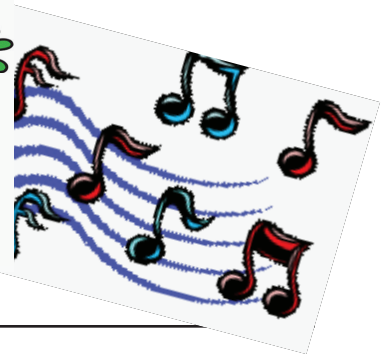

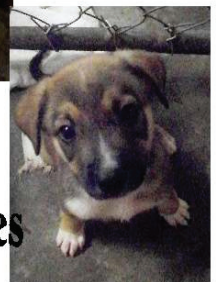

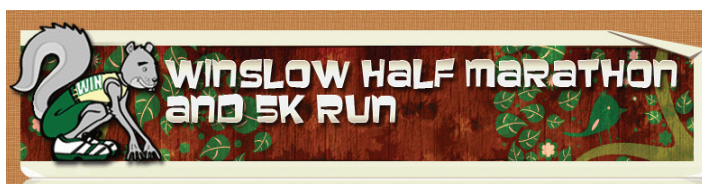

The Winslow Half Marathon & 5K Run Saturday September 17th, 2011

The Winslow Half Marathon will start as close to 8 a.m. as possible. Runners will come out of the main gate of the former Winslow schools on U.S. 71 and immediately turn left onto School Street. The 5K will start 10 minutes after the Half Marathon and follow the same course. There will be approximately 150 runners.

Runners will continue along School Street and turn left onto Main Street. School Street should be clear of runners within thirty minutes of the start.

From Main Street the runners will turn right onto Van Buren. Some of these runners will be very fast and will be at this point within a few minutes after the start. Within forty-five minutes, Van Buren to Center Street should be clear of most runners.

Runners will continue along Van Buren to Bunyard Road. There will be runners on this part of Van Buren and Bunyard Road from just after 8 a.m. until close to noon.

There will be runners on Center Street from about 8.30 a.m. until noon.

The finish line will be in downtown Winslow by Peeks Park. There will be spectators, vendors and runners in this area throughout Saturday morning, September 17.

By participating, the runners will be contributing financially to local organizations that benefit Winslow and the surrounding area. To thank them and to keep our community and the runners as safe as possible, the Winslow Community Development Council is asking residents to:

Please avoid driving on the course, if at all possible. If you can, leave home before 8 a.m. or wait until after noon on Saturday, September 17.

If the runners are passing your house, come out and cheer them on.

And finally, sign up and join the race or volunteer to help. Come run or help stage the race in the morning, and enjoy the music at Winfest that afternoon and night.

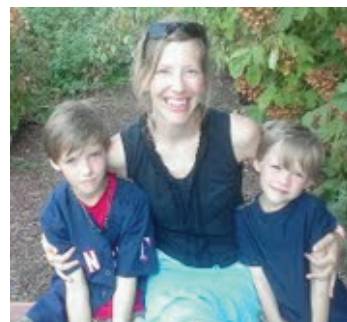
HIPPY News for September

“What’s Happening on the Mountain?”

“If the rope breaks nine times, we must splice it together a tenth time.”
-Tibetan proverb

“And why must we splice it together a tenth time? Because, even if ultimately we do fail, at least we will have no feelings of regret.”

Yes, we are building a stage on the grounds of Ozark Folkways. The Washington County Observer printed a drawing of the stage last week. The original idea for the stage came to John James and his wife Lisa this past May at our Heritage Day celebration, while Fred Derwin drafted the detailed design and drawings. It is a beautiful simple design, isn't it?

The director, that's me, and the Board of Directors at Ozark Folkways have determined that the structure must fit aesthetically on the hill in the woods behind the Ozark Folkways building.

As the W.C.O. stated, we are in the process of raising all the funds needed to build the structure before we actually break ground.

If you would like to get involved, but don't have the time or energy anymore to physically volunteer to “raise the stage,” then why not buy a little piece of the project in honor of or in memory of someone you love?

We are selling “square feet” of the stage for only \$20, so you too can own a place on the Ozark Folkways stage. I'll even set up a microphone so you can sing, preach, or tell jokes to the mountainside for your own 15 minutes of fame when it's complete.

Everyone who gives a donation will get to add a name to the actual structure of the stage.

So why did I include the proverb at the beginning of this article? I included it because I hear there is still some local mumbling about our plans to build a stage at Ozark Folkways.

“Why do we want to build another stage in Winslow, when we have a perfectly good stage built by WinFest, that is under utilized?” “Why do you even need a stage?” Mumble, mumble, mumble . . .

I've been as clear as I know how to be on this issue and I've answered every one who has come to me to tell me of the mumbling, but I'll address it again, in light of the proverb above.

We are working hard to keep Ozark Folkways alive by expanding our programs and offerings to the local and extended community. Our board has set a priority of reaching out to local children, not only during the summer, but also to local home-schooled children throughout the year. I personally love the large stage in Winslow! It is a massive testament to all the local caring individuals who raised the money to build it, because they saw the need to offer a local venue for all kinds of community events. It is fantastic. The WinFest Committee and everyone who raised money for that project and everyone who brought it to fruition by volunteering should be extremely proud.

Now, that being said, I want to point out that by building a small 20' x 30' performance stage behind and on the property of Ozark Folkways, we are in no way under utilizing the larger Winslow stage. Ozark Folkways offers classes year round at the building and this past summer we increased our children's camp offering from one to three camps. With any luck and a lot of community support, that number will increase again next summer. We do not own a mode of transportation for moving children from one location to another, nor would we want to take the risk or liability of doing so.

