Ray Lyons

March 19, 1944 - April 23, 2014

Ray H Lyons, age 70, of West Fork died April 23, 2014 in Fayetteville. He was born March 19, 1944 in Sacramento, California to Lawrence and Aileen (Sargent) Lyons.

Ray was raised a hard worker and at 10 years old he worked for Don Compton at his feed lot in Clay Station, California. He worked like a man already and with his earnings he was proud to be able to buy his own school clothes that year. At the age of 15 he went to Nevada to work on a ranch. There he met a lifelong friend and second father figure Don Bell. These were some of his best years. As a teenager he moved to Winslow, Arkansas to live with his father Lawrence. There he helped his dad log using mules. At age 18, he joined the US Army where he was stationed in Berlin, Germany. After the Army, he spent some time in California before settling in the Winslow area. His one and only "brand new" purchase happened soon after when he saved up his money for a 1965 Pontiac convertible which is still in the family. In 1976, he spent some time in Cody, Wyoming building the rodeo arena there, which is home to the famous Cody Stampede. In 1978, he moved to Oregon where he worked for Coos Trucking and later became a self-employed logger. He would often impress the land owners by making an X in the dirt and falling a tree exactly on the X. He spent over 20 years in Oregon before making his final move to West Fork. Over his lifetime he was involved in the rodeo, mak-

ing his last bull ride at the age of 45. He always had at least one pedigreed Border Collie around that could work a cow herd just by watching his hand signals. He also built from scratch a lumber sawmill that he replicated by memory from the one his dad had. He would often saw lumber to pay rent. He didn't believe in a hand out and always provided for his family. The deer population was thin around our house. Family meant everything to him. He always said to stick together.

He is survived by one son, Anthony Lyons of West Fork, Arkansas; five daughters, Audrey of Germany; Kim Martin and her fiancé Jason of Monroe, Oregon; Laurie Wilson and her husband Dean of Coquille, Oregon; Becky Walton and her husband William of Elmira, Oregon; Stacie Crutchfield and her husband Kyle of Coquille, Oregon; two sisters, Laura Campbell of Coquille, Oregon; Katie Eldredge of Eufaula, Oklahoma; three brothers, Ed Dunning of Rosebud, Arkansas; Larry Lyons of Heber Springs, Arkansas; Rodney Kohnke of Galt, California; eleven grandchildren, A.J., J.R., Spencer, Chloe, Josh, Kailey, Kyndal, Brittney, McKenna, Wayde and Will; one great granddaughter, Brooklyn.

She worked many years for The Oberman Garment Factory and retired as a cafeteria worker from Ramay Junior High School.

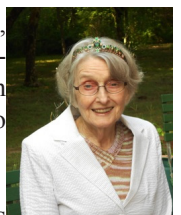

Everyone Loves A Mystery

...or if they don't, they sometimes like other qualities embodied in mysteries. Perhaps they latch on to a character, especially in a mystery series, and decide to follow only because of that character. So it's up to the author to let readers know not only about their mystery, but about the characters contained therein.

.... First, I have to admit that mysteries and detective novels in particular are not my only love when choosing a book to read, those are the ones I decided to pick apart today and try to learn, as a writer, what draws me, as a reader, to specific authors and subjects.

First and foremost, I need a terrific story, but if there are no point of view characters I can relate to, or give a damn about, then I probably won't continue to read, even if I'm intrigued by the story. At any rate, that means that I probably want intriguing characters first. Yet where would they be without a good story? Dithering around, running in circles, with no goal, motivation or conflict, no sense of place, no setting out of the ordinary, no clever internalization to draw me into their inner selves, no back story that defines them. Good writing should be a given. My favorites mentioned above fulfill all these needs and then some. There is that final and mysterious quality of writing known as voice. Can't explain that one, it just is, and you got it or you ain't. And sorry, it isn't something anyone can teach.

A writer once told me that she couldn't write her story with one point of view character because there were too many things going on out of his purview that she had to let the reader in on. Bosh, pish tosh and nonsense. A clever writer can reveal everything the reader needs to know without ever leaving a singular point of view.

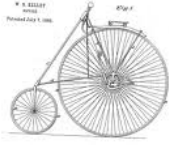

Winslow 4-H Club Cleans St. Stephen's Episcopal Cemetery

The Winslow 4-H Club spent a couple of hours on a Saturday morning in April cleaning the St. Stephen's Episcopal Cemetery in Winslow. The group raked leaves and cleaned up sticks and other debris. Those present were Gauge and Caleb Jorgenson, Sagely, Sicely, and Sierra Burnett, Isaac and Sierra Stansell, Charlotte Donaldson, and Zana Donaldson. Several adults also helped. All of this was done in partnership with the Winslow Museum.

St. Stephen's Episcopal Cemetery is located on Maud Duncan Lane in Winslow. The cemetery is on an acre donated by Dr. and Mrs. Albert Dunlap possibly in the late 1890's. It is now owned and cared for by the City of Winslow. The couple's foster son, J. P. Dunlap and his wife lost twin daughters at their birth. It is most likely at this time the cemetery was set aside for the burial of these babies. They are in an unmarked grave.

Also buried in this cemetery are Dr. Albert Dunlap and his wife Virginia. Dr. Dunlap was one of the original signers of the Incorporation Petition for Winslow in 1905. He practiced medicine in Winslow, gave property for Winslow's first public school, as well as, St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, which was the first recorded church in Winslow. He also gave his home Boston Heights as the Helen Dunlap Memorial School. Dr. Dunlap was a surgeon for the Confederacy. Mrs. Dunlap was known as "the Mother of Winslow" and was a great supporter of woman's suffrage.

Another of Winslow's founders, Fred D. Gregg and his wife Lulu are also buried at St. Stephen's. Gregg was a stagecoach driver for the Wollum Stage Line out of Winslow. The Gregg's baby son is also buried in the cemetery.

The most famous person buried in St. Stephen's Episcopal cemetery is Maud Dunlap Pearce Duncan. Maud was the foster daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Dunlap. She graduated from Cane Hill College at sixteen and began teaching school. She also helped Dr. Dunlap in his practice as he was losing his eyesight. She spent much of her time mixing medicines, when in 1906 she traveled to Hot Springs, AR to take the pharmacy exam. She passed this test and became one of the first licensed woman pharmacists in the state. She married Hallum Pearce and had two daughters, Virginia and Helen. Both girls died during their childhood and are buried in a mausoleum at St. Stephen's. After her marriage was annulled she met and married Gilbert Duncan. They bought a small newspaper and opened a drugstore and newspaper office. After Gilbert died in 1918 of the Spanish Flu, Maud sold the pharmacy and continued to print the Winslow American Newspaper until shortly before her death in 1956. Maud was also the first woman mayor for Winslow's all woman city government.

These are only a few of the interesting burial sites at the cemetery. The Winslow Museum would like to thank the Winslow 4-H Club for their volunteer efforts in and around Winslow and encourage everyone to visit St. Stephen's Episcopal Cemetery or one of the many historical cemeteries in the area.

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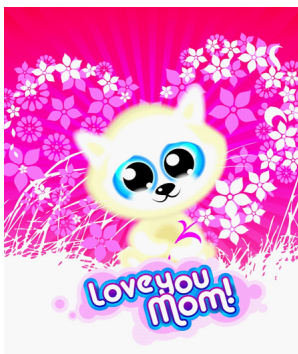
