

There is no limit to the things that can be brought at the beginning of the season before the produce is ready, such as vegetables and plants, sets, seeds, extra plant containers, house plants, mulch, compost, eggs, gardening books or magazines, seed and plant catalogs, recipes, homemade crafts, homemade goodies, favorite gardening tips—anything to trade, sell, or giveaway.

A quick review of the Winslow Farmer's Market basic guidelines is in order to keep everything running smoothly throughout the Market season. There are no rigid rules, bylaws or other forms of formal organization. There are no governing boards nor committee meetings, the produce should be local, home-made or home-grown-- not store bought. Sometimes produce is more plentiful in other areas of Washington County -- corn, peaches, blackberries, apples, strawberries, etc.—and it's great to buy in large quantities for resale at the Winslow Market. There are no reserved vendor spaces on Market day—first come, first choice. There are no fees or dues. The Market is not in competition with swap meets, garage sales, bake sales, recycling or other community events/fundraisers. We aren't trying to make a fortune at the Market, but the Farmer's Market is meant to reflect the values of the Winslow community:

Friendliness, Fairness, and Fun!



Quilt Of The Month Turtle Creek

Finished Size: Block: 12 Blocks, 12" square

Quilt: 48" x 63"

Materials

1 3/8 yds Blue Print Fabric

1 1/4 yds each blue solid, & dark green print fabric

3/4 yds yellow print fabric (includes binding)

5/8 yd light green print or striped fabric

1/2 yd brown solid fabric

3 yds backing fabric

1 skein of yellow embroidery floss

Cutting:

1. Make templates of patterns A,B,D,E,F,AND H. Mark horizontal placement lines on template F.

2. From Brown Fabric, Cut 12 A, 12 D and 48 E.

3. Cut 6 (2 1/2"x42") strips of yellow print for binding. From remaining yellow print fabric, cut 20 (3 1/2") sashing squares

4. Cut 7 (1 7/8" x 43") strips of light green fabric

5. From dark green fabric, cut 14 (2 3/8" x 43") strips.

6. From solid blue fabric, cut 2 (5 1/4" x 42") Strips. From these, cut 24 (2 1/2" x 5 1/4") C pieces.

7. Cut 6 (2"x42") blue strips. From these, cut 24 (2" x 9 1/2") G Pieces.

From remaining solid blue fabric, cut 24 B, 96 D, 12 H, and 12 H reversed.

9. Cut blue print fabric into 11 (3 1/2" x 42") strips. From these, cut 31 (3 1/2" x 12 1/2") sashing strips.

Piecing:

Section 1: Join a blue B to each diagonal edge of an A. Press seam allowances toward A. Referring to Block Assembly diagram, join a C to both sides of AB unit. Press seam allowances toward Cs.

Section 2. Join a dark green strip to both sides of each light green strip. Press seam allowances toward bottom of each pieced strip.

Position Template F on 1 strip, aligning placement lines on template with seam lines. (The template's top point should meet 1 edge of the strip and bottom of template will be approximately 3/4" from opposite edge.) Mark and cut 1 F. Rotate template so its point is at opposite fabric edge aligning placement lines and diagonal edges of template and fabric. Continue cutting pieces as shown to make 48 Fs.

Join a blue D triangle to both straight sides of an E. Press seam allowances toward E. Make 48 DE units.

Sew bottom of each F unit to diagonal edge of a DE unit, making a square. Press seam allowances toward F.

Join 2 DEF squares, selecting pairs with opposing seam allowances. Press center seam allowances to 1 side. Join 2 pair to make 12 units.

Add G strips to both sides of DEF unit to complete section.

Section 3

Sew a brown D triangle between an H and an H reversed piece, as shown in Block Assembly diagram. Press seam allowances toward H Pieces.

Assembly: Join sections 1, 2, and 3 as shown in Block Assembly diagram. Make 12 Turtle blocks.

