He was born on August 28, 1948, in Hattiesburg, Mississippi.

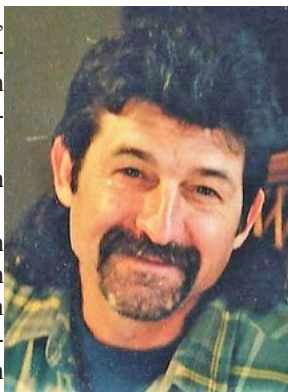

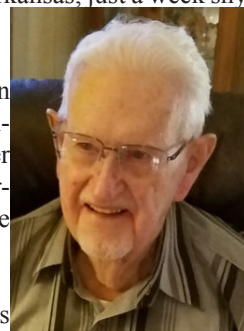

Phillip Eugene Browning,

September 18, 1926~September 12, 2018

Phillip Eugene Browning went home to meet the Lord on Wednesday, September 12, 2018 in Fayetteville, Arkansas, just a week shy of his 92nd birthday.

He was predeceased by his parents, Oren Browning and Effie Mae Borum Browning; his wife of 59 years, Irene Alice Waller Browning; his brothers, Woodrow and Curtis Browning; and his son, Rodney Eugene Browning.



Phillip is survived by his wife, Sue Hayes Froud Browning; his siblings, Donny Browning, Dewey Browning and Faye Browning Hollingsworth; and his children, Danny and Kim Browning of Winslow, Arkansas, Sharon Browning Motley and Phil Motley of Choctaw, Oklahoma and Stephen and Lisa Browning of Phoenix, Arizona; daughter-in-law, Lenora Browning, wife of Rodney Browning of Katy, Texas; and his step-children, Teresa Froud Baker and Terry Baker of Bentonville, Darrell and Heather Froud of Cave Springs and Kevin and Dana Froud of Fayetteville. In his blended family, he was blessed with 20 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

Phillip was born on September 18, 1926 on a farm in Checotah, Oklahoma. He enlisted in the United States Navy during World War II, serving on the USS Mustin (DD413) near the Ominato Imperial Navy base in Mutsu Bay in Northern Japan during the signing of the peace treaty with Japan. His primary job on the ship was originally as a Fireman, but to escape working below decks in the boiler room, he volunteered to be the ship barber, never having cut hair before. He was a quick learner at whatever he set his mind to, and he pleased his Commanding Officer by giving uniformly short buzz cuts to the whole crew. After the war, he went back home to Checotah to buy a farm, and went so far as to buy a tractor. However, his plans didn't pan-out and they moved to Oklahoma City and Phillip attended Barber School and bought his own shop. That endeavor didn't last long, and he set out for the oil fields of Oklahoma, working as a roughneck. Now with a family of four to support, he headed back to Oklahoma City and worked two jobs at the same time. One was as a boiler systems engineer at Stefan's ice cream plant; the other was a maintenance man for Oklahoma City Rental Company. He also worked for Oklahoma Scenic Company, designing and installing props, backdrops and sound systems. The City Rental Company was bordering on going under, and Phillip assumed management of the company to get it back on its feet. He attended the University of Oklahoma and obtained his Real Estate Broker license. These culminated in his purchasing the City Rental Company, which he ran for a number of years, and by this time he had a family of six. Attending Appraisal School, he became an independent fee appraiser, often working for the Veterans Administration. Landing a job with

He had the ability and desire to learn many things and obtained a pilots license and flew airplanes. He fixed-up and sold motor homes and rented them out for several years. He retired from the federal government in 1983 and moved to Winslow, Arkansas, pursuing his dream of being an artist, painting the beautiful countryside and historic buildings in rural Arkansas. Some of his paintings are on display at the Winslow Museum with many more in homes across the country. He travelled extensively, in all 50 of the United States, much of it by motor home. He loved seeing this great country, capturing its beauty on film and canvas.

When not traveling, he created his own version of a small farm on five acres on top of Mt. Gaylor in the Boston Mountains, loving to work in his vegetable garden. Sue and Lee Froud were long time church friends of Phil and Irene, and after the passing of first Lee Froud and then Irene, the Lord saw fit to join Sue and Phillip in marriage. They enjoyed many good years on the Froud farm, allowing Phillip to fulfill his dream of being a farmer. A man of God, Phillip worshiped at Living Faith Church in Fayetteville, Arkansas. He loved his family, and working with his hands. He'll be remembered for all the beautiful things he created.

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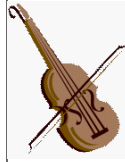

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INVASIVE PLANTS AND WHY IT'S IMPORTANT TO ERADICATE THEM

Nate has also conducted the distribution of free native tree seedlings during our March Arbor Day celebrations.—K. Stout)



Most invasive species are opportunistic colonizers of an unoccupied ecological niche; a tree falls in the forest, and seemingly overnight pokeweed fills the gap. Some invasive plants, like Kudzu and Privet, act more like a wedge, forcefully displacing other species. Populations of invasive species appear harmless at first as their numbers may be few, but factors which would otherwise control their growth and spread are often absent.

