DYSLEXIA

Simple Home Screening Test

An often overlooked cause of learning disability in children and adults is a failure to organize right and left hemispheres of the brain. That happens when infants don't go through the normal crawling phase of development. Crawling is necessary for the neural patterning that normal development demands. Then neural organization will continue to the next stage of the child pulling up to a standing position when she/he is ready. Children should not be forced to stand or walk.

To home test, parents should watch to see if the "cross-crawl" pattern is used when their small children and their older children walk. What is a normal cross-crawl pattern? If the left leg and the right arm swing forward together, followed by the right leg and the left arm swinging forward together, it's normal.

If that pattern is not fully present, it means a poor cross-crawl pattern and indicates some level of diminished neural organization, resulting in some level, mild or severe, of confusion in brain/body function. When serious, it is known as Dyslexia.
