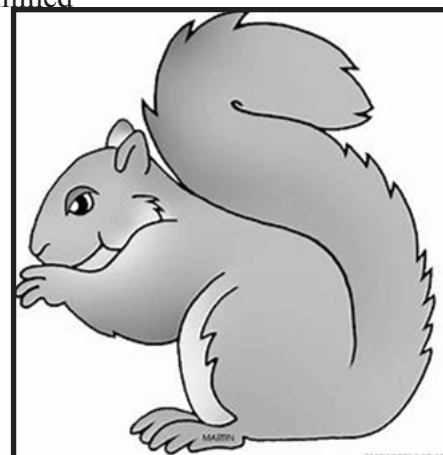

TEST RESULTS

We routinely monitor for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The test results table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 2022. In the table you might find terms and abbreviations you are not familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

CT - The residual concentration of disinfectant multiplied by the contact time

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - unenforceable public health goal; the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - the highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - the level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

NA - not applicable

Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU) - a unit of measurement for the clarity of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the average person.

Parts per billion (ppb) - a unit of measurement for detected levels of contaminants in drinking water. One part per billion corresponds to one minute in 2,000 years, or a single penny in \$10,000,000.

Parts per million (ppm) - a unit of measurement for detected levels of contaminants in drinking water. One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

- ◆ Turbidity is a measurement of the cloudiness of water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of the effectiveness of our filtration system.
- ◆ No violation was issued as the highest level detected was due to an abnormal operating event that was quickly handled by our system.

- ◆ We are on a reduced monitoring schedule for sampling for lead and copper at the customers' taps. The results above are from our last monitoring period in 2022. Our next scheduled monitoring period is in 2025.

TOTAL ORGANIC CARBON						
◆ The percentage of Total Organic Carbon (TOC) removal was routinely monitored in 2022, at both the Lake Fort Smith and Lee Creek WTPs and all TOC removal requirements set by USEPA were met for both of our sources. TOC has no health effects. However, Total Organic Carbon provides a medium for the formation of disinfection by-products. These by-products include Trihalomethanes (THMs) and Haloacetic acids (HAAs).

Children of the 30s & 40s

The Last Ones

A Short Memoir

Born in the 1930s and early 40s, we exist as a very special age cohort. We are the last ones.

We are the last, climbing out of the depression, who can remember the winds of war and the war itself with fathers and uncles going off to war.

We are the last to remember ration books for everything from sugar to shoes to stoves.

We saved tin foil and poured fat into tin cans. We saw cars up on blocks because tires weren't available.

My mother delivered milk in a horse drawn cart.

We are the last to hear Roosevelt's radio assurances and to see gold stars in the front windows of our grieving neighbors. We can also remember the parades on August 15, 1945; VJ Day.

We saw the boys home from the war build their Cape Cod style houses, pouring the cellar, tar papering it over and living there until they could afford the time and money to build it out.

We are the last who spent childhood without television; instead imagining what we heard on the radio.

As we all like to brag, with no TV, we spent our childhood playing outside until the street lights came on.

We did play outside and we did play on our own. There was no little league.

The lack of television in our early years meant, for most of us, that we had little real understanding of what the world was like. Our Saturday afternoons, if at the movies, gave us newsreels of the war and the holocaust sandwiched in between westerns and cartoons. Newspapers and magazines were written for adults.

We are the last who had to find out for ourselves.

As we grew up, the country was exploding with growth. The G.I. Bill gave returning veterans the means to get an education and spurred colleges to grow. VA loans fanned a housing boom.

Pent up demand coupled with new installment payment plans put factories to work.

New highways would bring jobs and mobility. The veterans joined civic clubs and became active in politics.

In the late 40s and early 50s the country seemed to lie in the embrace of brisk but quiet order as it gave birth to its new middle class. Our parents understandably became absorbed with their own new lives.

They were free from the confines of the depression and the war. They threw themselves into exploring opportunities they had never imagined.

We weren't neglected but we weren't today's all-consuming family focus. They were glad we played by ourselves until the street lights came on. They were busy discovering the post war world.

Most of us had no life plan, but with the unexpected virtue of ignorance and an economic rising tide we simply stepped into the world and went to find out. We entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where we were welcomed. Based on our naive belief that there was more where this came from, we shaped life as we went.

We enjoyed a luxury; we felt secure in our future. Of course, just as today, not all Americans shared in this experience.

Depression poverty was deep rooted. Polio was still a crippler. The Korean War was a dark presage in the early 50s and by mid-decade school children were ducking under desks. China became Red China. Eisenhower sent the first "advisors" to Vietnam. Castro set up camp in Cuba and Khrushchev came to power.

We are the last to experience an interlude when there were no existential threats to our homeland.

