



Jack Vaughn Stockburger died Sunday, August. 24,



2008,

(In March 2003, Jack dictated his obituary to Barbara Ashbaugh. Following is what he wanted said. It was in much more detail than a major newspaper could publish but Within Winslow wanted to abide by his wishes.)

Jack Vaughn Stockburger

His parents, Noah Oscar Stockburger and Callie Agnes Quinton grew up, married, and began their family in the Mineral Springs-West Fork area. Three daughters, Hazel (Gilbreath), Bethel (Jones), and Glen Stockburger were born there. In 1910, the family moved to Winslow and lived at the N. corner of Bunyard and

Devil's Den Road. Noah was a clerk in the Stockburger-Miller Mercantile.

Jack Vaughan Stockburger was born on August 21, 1912. The name Vaughn came from the family name of good friends who had a sum-

mer home just north of the Stockburger's on Devil's Den Road. Mr. Vaughn was President of a bank in Ft.. Smith.

In 1921, Noah began carrying the mail on horseback 3 days a week. In 1922 when Jack was 10, the family moved to their farm near Collier-Yoes Cemetery and for four years Glen and Jack attended Signal Hill School. On the farm, Jack learned to plow and plant and he says he lost many toenails in the rocky ground. Fox hunting was a popular sport then and Noah kept hounds.

The family moved back to Winslow so Glen and Jack could attend high school. They lived in the first house on what is now Main Street. (Known as the 1st Dr.. Gray house, later the Robinson house and is now the guesthouse of Elizabeth Page.) In 1926 at the age of 14, Jack joined the Winslow Methodist Church where his family active members. Noah was a Lay Speaker.

In School, Jack was very active in all sports. He excelled in basketball and tells many interesting sports stories. During his school days, Winslow had a gymnasium located where the shop building is today. The gym had a dirt floor, lighting was provided by a Delco Generator. The floor had to be watered down at intervals to control the dust. Jack said sometimes you could not see from one end of the court to the other. This building became in disrepair in the 1940's and there was no money so it was torn down. Winslow basketball was played on outside courts until space in the main building was converted into a gym. The present gym was built in the early 1970's.

During the summer, Jack worked at Mountain Lodge ((Winslow Park Club) in the dining room, kitchen and on the golf course as a caddy. He enjoyed fishing, golf, baseball, and basketball. He became a professional referee and officiated games all over the area. He played on two adult Fayetteville teams and the Winslow Independent Men's Team.

In 1935, he joined Summit Lodge 530. He has been an active member since that time, serving in many offices in the Masonic Lodge and Clyde Chapter of Easter. He served as local Secretary in the Lodge for 26 years. In 1964-65, he was Grand Master for the State of Arkansas and traveled to each of the 72 counties in the state. He became friends with many people all over the state.

He began work in the Winslow Post Office as a clerk in 1936 where his father was rural carrier.

On September 25, 1938, he married Agnes Mildred Chandler. Jack built the little house on the corner of Hill and School Street and they lived there after their marriage and again after WWII until they moved to the present family home at 420 Main in 1951.

In 1943, Jack joined the Army and served 26 months overseas in Germany and France. Agnes became Postmistress when the men left for WWII. She moved in with her parents, John and Ocie Chandler, who lived over the North End Garage. In 1944 the entire building burned. The family lost all their furniture, clothes, pictures, everything. Jack was discharged and returned home in 1945. He had no civilian clothes and due to the war, shortages could find none to fit in Fayetteville, Springdale, or Rogers. Gone were his beloved sports equipment, pictures and uniforms.

Jack became Postmaster in 1946. When Noah retired in 1947, Jack took Route 1. He preferred outside work. The father and son each served Route 1 for 26 years. They both performed many services for people and developed life long friendships. Jack retired from the Post Office in 1973 after 35 years of service

Jack and Agnes wanted children and in 1950, they adopted David, then Linda in 1953.

Jack had a natural talent for public speaking. Through the years, he was Master of Ceremonies or Speaker at many events. In 1935, he was the Bride in the "Womanless Wedding". A performance held at the school. In the 1950's, he was a charter member of the Boston Mountain Fire Association and the Winslow Lions Club. The Little League Ball Team was sponsored the Lions Club who provided equipment, insurance, uniforms, etc. He was Scout Master for the local Boy Scouts of America. In 1960, Jack was a Charter Member of the Winslow Community Development Council. In the 1970's Jack worked with the City of Winslow to get water for city residents and again in the 1980's he worked tirelessly doing surveys and getting easements for the Winslow Water System to bring pipelines from Lake Fort Smith. In 1983, the Winslow Health Council enlisted his help with many projects. Jack and Agnes donated the remains of their yard sale to begin the Winslow Thrift Shop, which provided funds for the Health Clinic. In the 1990's, Jack participated in the Men's Style Show.

