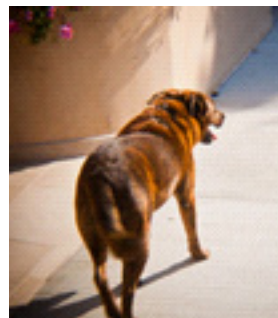

Dogs on the Loose in Winslow

There is a **city ordinance** that dogs are not allowed to roam the streets of Winslow. We know sometimes our critters get loose and go exploring, however, The City of Winslow is asking residents to please make an effort to keep your animals on your own property. So what is the process if a loose dog becomes a nuisance, or a threat to you and your critters? The procedure for having Animal Control pick up an animal in Winslow has changed because of the high cost to the city for Animal Control to make trip to Winslow. Here are the steps one must take to do something about the animal:



1. Form a good description of the animal. A photograph of the animal may be handy for locating the dog's owner if the dog has not been abandoned.
2. Call the Washington County Sheriff at (479) 444-5700. Ensure you get the name and number of the Sheriff. The Sheriff will note your complaint and ask you to contact City Hall, (479) 634-3901 or Mayor, Chuck Dwyer. The Sheriff will not send Animal Control to Winslow, until they get a call from our Mayor.
3. At City Hall, if we know who owns the dog, we will attempt to contact the owner, rather than have it picked up by Animal control.
4. If your furry friend is missing, please call city hall, we may be getting calls on your dog and can help you locate them. We can also post a photo of your lost pet in the Blog section of Winslowar.com.

New Year's Resolutions

Did you make a New Year's resolution? Have you kept it or is it already history?

The Babylonians first recorded the history of New Year's resolutions about 4000 years. During the 12 day religious ceremony of Akitu the people promised their gods they would return all borrowed items and pay their debts to gain the gods favor. If they did not keep their promises, they would fall out of favor and misfortune would visit them. In those days, the New Year started in about mid-March with the planting of the new crops.

In ancient Rome, about 46 B.C., Julius Caesar changed the calendar so the New Year started on January 1 to honor the Roman god Janus. The Roman people believed Janus' spirit lived in doorways and looked one way to the past and another way to the future. The people offered sacrifices for past indiscretions and made promises to behave in the future.

In the Medieval period from the 5th to the 15th century, knights took the "peacock vow" after the Christmas season to reaffirm their commitment to chivalry.

The early Christians followed the habit of thinking about and asking forgiveness for the past years and resolved to do better in the New Year. In 1740 Rev. John Wesley, the founder of Methodism begin the Covent Renewal Service. This was commonly held on New Year's Eve. It consisted of scripture reading and singing of hymns and was an alternative to the wild parties and behavior usually found on New Year's Eve. Even today, some churches hold a New Year's Eve service praying and making resolutions called a "watch night service".

The Jewish people reflect on their wrongdoings and both offer and seek forgiveness during their New Year from Rosh Hashanah through the High Holidays and ending with Yom Kippur.

In today's society, resolutions lean towards self-improvement and taking better care of ourselves. Sadly to say that although about 45 percent of Americans make resolutions but only about 8 percent are kept.

In all of the New Year traditions regardless of the beliefs, the original theme was to forgive the past and pledge to do better in the future.

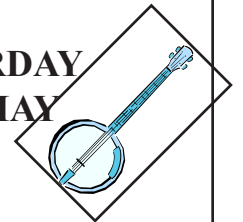

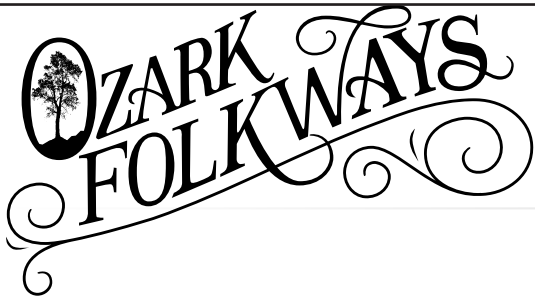

LIVING ON THE EDGE OF ETERNITY

2018 has receded into history; A new year has begun! We are nearing the end of another decade. For just such a time, the Apostle Peter wrote: *“The end of all things is near...”* (1 Peter 4.7) What exactly did he mean??

With the establishment of the Church in Acts 2.16-21, the “last days” began. In Jesus, the end of history came. We are living in “the epilogue of history.” However long it may endure, this is God’s last dispensation of time. The end could come at any moment. Beyond that, for any of us, there is a more immediate, more personal sense in which “The end of all things is near!” Life is brief. The hour hastens on. So we must learn to live effectively on the edge of eternity! Note God’s formula for life on the edge ...

1. KEEP YOUR SANITY. *“Therefore, be of sound judgment...”* (1 Peter 4.7.) In Greek “sound judgment” is literally “a healthy mind; calm and well-balanced.” We live in the most insane age in human history! At bottom our problems are fundamentally spiritual! Christian living is the way to sanity!

2. STAY SOBER. 1 Peter 4.7 continues: *“Be of... sober spirit...”* On the edge of eternity, there is no greater need than Sobriety. Ephesians 5.18 commands, *“And do not get drunk with wine, for that is dissipation...”* There are many forms of drunkenness: Some are drunk on alcohol; some on drugs; some on pleasure. But the times demand clear heads and a high and serious view of life!

3. KEEP ON PRAYING. Next Peter advises: *“Be... watchful in your prayers.”* (1 Peter 4.7/NKJV.) Jesus taught us always to pray and not to faint. (Luke 18.1.) To develop a real sense of living at the edge of eternity, then, prayer is indispensable!

4. LOVE EACH OTHER DEEPLY. God’s prescription for life at the edge of eternity continues: *“Above all, keep fervent in your love for one another...”* (1 Peter 4.8.) Christian love is not easy sentiment! It demands all our mental and spiritual reserves: *“The one who does not love does not know God...”* (1 John 4.8.)

5. MAINTAIN SOUND DOCTRINE. *“Whoever speaks, is to do so as one who is speaking the utterances of God...”* (1 Peter 4.11.) Those concerned for doctrinal soundness today are styled harsh, judgmental and legalistic. But Jesus insisted only truth enlightens and liberates. (John 8.32.)
