Before June 1, 2019 – to state your interest.

You will be asked to provide your name, phone number, and a YES or NO answer. The name and number are required to verify there are no duplicate households when information is merged.

As most of you know, the WCCA is in the process of sponsoring a Charter School to open in the fall of 2020 in the former elementary school building. Additionally, we are working to get a pre-school open this fall for 2 ½ to 5 years in the small blue building, behind the Rock Building, that once housed the computer class. Both projects are endeavors with an up-hill climb to coming to fruition, but here's where we stand:

Winslow Community School

- In April we held a town hall meeting, as required by the state. We answered questions from educators and parents. Over 80 people turned out for this event.
- Notices were posted in the Arkansas Democrat Gazette for the three weeks leading up to the town hall.
- Letters were submitted to all the local school districts that will be affected by a Charter School
- An extensive online application was submitted to the State Board of Charter Schools and we are waiting on a decision
- We will travel to Little Rock August 12-13th to present our case before the decision-making board. We encourage parents to "make the trek" with us, as community interest is paramount to the final decision.
- To prepare the facility to show investors, a MAJOR clean out of the elementary building will take place on May 4th beginning at 11 a.m. Lunch and beverages will be provided. Please contact Tanya to volunteer. Cleaning supplies, mops, brooms, buckets, are all needed. If you can't volunteer – lend us a hand with supplies!

Little Squirrels Pre-School

- Pre-school was approved for supplemental tuition funding.
 - Pre-school will open in August
 - Building repairs must be completed before applications for students can be accepted. We'll be working on this from now until we've got everything approved by the State of Arkansas.
 - Fundraisers to raise necessary moneys for upgrades and repair will begin in May.
 - o May 19 @ 1 - 3 PM - Patties and Pies for Preschool fundraiser Hamburgers, corn dogs, chips and drinks plus the all-important "Pie Auction" to raise necessary funds. This event will be in the WCCA Cafeteria. Donations of chips, sodas, buns, etc. are being accepted now. Please contact Tanya Farris or Pam Center.
 - o Watch for additional fundraisers this summer.
- Other activities are still ongoing at the Community Center. Painting with a Purpose as well as Cooking Classes are monthly. Gym hours are still Monday evenings, Tuesday evenings (for men's basketball) and Thursday evening for children and youth. Please remember that Thursdays are not "drop off" service. Children under 10 must be accompanied by a responsible older sibling or an adult. There is no Community Center without U!

Hello Friends! So happy to announce that Winslow will have a preschool this fall on the Winslow School campus! The WCCA is in the process of renovating the old computer lab, the building that is directly behind the rock building. This renovation will include a playground with a wonderful oak tree right in the middle, as well as a sunflower house. Also slated is a Children's Garden with several raised bed gardening areas and a chicken coop for a small flock of hens.

Little Squirrel Preschool will be a state licensed facility that will be able to have 20 students aged 2 ½ to 5 years of age. Arkansas's Child Care Development Fund will help with the cost of the care for those parents whose income qualifies. Children will be taught by a state certified Early Childhood Education teacher and will follow a pre-kindergarten learning curriculum. We will have a preschool "round up" in mid July for those who would like to get pre-qualified for our August 15, 2019 start date. Please mark your calendar for Saturday, August 10, as we will have an Open House for the community to tour the facilities and learn all about what will be offered. Coming on Sunday May 19 at 1 pm, we will have a fundraiser at the Winslow Cafetorium called "Patties and Pies for Preschool!". We will serve burgers, chips and a drink for \$5, plus a pie auction and live music from local musicians. Also available will be a Donation Board where community members can donate to specific needs: such as playground fencing or building interior needs. Questions? "Ory" as he was known to friends and family, lived out his entire life near Hurricane Creek and Bee Branch Holler. In addition to becoming a master mountain deer hunter, he raised chickens and cattle for many years with the help of his son, Eugene. An hour-long interview with Ora Provence was released March 14, 2019, by Bear Hunting Magazine at SportsmanNation.com. Provence

was also featured in a 2012 issue of Arkansas Bear and Buck Journal.