One of the new camps we offered this summer and will again next is Fiddle Camp. This year we limited the age of participants to children 8-18. Next year we plan to add an additional camp for adults. Having a stage on the property allows us to go from classroom to the performance area easily. It saves time and energy and it's a lot safer than transporting kids. The stage is also a great place for our Yoga on the Mountain folks, to meet and enjoy the woods and mountainside while stretching and exercising.

Ozark Folkways hosts several community events such as Heritage Day in May, First Friday each month and the Fiber Arts Fair in October. All of these events include musical venues that may utilize the new stage.

I, and the board at Ozark Folkways, believe that there is enough space and enough interest in Winslow for at least two stages.

The Ozark Folkways stage will serve the Winslow community and any other local community that is interested in performing or holding classes there. We are very interested in being inclusive and welcoming to other groups that want to share the Ozark native crafts and the local music traditions.

We are going to do this right and you are going to be as proud to see the stage rise up from the side of the mountain as we are.

Within a year, Winslow will not only have a large beautiful performance stage in the park, but also a small beautiful performance stage behind Ozark Folkways where we can all play, learn together and enjoy one other, as we tend to do so well in these parts.

So, if you hear any further mumbling, set the mumblers straight, will you? Let them know that you personally support the good things we are doing and attempting to do and that you believe that the children and adults who come to Ozark Folkways for classes and camps deserve the best we can offer them.

As long as I'm here, and long after I'm gone, Ozark Folkways is going to keep mending and fixing and creating and doing the best we can to serve the local community and beyond . . . and that's just the way it is.

Somali Texans

We finally received some rain, after a long, dry spell and record-breaking heat, which wasn't enough, but we haven't fared too badly. All we have to do is look at Texas.

Sandra and I lived in Robert Lee, Texas for a year after my dad had a stroke, and it's hard for me to believe that the river that runs through there has been a dry bed for three months, and the lake is almost dry, with 90% of their water supply gone. They are in process now of running a pipeline to Bronte, a town 12 miles away, but if the drought continues, they will also be out of water.

Scientists are careful not to say much about it, but they are thinking the drought in Texas may last for a few thousand years. Global warming, or climate change as they are calling it now, is becoming obviously true. The ice is melting in the Arctic allowing ships to travel in places they could never go before. We have experienced weather from one extreme to another. The winters are harsh, and we bake in the summer. It was 18 below in Fayetteville last March, and then about half the summer has been from 102 to 106.

Still, Texas is getting the brunt of it, which was unnoticed because the news agencies were focused on the Mississippi river flooding all spring. But Texas is in serious trouble, especially considering the prospect that the situation isn't going to change except for the possibility of getting worse. What does a town do if there is no water and no way to get any? Head out to Arkansas? It's either that or live on beer.

I suggest we prepare for a storm of refugees, or what I have come to define as Somali Texans. They will be after our water and we can imagine the first thing they will want to do is splash in it. Heaven forbid! Our water companies have enough problems without a hoard of Texans churning up the clear water supply.

The news lately has been nothing but coverage of Hurricane Irene hitting the east coast. Texas has had its share of hurricanes. While living in Houston, we experienced Hurricane Alicia, which blew away part of our roof.

Texans always dreaded hurricanes followed by cursing, crying and complaining, but the situation may be different now. They desperately need the rain that a hurricane would provide.

For the first time in history, Texans may pray for a hurricane!

And Arkansans may pray for anything that keeps an onslaught of Texans from invading our borders.

Winslow's Downtown Treasure

I have always been fascinated by museums. Not the kind with art-work by Monet or Van Gogh, or even the ones that house collections of scientific wonders. I am much more interested in getting to know the history of an area. And the Winslow Museum is just such a place.

Winslow has such a rich history dating back to the early 1800's, when the Indians inhabited the area, and early settlers made their long journeys here to start a new life, to the stagecoach days, continuing on through to the railroad and resort days. In the 1850's, when there were few settlers established in this area, the stagecoach made this route traveling from Missouri to Ft. Smith. In the 1880's the railroad was introduced to the area and the long Winslow Tunnel was completed in 1882. Big business came with the introduction of the rails. The area was filled with men cutting and delivering cross ties by the wagon load. Winslow became a boomtown almost overnight.

It would also soon be discovered that Winslow had a much cooler temperature than the lower elevation of the Arkansas River Valley. That brought many of the wealthy businessmen and their families to vacation, and sometimes even to live, during the hot summer months. Resorts were built throughout the area and the locals rented out extra rooms to accommodate the many visitors. Winslow became one of the most populated areas of the country during the hot summer months of the early 1920's. Winslow was indeed a thriving little community.

All of this wonderful history is recorded and on display at the Winslow Museum located downtown next to City Hall. The museum houses a fantastic diorama of the city, circa 1924, when Winslow was a bustling community. If you have ties to the area, chances are you will find a story or picture of an ancestor. Or, if you are just interested in history, there is plenty of good reading and wonderful displays to enjoy. Barbara Ashbaugh is the very knowledgeable curator who is always happy to answer questions and relay stories of this wonderful historic area. The museum is open Mon-Fri from 9:00 am to 3:00 PM and on Sat 9:00 am to 12:00 PM. For more information please call 479-634-3901

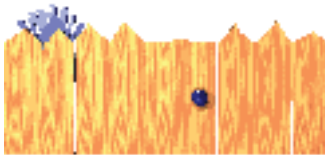

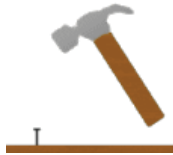
NAIL IN THE FENCE
