"The Great Kudzu Kill"

On December 10, from 10 AM to 2 PM, twenty-three volunteers from around Washington County descended on the hill above Winslow's Tunnel Park to help with the second stage of eradicating kudzu by digging up and disposing of the crowns of the plant.

Kudzu is an invasive plant that is "eating up" swatches of forest in the south. It is the killer "topiary" covering a lot of Artists' Point on Mt. Gaylor. It grows (some say as much as 12" a day) across land and over trees, killing them as it spreads.

Last August, Winslow—through the Winslow Community Development Council--received a grant from Beaver Watershed Alliance (from funding through the Arkansas Forestry Commission) which, in part, hired an arborist to take down the kudzu vines and a dozen trees the vines had killed on the hill over Tunnel Park off Main Street, just up from City Hall.

The second stage of this war on kudzu was on

December 10, underwritten by Beaver Watershed Alliance and supervised by Jennifer Ogle, Program Coordinator of BWA. A lunch of delicious pizza, supplied by Glenn Jorgensen of Sky Vue Cabins, was served at City Hall, after which volunteers returned to the hill to cover bare earth with leaves and branches to prevent erosion.

The volunteers included several from Winslow: Amy and Dave Leisure, Mary and Steve Anderson, Jim Taylor, Donna Stout, Rob

Seal, organizer Ken Stout, and Mayor Randy Jarnagan.

The next battle in the kudzu war in Tunnel Park will likely be in March and will involve eradicating the kudzu crowns and shoots which were inevitably missed, and to set in native trees and shrubs to curb erosion.

Stay tuned to Within Winslow to join the coming battle and to learn how to remove invasive plants (like privet and honeysuckle) from your own property and replace them with plants that are native and far more beneficial to insects, birds, and animals in our area.
