VELDA'S WORDS

Happy New Year Everyone, Last year was a great one for me.

Two new books came out in October within weeks. Both are set in Arkansas and have a lot of factual places and people and plenty of fictional ones to ramp up the action.

The Purloined Skull, the first of a new series A Twist of Poe, features Dallas Starr, a Cherokee lawman who has worked as an undercover narc on the streets of Dallas and is burnt out. His mom named him Dallas cause she always wanted to go there, but he was all she ever saw of Dallas. He takes a job with fictional Grace County, Arkansas, Sheriff's department as their first and only crime scene investigator. Dallas has a special talent of getting into the heads of victims and criminals involved in violent crimes, long after the crimes are committed. Right away he proves invaluable when he solves a cold case.

But he doesn't solve the case alone. To his dismay, investigative reporter Jesse West, adopted granddaughter of Mac Richards, the sheriff and Dal's boss, is allowed to trail along on the case. The two clash immediately, but are attracted to one another in a hot way. On seeing him for the first time, Jesse declares that God is good. Jesse has come home to fictional Cedarton, the county seat of Grace County, to work for the local newspaper, named The Observer. Her career in LA is a shambles after she betrayed the trust of the man she loved and broke a story, ruining both her own career and his. I am working on the second book of the Poe series which evolves around stolen diamonds and a place called SEFOR, which I've moved to the fictional county. What fun to take all the stories and people I've known over the 40 years I've lived and worked here and twist them around into stories that are a bit dark, gritty and yes, sexy. No one will be treated badly, and only fictional characters are mean, ugly or at times violent.

The Purloined Skull: The bones waited in eerie silence, sad remnants of someone's life. They made no sound, put off no stench, nor were they impatient to be identified. Just a pile of bones, that's all.

The second book is Once There Were Sad Songs, a mainstream love story set in the Ouachita Mountains and our Ozarks.

Here are the Tag Lines for this book: Two lonely people in search of the life they always dreamed of find each other and discover that what we wish for and what we really need are two different things.

1985 - A Vietnam Vet on the path to destruction and a schoolteacher searching for the life she always dreamed of having find each other at a remote lake in the Ouachita Mountains. Can they embrace this second chance at love or is it too late?

I also issued a boxed set of the Montana Series, now on Amazon Kindle. The boxed set contains all three books for the price of two.

Oghma Creative Media designed new covers for me and I signed with them to help promote the series.

The last month of the year I contracted a reader/performer for my second audio book, the second of the Montana Series. The first audio came out last year read by Jeff Justus. I'll release this audio in the spring.

For the coming year, I'm concentrating on a new book for the Victorian Series, Rowena's Hellion, which is with my editor at The Wild Rose Press. And my editor at SynergE Books has published Wolf Song to print. It's available on Amazon. Once I finish the second Poe series book, I will work with Oghma to publish directly to Kindle, a brand new big novel, titled Beyond the Moon. More on it later, but I think all my readers and fans will enjoy this book, a mainstream love story which also takes place in Arkansas.

Winter Storm Tips

Winter is here, and with it often come storms that can keep you trapped inside. Or even worse, you may lose power. Here are some tips to help you prepare ahead of time and keep you safe after, both indoors and out.



Before the Storm

Get together needed supplies ahead of time as much as possible, including:

- Extra food, including foods that don't need to be refrigerated.
- Bottled water.
- Flashlights and batteries and other battery powered items in case the power fails.
- An ice melting product for slippery sidewalks.
- A non-electric can opener.
- Extra blankets and sleeping bags.

Get other tips from the New York State Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services.