Use 3 strands of embroidery floss to make French knots for turtles' eyes.

Quilt Top Assembly

- Follow Quilt Assembly to arrange blocks in 4 Horizontal rows of 3 blocks each. Join rows with sashing strips between blocks. Add sashing strips between blocks. Add sashing strips to ends of rows. Press seam allowances toward sashing.
- Make 5 rows of horizontal sashing, joining 4 yellow squares and 3 sashing strips in each row. Press seam allowances toward sashing.
- Join rows, alternating sashing rows and block rows as shown.

Quilting and Finishing

Outline-quilt patchwork. Quilt sashing as desired.





AVOID THE EDGE

A story is told of a very wealthy gentleman who lived in a palatial mansion, on a high mountain, overlooking the surrounding valleys. The only problem was that reaching his gorgeous manor house required traveling along a very narrow winding road with a steep mountain slope on one side and sheer drop off on the other. Due to the early retirement of his current chauffeur, he placed an ad in his local paper for a new limousine driver. When he conducted the interviews, he asked each person one very important question, “How close can you safely drive along the edge of my winding road?” The first prospect responded, “Sir, I can drive within two feet of the edge and feel perfectly safe.” The second individual answered, “Sir, I can drive within twelve inches of the edge and you will be safe and sound.” The third person replied, “For your protection, Sir, I guarantee I will drive as far away as is possible from that edge and keep you and your family out of harms way.” The last applicant became the new driver.

What about you? Are you living too close to the Edge? The remedy for living on the financial Edge is very simple: Just move away! Not two feet, not



twelve inches, but as far away as possible. One thing that puts distance between you and your family and the Edge is a *Freedom Fund*. Some people call it a Contingency Account; others call it an Emergency Account. However or whatever you name this account or fund, it is for one important purpose — to save your financial skin when unexpected, unforeseen, and unanticipated expenses hit you broadside and threaten to push you over the Edge. The *Freedom Fund* is your personal debt insurance and the best alternative to using plastic.

Why do you need it?

There are a number of reasons to have this rainy day *Freedom Fund*. First, scripture admonishes us to do so: "The wise man saves for the future, but the foolish man spends whatever he gets" (Proverbs 21:20 TLB). Secondly, Ellen White reminds us that "every week a portion of your wages should be reserved and in no case touched unless suffering actual want" (2SM, 329). Finally,



care and motor vehicles.

How to fund it?

Instead of borrowing for these financial crises, begin

putting money regularly into your *Freedom Fund*. Set a goal of \$25 per week or \$50 each payday until your *Freedom Fund* is fully invested. If you have trouble getting started, why not have a garage sale? You will be happily surprised that in one morning you may have as much as \$300 to \$500 as your first deposit.

How to maintain it?

Once you begin to save for your *Freedom Fund*, you may be tempted to start seeing it as part of your long term investments—it is NOT; it is simply money that is available for unforeseen financial emergencies. Here are the ABC's of this fund:

Availability—Because life's emergencies take us by surprise, your *Freedom Fund* must be in liquid cash. It needs to be in a bank or credit union account where you can get your hands on it immediately or, at the most, within twenty-four hours.

Be Safe—Unlike the stock market or mutual funds, your



Freedom Fund needs to be where its principal has no risk. Saving accounts are the safest, but they currently pay little to nothing in interest. One of the best places

to put this money is in a certificate of deposit (CD). A CD will pay more interest than a bank savings account but you are required to put it in for a set time period, such as 60 days, 90 days, or 1-5 years. If you must make an early withdrawal from your CD for an unanticipated emergency, the worst that will happen is that you will lose your interest for that period.

Continual Growth—

Because you will need your *Freedom Fund* for a lifetime, as a good steward you will always be on the lookout for places to put this money with the best compounding interest, yet still meeting the other two requirements.

Final words

Remember, no matter the crisis, even if you are up to your eyeballs in debt, YOU MUST
