Winslow HIPPY News

Most of the schools in the area will be starting on August 18th. Be sure to watch out for children on the side of the road waiting for the bus on your way to work, or getting off the bus when you are rushing home to take advantage of the daylight. Remember if that red light is flashing, STOP! Don't Pass!, The children getting on or off may have to cross the road. When driving in town where there are crosswalks near schools or the U of A, the pedestrian has the right of way. Let's keep our young people safe.

Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) is a parent involvement, school readiness program that helps parents prepare their three, four, and five year old children for success in school and beyond. The parent is provided with a set of carefully developed curriculum, books and materials designed to strengthen their children's cognitive skills, early literacy skills, social/emotional and physical development. A trained, home-based educator meets weekly with parents to role-play lessons and support the parent's important role as their child's first teacher. This program is free for qualifying families. By the end of the upcoming school year, your child will have completed 30 weeks of fun activities that help prepare for school, received 9 free books that follow these activities, met for 9 group meetings where you have a chance to visit with area parents and children, and attended a fun, free field trip - such as our popular train ride.

I have a few Winslow HIPPY opening for the upcoming school year - we start in September and end in May - so if you are, or know of, any interested parents with children who will be ages 3-5 this fall, let me know as soon as possible. 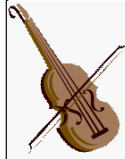


“THE LEAST OF THESE THRIFT SHOP”

WHO ARE THE BEST STEWARDS SO FAR?

Despite the size of Fayetteville, and the fact that the largest portion of streamside residents in the West Fork Watershed live in this city, only 6% of streamside landowners in Fayetteville are participating in our project. That means 94% of the people in Fayetteville receiving our newsletter have not contacted us or participated in current water quality protection efforts to our knowledge! The City of Fayetteville and residents that have participated are doing great things for water quality, however there is still much more to be done, and we need their help! We are particularly impressed by the community of Winslow. Streamside landowners make up over half the population of Winslow, and 10% of them have participated in our program. 13% of streamside landowners in West Fork, and 12% of streamside landowners in Greenland are participating.

Municipal Governments are leading the way with 100% participation, Agricultural Landowners are second with 35% participation, rural landowners are in third, and businesses are currently last. It will be neat to see if this trend continues and just how the competition turns out! We wonder who will take the challenge to check-in and participate to show us how well they manage their land or to let us know what kind of land management concerns, interests, or issues that they might have.

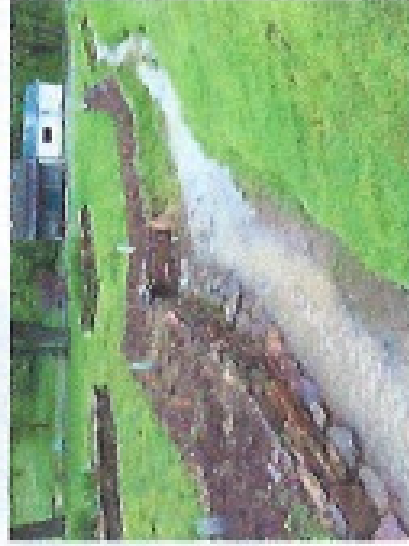


Streamside landowners helping each other increase a riparian buffer to prevent erosion and help wildlife. The plants are all well!

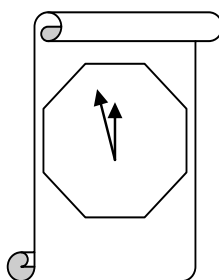

Mark Robertson, Candidate For Arkansas Commissioner of State Lands Visits Winslow

Folks at the Winslow Farmers' Market and the Winslow Mercantile were visited last Saturday morning, July 26, by Mark Robertson, candidate for Arkansas Commissioner of State Lands. He was introduced at the Mercantile by Joyce Hale of Fayetteville, past president of the Washington County League of Women Voters and longtime community activist. He spoke and answered questions about his candidacy.

He is amazingly the first candidate for Land Commissioner in memory whose profession is actually in concerns of the land.

Mark is a landscape architect who owns his own company which does land management and design services. He has been involved with environmental, energy, and sustainability issues for years, including being a commissioner for the Little Rock Sustainability Commission and being on the board of directors of the Arkansas Advanced Energy Association. He has designed parks (including Fayetteville's Gulley Park) all over the area and state.



He answered questions about this little-known office of Arkansas Commissioner of State Lands, explaining that the land commissioner office was created in 1874, but wasn't until 1939 that a full definition of the position was made into state policy.

Mark said that the role of the Commissioner is to "protect the lands owned by the State," and to "provide for their classification and best use in the interests of the future general welfare and agricultural well-being of the State."

The primary functions of the Arkansas Commissioner of State Lands are:

- Real Estate Division: oversees the disposition of tax-delinquent property through auctions.
- Mineral Leasing: chairs the committee which approves or denies leases for oil/gas (including fracking concerns), sand/gravel, brine, and timber on state- owned property.
- State Owned Land Records: maintains historical records of land, maps and other archived records