If the Power Goes Out

Foods

- Refrigerated foods will stay cold for about 4 to 6 hours; keep doors closed to increase that time.
- A full freezer stays at that temp for about 48 hours, a half full freezer about 24 hours.
- Eat leftovers, meat, poultry and any foods with milk, cream, soft cheese or sour cream first. Discard them and other perishable foods after 4 hours without power.
- Frozen foods that contain ice crystals may be cooked and eaten if power comes back.
- These foods are generally keep safe at room temperature for a few days: butter, margarine, hard cheese, fresh fruit and most vegetables, fruit juice, dried fruit, opened jars of vinegar-based salad dressing, jelly, relishes, taco sauce, barbecue sauce, mustard, ketchup and olives. The USDA has an extensive list of what foods are safe to keep.
- If it doubt, throw it out.

Medicines

If your medicine needs to be refrigerated, throw it out if the power has been out for a long period of time. The exception: if you can't get new medication and you need it, continue to take it.

Heat

- Close off unneeded rooms; stuff rags or towels under cracks in doors.
- Ventilate a fireplace or wood stove properly if you use one.
- Dress in loose layers that you can add to or take off as needed.
- Only use a portable generator outdoors.

Preventing Frostbite

Try to avoid being outside. If you have to go out, follow these tips from the National Weather Service:

- Dress as warmly as possible in lightweight layers. Wear a hat, cover your mouth, use mittens instead of gloves.
- Recognize frostbite symptoms: a loss of feeling or a white or pale looking toes, fingers, ear lobes, or the tip of the nose.
- Get medical help right away if you think you have frostbite.
- Get to a warm area and remove wet clothing. If you can't do that, use your body heat to warm the frostbitten area.
- If you are shivering uncontrollably, slurring speech or having memory loss, you could have hypothermia. Get medical help ASAP.

Shoveling Snow

The Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center offers these tips:

- Don't shovel if you have a history of heart disease or heart attack or stroke, or are not in good physical condition.
- Take frequent breaks.
- Don't drink alcohol before or after.
- Don't eat a heavy meal before or after.

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Do I Want To Climb My Family Tree?

Around the holidays families get together and reminisce about times past, “when we were kids it was like this...” or “I remember when we did this.....”, etc. Most of all we remember those who are no longer in the family circle except in spirit.

As we get older we tend to wonder about what our ancestors were like. Most of us know or have known our grandparents and perhaps our great grandparents. But what do you really know about them, where and when they were born, where did they live, how many children did they have, what about siblings and siblings children. Everyone has a complex family unit and each one is different.

When I worked at the Winslow Library several patrons knew I studied my own family history and asked me to teach a class in basic Genealogy. At that point I had too much on my plate and didn't have the time. Now that I'm retired I thought it might be interesting to give anyone interested a few pointers to start and if there is an interest in it I would do a monthly column on the subject.

The first place to start is at home with yourself since you are the first person in the chart. Make up a folder with things pertinent to your life. Start with your birth certificate, diploma, marriage certificate, other legal documents that are or have been important in your life. Get out your pictures and pick out the ones that show you as you are growing up. TIP: Take a day or two, go back and identify all the people in your pictures or some day your descendants will be scratching their heads trying to figure out who everyone is and may discard pictures that are valuable to their family tree.

You might want to write a few things about your life; some of the highlights, accomplishments, special memories that are important to you. Maybe some advice that you want to pass on to future generations.

Now that you have you all wrapped up in your personal file, it's time to start a file on your parents. Now there are two ways to do this. You can start with their marriage and collect information as them as a couple or begin a separate file on each one. I recommend doing both. The day they married your parents broke off from their parents and became a separate family. In this you will file everything from their marriage date forward or perhaps their engagement date. Then make a file for each parent separately. To this add everything that relates to them as a single person from birth to marriage.

Once again start at home and gather your information there first. File your folder behind theirs in the storage unit. Make a folder for each sibling and add that behind your parents. As you run across things add it to each of the siblings' folders. By this time you will realize you need a file drawer or an accordion folder for storage. Later on it may amount to several file cabinets.

Next month we'll talk about the grandparents and the 1940 census and the blessing that it has been in genealogy.

of papers that I have collected over the last 55 years, moved them many times and promised myself every year that I would get organized. I started last year and hope I have many years left to complete this daunting task.