Through the years, Jack became the backbone of the Winslow Methodist Church. He kept the doors open and the fires lit through lean times when only a few attended. He became a Certified Lay Speaker and filled the pulpit when there was no minister, taught Sunday School, sang in the choir, filled out the paperwork, paid the bills, performed the maintenance and served in nearly every capacity. The only thing he did not do was play the piano! On several occasions, there was talk of disbanding the church. Jack said, "NO!" Because of his persistence, Winslow Meth-

odist Church celebrated its 100th anniversary in October 2003 and is still here today.

Meanwhile, Agnes began a job as Librarian of the Winslow Public Library in 1966 at age 54. At her retirement in 1996, she was honored at a reception by the City of Winslow for serving the community in that position for 30 years. Mayor Larry Jarnagan unveiled a sign that read Agnes M.. Stockburger Library. During the year of Jack's community service, Agnes was quietly at his side.

Jack loved children and animals. He told many stories about special dogs in his life and loved to about his grandsons as they grew up. For many years he every person in and around Winslow and at one time or another befriended most of them in some way.

He received many certificates and plaques. Some hung on the walls of his living room. One from 1975 reads –“for a hole in 1 at Paradise Valley Golf Course”, another from the Order of the Eastern Star in 1987, the City of Winslow presented Citizen of the Year Awards for 1985, 1986, & 1987 “for the greatest contribution to the development of our community”, in 2001 “in appreciation for a lifetime of service to Winslow Methodist Church, The Denman Evangelism Award for Laity from the North Arkansas Conference of the United Methodist Church, also a plaque “for Long Service to Arkansas Masonry, an impressive array of acclaim.

He was preceded in death by his wife of 62 years, Agnes Chandler Stockburger; his daughter, Linda White; and three sisters, Glen, Bethel and Hazel. Survivors include a son, David Stockburger and Marilyn of Rudy; five grandsons, Bryan, Bill and Bradley Stockburger, Clint Jack Bolinger and Waymon Skinner; six great-grandsons; two great-granddaughters; one great-great-grandson; and his goddaughter and special caregiver, Jackie Wade. A funeral service was held Wednesday Winslow August 27, 2008 at the United Methodist Church with the Rev. Gary B.. Lunsford officiating.

Burial was in Baptist Ford Cemetery under the direction of Moore's Chapel.

We honor and salute Jack Stockburger for unselfishly giving of his time, his talents, his resources and of HIMSELF to Winslow for over 84 years. Thanks from all of us.

He didn't come out and say our laws need to be changed but he was clearly implying that our courts and prisons are full of people that shouldn't be there and something is terribly wrong with our system. Police agencies in Nevada apparently agree.

They changed the laws in Nevada to essentially ignore a small amount of marijuana. The time police were spending on dealing with people in possession of a couple of joints had reached a ridiculous level. They said they had no time left to look for murders and rapists. More officers would be the solution but the price of gas and operating expenses is taking its toll on police budgets everywhere including Arkansas.

People can get so incapacitated on liquor they can't even stand up and eventually wind up out on the floor and on the floor is where many binge drinkers have died. I have never heard of anyone reaching that point, or even anywhere near that condition on marijuana so I would conclude that pot smokers must be better drivers. And I have never heard of any man habitually getting stoned on marijuana and going home and beating up his wife.

I think the widespread opposition to smoking cigarettes bleeds over into smoking marijuana but the two are not even distant cousins. Standard manuscript format, Times New Roman, 12 point font. No fee. Mail one copy to Dusty Richards, P.O. Box 6460, Springdale, AR 72766. No SASE required.

Manuscripts will be destroyed after contest. First North American Rights. Rights revert back to author thirty days after publication.

Include a cover letter with all contact information, including e-mail address, and a fifty word bio.

All genres, except erotica. No gratuitous foul language, violence, or gore.

By submitting to this contest, you are giving permission for your work to be edited and published in this anthology. No other contract will be required, and you will not be paid for your submission.

Deadline for entries: Postmarked no later than March 21, 2009. Chosen authors will be notified thirty days after submissions close.

Publication date: March, 2010. Available at the March, 2010 NWAFFW seminar.

Prior to publication, authors will be able to order copies at a discounted price of 40% - 50%.

Often times anthologies make their way into the hands of agents and editors, so having your words published in this way is an important step in your writing career.

My favorite recent reads: Bone Yard by Michelle Gagnon; No One Heard Her Scream by Jordan Dane; Swan Peak by James Lee Burke; Nothing to Lose by Lee Child; Broken Window by Jeffrey Deaver; Or how about Images In Scarlet by Samantha Lee; Fly With The Mourning Dove by Velda Brotherton. I sort of enjoyed those, too. Check out these author's websites. Jordan has some good writing tips.

Just a note to let you know that my book, Fly With The Mourning Dove, is a finalist in the Willa, an award given by Women Writing the West in honor of the great writer, Willa Cather. Books that win this award or final are judged to be of the highest literary quality, so I'm pleased and dare I say proud. The awards will be given in October at the Women Writing the West Conference in San Antonio, TX. Thanks so much to all of you for your support over the years.

Hello everyone:

Our sympathy to the families of Tommy Mills and Jack Stockburger. We know they will be greatly missed by family and friends.