A Little Bit About Quilts Of Valor

When I first heard about Quilts of Valor, years ago, it brought back memories of our family back in Iowa. There were eight of us, two girls and six strapping boys helping Dad on the farm.

Then came World War II. My oldest brother lost his life in the South Pacific. The next oldest was wounded twice in Europe. The next two served in the Korean Conflict as well as the youngest who served there much later. All serving in the US Army.

For the next generation, my nephews and nieces, the two eldest served in Viet Nam. One did 20 years in the US Navy and the other served in the Marines. One served in Desert Storm and one in Guam. One of the nieces served in the Navy and the other in the Air Force.

Quilts of Valor, which is head quartered in Winterset, Iowa, is a National organization of volunteers who honor our military men and women by awarding quilts to honor and thank them for their service to our country.

I believe these volunteers (yes there are men who quilt) are dedicated to making and awarding these quilts. Some work individually and some in groups. The costs of these Masterpieces is directly on the shoulders of these people who donate their time and talents. A little side note here - it takes 4 to 5 yards of material just for the backing, then the batting (middle layer), as well as the quilt top itself. Do you realize a spool of thread can cost up to \$10? A total quilt can easily run between \$200 and \$300.

There are many rules and regulations for making and presenting these beautiful quilts. They must be red, white and blue in nature and formally requested. I have personally requested quilts to be presented to four servicemen and have felt honored to do so.

While Quilts of Valor do not solicit donations or funds, they do welcome them and these donations are given to the quilters to help with the cost of material.

We are unable to present Quilts of Valor to our heroes in heaven. Think about it, how could we make enough quilts to honor all of our heroes who have gone on? While we love them and appreciate all they have given to our country, it just couldn't be done.

Our local representative in this area is Yvonne Fennell and the Winslow Quilts of Valor Circle. In the past years (since Veteran's Day 2017) they have made nearly 20 quilts. A special Thank You to Patty Provence in Mountainburg for quilting the quilts on her long arm machine.

And thank you , Yvonne for all you do to honor our Veterans and keep this great program alive.

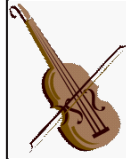

THE ENEMY WITHIN

An old Scottish proverb says: “If there is no foe without, there is always a foe within.” So often in life our greatest enemies are not external ones, but those on the inside! Consider some ways this is true...

1) IN OUR NATION. The last hundred years has witnessed the greatest wars in history. Our national existence has been threatened by a series of enemies: Nazi Fascism, Japanese Imperialism, Soviet Communism, International Terrorism, Islamic Expansionism. With the fall of the Iron Curtain, many felt there was no longer an enemy we need fear. But the truth is that our most frightening enemy is an internal one. The greatest threat to our national security is the festering immorality and internal decay which is eating away at America. The Bible insists: “Righteousness exalts a nation, but sin is a disgrace to any people.” (Proverbs 14.34.)

2) IN THE CHURCH. Where the church is concerned, the most dangerous enemies are usually those on the inside rather than those on the outside. Historically, the church has flourished in the face of external persecution; but it has floundered when attacked by worldliness, division and apathy from within. Jesus complimented the church at Pergamos for standing firm in the face of vicious persecution from without. (Revelation 2.13.) But He warned they were being subverted from within by false doctrine and worldliness. (Revelation 2.13-15.) The external threat had strengthened them, but the internal enemy was destroying them!

3) IN OUR INDIVIDUAL LIVES. There is a daily conflict in every one of us between our best and worst impulses. Often, we are our own worst enemies. Paul writes: “I am not practicing what I would like to do, but I am doing the very thing I hate.” (Romans 7.15.) He found it necessary to constantly war against himself in order to bring himself into subjection lest, after having preached to others, he himself should be a castaway. (1 Corinthians 9.27.) So many lives are torn by lusts and immoral passions; others are twisted by bitterness and hatred; still others are dominated by covetousness and selfishness...

The greatest enemies of life are those which must be conquered within! Thanks be to God that in Christ we “overwhelmingly conquer through Him that loved us.” (Romans 8.37.)
