigolds, and verbena, nasturtiums, and cosmos among the irises. These are also annuals that attract butterflies and have the advantage of having the same growing conditions as irises, i.e., full sun, low moisture, lots of heat. Just be sure to leave enough space around the individual irises to allow air circulation to avoid leaf spot and soft rot. Most of these flowers kick in about the time the irises are on the wane. I've also ordered 300 more Dutch irises, some of which you may have noticed down at the Winslow welcome rock this past spring. This is another beautiful, sturdy plant that blooms earlier than the tall-bearded irises and provides a most welcome notice that spring is on the way. Keep an eye out for Dutch irises next spring – they are going to be all over the place. The Master Gardener's of Winslow will be doing a fall planting in a very few weeks.

I've found that ordering bulbs and iris rhizomes online is a great cure for insomnia especially between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 4:00 a.m. when my husband is fast asleep and totally unaware of my clandestine investments. Planting all of these bulbs is also great exercise and another natural cure for insomnia. Weeding works, too, but that's a whole lot like hard work. Building the iris beds is

another great gardening exercise. A helpful hint about building flower beds – It is now possible for Washington county residents to buy compost from Fayetteville. For twenty bucks I bought a pick-up load, about one cubic yard, of gorgeous compost. For tall-bearded iris soil, I mix equal parts of topsoil, compost, and creek sand. I like creek sand because it's coarser and keeps the soil from compacting, and because it's cheaper.

Speaking of butterflies--- we had a wonderful time at the Tulsa Zoo with our grand-daughter, age 11, and our grandson, age 15, a couple of weeks ago. We went to a special exhibit called the Butterfly Experience. In an enclosed area there were hundreds of butterflies and a special "nursery" exhibit where we could watch the butterflies emerge from their chrysalises. I took note of some of the plants that attract butterflies. In addition to the ones mentioned above; salvia, lizard tail, and pentas provide food. Milkweed, glossy abelia, bittersweet, and butterfly bush (well, duh!) are also great favorites of all sorts of winged creatures. Our grand-daughter, Sophie, is from Salem, Oregon. She had a hard time believing that Winslow is actually a city. She didn't think there could possibly be 392 people in a town that "doesn't even have a store!" And she's not used to deer tromping through the yard – that's something that happens "in the country". We passed the Brentwood Cemetery and I tried an old joke on her. I asked her, "How many dead people are in the cemetery?" She said, "I don't know." I told her, "All of them!" Then Sophie said, "Well, that's more people than there are in Winslow!" She was somewhat reassured when I pointed out our post office and City Hall. I'm not quite sure I ever convinced her that we really do live in a city, but she really liked the fact that we are "civilized" enough to have fireworks!

Well, I'm off to pull a few weeds, pick a few tomatoes, watch the butterflies, and enjoy this incredibly beautiful place we live in – the City of Winslow, Sophie!

# THE LINUS PROJECT

Project Linus is a nationwide group of volunteers whose goal is to provide security blankets to children facing substantial distress in their lives. Since 1995 Project Linus Chapters have delivered over 500,000 handmade blankets to facilities and individuals in the U. S. and Canada. Although originally focused on cancer patients, Project Linus has expanded its focus to include any seriously ill or traumatized child ... from children waiting for organ transplants, facing heart surgery, or other traumatizing events in their lives.

Project Linus was inspired by the adorable security blanket toting character from the Peanuts comic and was approved whole-heartedly by Charles Schulz, its creator. RSVP is requesting volunteers for this worthwhile project. Our goal is to complete 100 articles for distribution by the end of the year to go to Children's Hospital in Little Rock, Washington Regional Medical Center in Fayetteville and other sites including shelters, children from infants to 19 years of age who are sick or lost a parent to the war in Iraq or a locally.

Project Linus welcomes blankets of all styles, including quilts, tied comforters, fleece blankets, crocheted or knitted afghans and receiving blankets in child-friendly colors. Blankets must be new, handmade and washable. You don't have to be an expert to create a blanket that is beautiful to a child. Handmade means something not commercially manufactured or purchased. Home sewing machines, knitting machines, etc. are fine. They should be made from new, clean and washable materials in infant, child or teen friendly colors. Remember they should be colorful, cheerful and cuddly. The blanket sizes, measurements approximate, are Baby - 30" x 30"; Child - 40" x 60"; and Teen - 45" x 72".

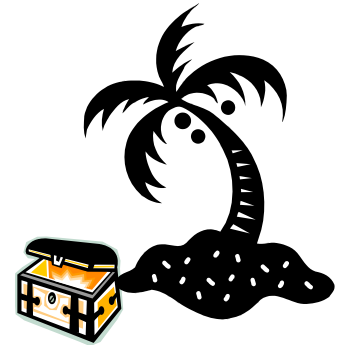
