#### Carman Earl Courtney,

November 18, 1938~May 21, 2016



Carman Earl Courtney was born at home on the family farm in Winslow, Arkansas on November 18, 1938. Earl was the 10th of the 12 Courtney children. He worked the family farm until he was 16. At age 16 he moved to Washington State to live with his sisters, Randolyn and Norma, to work the harvest. It was there that Randolyn taught

him to play guitar. He used the money he earned that year to buy the first of his many guitars.

In 1956, after a year in Washington, Earl returned home to Arkansas and enlisted in the Army. After three years of service, he returned to civilian life in 1959 and made a decision that would shape the rest of his life. Earl's brothers were working at the mine in Climax, Colorado, and Earl decided he would go work with them. It was there that Earl met the love of his life, Shirley Kufeldt. Earl and Shirley were married on July 30, 1960. They were blessed to share 55 years of marriage and 56 years of friendship.

Wanting to provide for his new bride and their future family, Earl decided to return to the Army. Military life allowed Earl and Shirley to travel all over the world together. Both of their children, Charlene and Carmen, were born overseas in Germany while Earl was stationed there.

While in Germany, Earl had the opportunity to open for the U.S.O. and for many famous entertainers, including: Hank Snow, Brenda Lee, Faron Young, and The Willis Brothers. He was even offered a career in music in Nashville, but chose to continue serving his family and country instead.

Earl retired from the Army in 1978 after 22 years of service as a combat helicopter pilot. He served a remote tour in Korea and a tour of combat during the Vietnam War. He achieved the high rank of Chief Warrant Officer 3 and received The Vietnam Service Medal with four Bronze Service Stars, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal (Korea), Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, and the Army Commendation Medal.

After he retired, Earl and Shirley and their youngest daughter Carmen moved home to Arkansas to be with his family. He cared for his aging parents, his siblings, and his immediate family, all while working as many as three jobs at a time.

Earl was the man you wanted on your side. If you were a friend or family to Earl, you knew you would always be taken care of. When anyone needed anything, someone would always say, "Call 5

Earl."

Earl was a man of patience, who found pleasure investing his time in the things he loved, as is evidenced by the way he chose to spend his time. He was a flight instructor, charter pilot, FBO manager, carpenter, and welding instructor. He also loved gardening, fishing and hunting, teaching music, and playing music any chance he got. He played and sang in various bands ever since 1957, and was still performing regularly until March of 2016.

Earl lived a Christian life. He was a man of his word and he cared for the meek and the lowly. He was obedient to the Lord in the profession of his faith and in baptism on May 15, 2016. We rest in the confidence that he is now in the Kingdom of his Savior, where all is as it should be. Earl's life was defined by the things he loved. He lived his life to serve his country, and those dear to him. There is a large circle of lives he touched with his generosity; lives that are different and better for having known him.

#### The Cavern

Why would a cavern exist that would contain the artifacts thus mentioned in past segments? Maybe it was to behold the history of past settlements, the villages of the past. Maybe the Quapaw village, referred to as "Osotuoy" had more to offer future generations than originally believed.

Modern man seems to be more preoccupied with the Civil War in America than how this country originally began. America was never truly "discovered", for it was never lost to begin with. "Let it lay and thus be forgotten", quoted one historian. What does the modern man do, so many, when excavating the past? They exploit it or destroy it. The Cavern exemplifies the Cherokee, Osage, Quapaw, the Chickasaw, and Choctaw, even the Cheyenne, Apache and Pawnee.

Many caves exist in Northwestern Arkansas, and some intertwine with each other. Many are unadorned, with no factual existence of any recorded history. Along the White and Buffalo rivers history has been recorded in thirteen or so different locations.

Frog Bayou presented history of ancient civilizations. Much of the knowledge gained was sold to museums in Washington DC, Michigan and New York.

The Caddo people of Arkansas lived primarily in Southwestern Arkansas prior to 800 A.D. And is it possible that the Tunica existed primarily at the mouth of the Arkansas River, and Pawnee as close as Kansas?

What if the "River of the Cayas" was in actually the Arkansas River? What if "mounding building was as far west of the Mississippi, as say, Brentwood, Arkansas? So, we already know that, if we consider Bluffton. Just what if De Soto himself traveled up the Arkansas, and confusedly branched off somewhere in the Boston Mountains? Trade could have taken place at any given point. When certain artifacts are found at a distinct location, it is at times assumed that certain events "naturally" took place there. Then again it could be nothing more than an assumption with certain parties involved. Maybe archeological interpretation, which we know is not always correct and/or debatable. Chronicles are also written with some truth, but also consisting of legend which entails some truth, yet, fantasy.

The American Indian never foresaw, in the beginning what was to be in the years ahead, as far as he was concerned. The Spaniards, the English, the French, all originally travelled to America for its riches – its gold, wealth. Whoever had the greatest if strength acquired "absolute ownership of property." It continues today, in theory. We do it by means of legality to each other; it is called "eminent domain." In any case it is no more than competition for prestige, somewhere between reciprocity and retribution, depending on what side of the fence you're on.

Prior to any European ever arriving in America, the Indian saw few, if any, major diseases. With the introduction of new Peoples, different standards of living brought about many diseases, such as influenza, smallpox, measles, the plague, trachoma, and diphtheria. The Indians had no buildup of immunity to such diseases and mortality rates of young adults soared. Parasites and infestation became the norm and epi8demics broke out in Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri. It was stated that De Soto and his men introduced typhus, the plague, and malaria to the Indian Nation. In Texas alone; it being such a dry region; each generation from the early/mid 1700's to te late 1800's suffered epidemics of mortality.

#### **PROACTIVE**