In Kudzu's case, monkeys and the Japanese people themselves do an admirable job controlling its spread through consumption. Without this "top-down control," invasive species' populations grow exponentially. Unfortunately, the lack of natural predators also creates a positive feedback effect, whereby natural predators such as deer and rabbits will avoid eating Kudzu or Privet in favor of eating increasingly rare native grasses and forbs.

Kudzu and Privet spread aggressively, displacing native species until the landscape is a singular, homogenous blanket. Since species diversity and ecological stability is driven by habitat diversity or heterogeneity, few species but those benefitted by Kudzu, such as the noxious Kudzu Bug, can sustain themselves - little wildlife lives under a blanket of Kudzu or a canopy of Privet.

While both Kudzu and Privet can seem overwhelming, both can be managed and replaced – the upfront effort is considerable but the follow-up much less so. The management techniques for both finding cheap and effective ways to curtail growth and population

increase. With Kudzu, many people think the entire root must be dug up, a monumental task when Kudzu's roots can be as thick as a man's thigh and ten feet deep! Easily enough, all you need to do is: find a vine, trace its crown, and sever the crown from the root. The root will die all on its own as it possesses no reproductive cells. The recommended tools for this job depend on preference but can include a curved pruning saw, prong hoe, trenching hoe, or mattock for older crowns. The record is a whopping 186 crowns per hour by a gentleman named Antonio Perkins using only a prong hoe!

Privet is similarly manageable - the wood is soft and easily sawed with a simple hand saw, the stumps "painted" with either a 50% mixture of glyphosate (Roundup) or triclopyr (Garlon/Remedy). A roll-on painter for household trim works exceptionally well and is a reliable budget option found at most hardware stores. Mix in some dye to distinguish what you've painted and what you missed. Depending on treatment schedule, a carpet of Privet seedlings will likely emerge the following fall or spring in response to the increased sunlight. These can be easily removed with a foliar application of a 5% solution of glyphosate.

As with the use of any tools or chemicals, be sure to familiarize yourself with the safety precautions and proper handling, and consult your local extension office for assistance. Both Kudzu and Privet can be removed easily with patience, dedication, and above all awareness and willingness within the community to recognize the problem, learn how to manage it, and be willing to treat it until the invasive is eradicated.

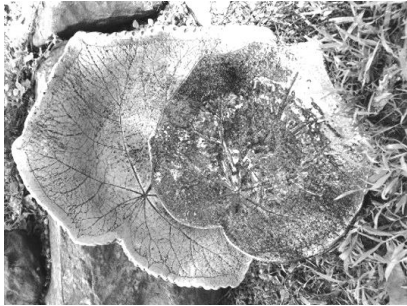

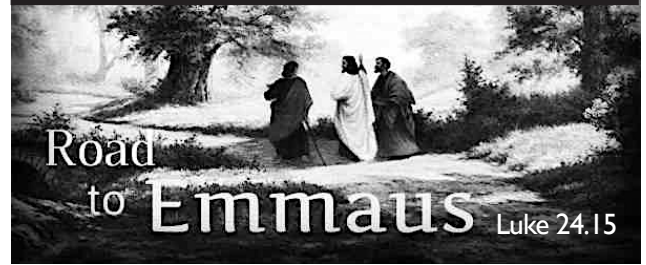

GOD'S FINGERPRINTS

Either God exists or He does not — there is no middle ground. To try to remain neutral on the question is just another form of unbelief. If God exists, that is the most important fact in the universe. If He does not nothing else in the universe really matters at all!

The Bible pictures God as much more than some abstract force or universal spirit. Scripture presents God as a distinct all-knowing, all-seeing, all-powerful personality! (*Psalm 139:4-14.*) He is above us, around us, before us, behind us, beneath us, in us and with us!

The evidence for such a God is everywhere. He has left His fingerprints on the universe...

1) The Teleological Argument: The Human Ability To Think of God. If there is no God and humans are only graduate beasts, where did the idea of God come from? There is an instinctive perception of God hard-wired into human consciousness — a divine fingerprint on the soul! (*Romans 1.21, 28.*) As Solomon expressed it: "God has placed eternity in our hearts." (*Ecclesiastes 3.11.*)

2) The Cosmological Argument: The Existence Of The Universe. Where did the world come from? There are four possibilities: (i) The universe is an illusion and does not really exist— obviously absurd! (ii) The universe suddenly appeared out of nothing — scientifically untenable. Material cannot create itself. (iii) The universe is eternal — which is contrary to scientific observation. The earth is wearing out, resources are being depleted, the sun is cooling off, the stars are burning out! (iv) It was created! The force with power to create the cosmos must be God! Only an infinite, independent, eternal Mind could have created our finite, dependent, transient universe.

(3) The Ontological Argument: The Human Awareness of Right and Wrong. There is a sense of "oughtness" in all of us — a conscience. Deeply etched in our soul is the conviction that right and wrong exist. Our moral sense may become twisted; but instinctively we know that right and wrong exist! Morality does not spring from nature. It can only be derived from God! There is a "law written in our heart" to which our conscience bears witness. (*Romans 2.15.*) Only God could have placed it there!