We came of age in the late 40s and early 50s. The war was over and the cold war, terrorism, climate change, technological upheaval and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life with insistent unease.

Only we can remember both a time of apocalyptic war and a time when our world was secure and full of bright promise and plenty. We experienced both.

We grew up at the best possible time, a time when the world was getting better not worse.

I was born in 1945 just a few months before the end of World War II. I lived with my parents next door to my grandparents. They all lived through the Depression and I watched them scrimp and save everything from the string on packages, buttons off of the old clothes that were made into rag rugs, every morsel that came out of the garden that could be canned or frozen,. So even though I am living in the 21st century and have adapted to this lifestyle, I still remember the way I was raised. Come Spring I find myself wanting to put the seeds in the ground and wait for things to grow. I haven't canned anything for about 11 years but I sure miss the Okra and Tomatoes over rice, and green beans with new potatoes that used to set on my shelves. I bought 12 tomato plants to put out for a few fresh sliced tomatoes this summer, but that will probably be the extend of it.. Maybe a few stalks of corn. My little garden won't hold much and my back will scream about even that.

10:30 a.m. PRIZE TIME

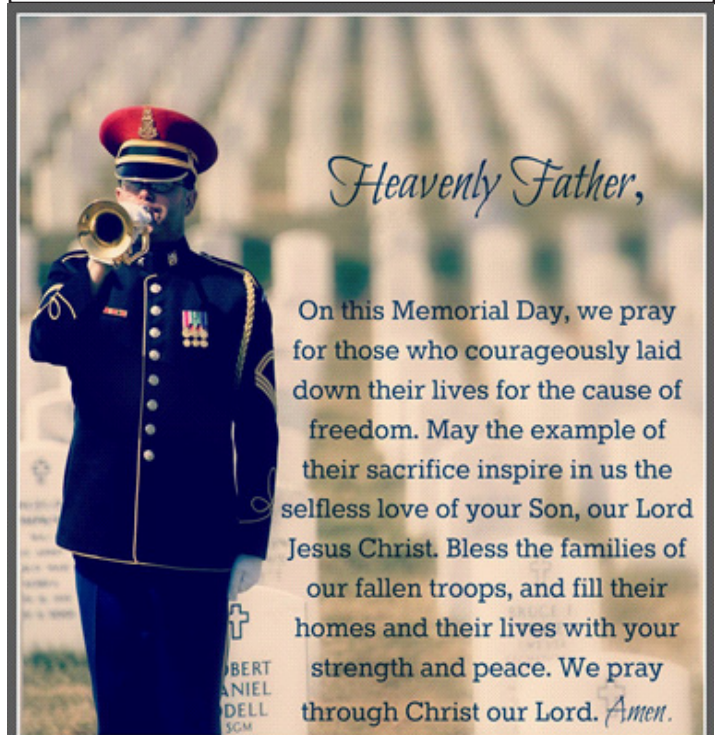
Meet in the Visitor Center Audio-Visual room and discover how well you did on your scavenger hunt! Prizes will be awarded to different age groups and categories.

Another sign of the times is the specific work of these false christs and false prophets. We've already learned that "false christs and false prophets will rise and show great signs and wonders to deceive, if possible, the very elect" (Matthew 24:24). "Signs and wonders" is another name for miracles, inexplicable occurrences outside the laws of nature.

The bible teaches us some significant facts about miracles. When God was about to deliver His people out of slavery, He told Moses and Aaron, "I will ...multiply My signs and wonders in the land of Egypt" (Exodus 7:3). God then predicted that the ruler of Egypt, Pharaoh, would challenge them: "Show a miracle for yourselves" (v9). Everything happened just as God said. When Pharaoh challenged Moses and Aaron, the miracle that Aaron performed, through the power of God, was to "cast down his rod before Pharaoh and before his servants, and it became a serpent" (10). Directly after however Pharaoh ordered "the wise men and the sorcerers, known as "the magicians of Egypt", to copy Aaron's miracle; and "they also did in like manner with their enchantments" (v11).

See miracles are not always from God---they can also be counterfeits from Satan. And even though Pharaoh's magicians aren't around today, their equivalents are. There are psychics, mediums, and yogis. There are paranormal investigators, ufologists, and spiritual healers. There are Wiccans and New Agers--- even "Christian" witches! Witchcraft is a multibillion-dollar industry. They may have different labels for who they're coming in contact with---whether ghosts, aliens, reincarnations, or even professed angels--- but the bible reveals the single source behind these types of signs and wonders: "they are spirits of demons, performing signs" (Revelation 16:14) You read that right: the supernatural manifestations accompanying the false christs and prophets, of the last days are demons. In fact, it is the end-time false prophet, also known as the second beast from the earth (19:20) that convinces the whole world by its signs and wonders to persecute all those who worship God.