The Washington county fair is over for another year. Two of my granddaughters both earned red ribbons for the pigs they showed. My daughter and I were amazed at all the ribbons won by teenagers in the canning, sewing, photography, and the showing of their animals. We visited the Home Extension booth and purchased some of the knitted dish cloths made by the Winslow Home Extension group.

It's almost time for WestFest again. This year it will be held on September 19, 20, and 21st. The Presbyterian Ladies will be having a spaghetti supper on Friday evening, September 19th from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m. The prices are \$4.00 for ages 12 years and up; \$3.00 for ages 5 thru 11 years; and free to children under four. The meal includes spaghetti, salad, garlic bread, dessert, and beverage. All day Saturday, September 20th, we will be playing bingo for prizes; have sand art items for the children; crafts; hot dogs, sandwiches, and cold drinks at the church.

The West Fork library will also have a tent set up at WestFest for games and will be selling used books.

The Presbyterian "Country Store" will be held on Saturday, September 13th; 8:00 a.m. till 1:30 p.m. with most clothing \$1.00 a bag. We have some new and barely used baby clothes and shoes for very low prices. If you need school clothes and/or shoes, drop by and check out the bargains. Our pastor, Bill Brown, retired from the University of Arkansas on June 30th. A surprise luncheon was held on Sunday, June 29th following worship service. Pastor Brown was presented with several gifts including a plaque and a lawn chair with a cover. The decorations were all an island theme. Several earphones have been purchased by the First Presbyterian Church to help those who are hearing impaired to be better able to hear the sermon.

You know, there are lawsuits of all kinds anymore but the one that has really gotten to me is the 39 year old man in Michigan. Bradley LaShawn Fowler is seeking \$60 million from the Christian publishers Zondervan and \$10 million from Thomas Nelson Publishing. Mr. Fowler claims their versions of the bible that refer to homosexuality as a sin violate his constitutional rights and have cause him emotional pain and mental instability! Wow! He claims the intent of the publishers was to design a religious sacred document to reflect an individual opinion or a group's conclusion to cause "me or anyone who is a homosexual to endure verbal abuse, discrimination, episodes of hate, and physical violence....including murder." 




taste of something that seems to be only a memory in other parts of the world or even in this country..."Americana-

LogistiCare – Medicaid Mileage Reimbursement

This is an option if you take a friend or loved one to the doctor. For so many of us this is a part time job. This program helps quite a bit, “32 cents a mile.”

There are sign up forms and trip logs available at the Winslow Library and City Hall. Yes, you jump through a few hoops but soon get the hang of it. And they figure the mileage, say 56 miles to the doctor and back, at 32 cents, if my math is correct they contribute \$17.92 toward the trip.

It is less expense for Medicaid to pay a friend or family member to give the recipient a ride to the doctor than to pay a Medicaid Bus to come out to Winslow and transport the individual.


The bus will pick you up at your door at 8:30 and return you about 1:30. Or you can meet it downtown.





The Pastor's Pen

All the kids should read this, they will not learn this history in the schools! It is the truth the schools are trying to hide, sad!!!

OUR REAL ROOTS:

This is one e-mail that needs to be shared. But then, we may already be too late. God help us.

Did you know that 52 of the 55 signers of The Declaration of Independence were orthodox, deeply committed Christians? The other three all believed in the Bible as the divine truth, the God of scripture, and His personal intervention.

It is the same congress that formed the American Bible Society. Immediately after creating the Declaration of Independence, the Continental Congress voted to purchase and import 20,000 copies of scripture for the people of this nation.

Patrick Henry, who is called the firebrand of the American Revolution, is still remembered for his words, "Give me liberty or give me death." But in current textbooks the context of these words is deleted. Here is what he said: "An appeal to arms and the God of hosts is all that is left us. But we shall not fight our battle alone. There is a just God that presides over the destinies of nations. The battle sir, is not of the strong alone. Is life so dear or peace so sweet as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it almighty God. I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty, or give me death."

These sentences have been erased from our textbooks.

Was Patrick Henry a Christian? The following year, 1776, he wrote this "It cannot be emphasized too strongly or too often that this great nation was founded not by religionists, but by Christians; not on religion, but on the Gospel of Jesus Christ. For that reason alone, people of other faiths have been afforded freedom of worship here."

Consider these words that Thomas Jefferson wrote on the front of his well-worn Bible: "I am a Christian, that is to say a disciple of the doctrines of Jesus. I have little doubt that our whole country will soon be rallied to the unity of our Creator and, I hope, to the pure doctrine of Jesus also."

Consider these words from George Washington, the Father of our Nation, in his farewell speech on September 19, 1796:

"It is impossible to govern the world without God and the Bible. Of all the dispositions and habits that lead to political prosperity, our religion and morality are the indispensable supporters. Let us with caution indulge the supposition that morality can be maintained without religion. Reason and experience both forbid us to expect that our national morality can prevail in exclusion of religious principle."

Was George Washington a Christian? Consider these words from his personal prayer book: "Oh, eternal and everlasting God, direct my thoughts, words and work. Wash away my sins in the immaculate blood of the lamb and purge my heart by the Holy Spirit. Daily, frame me more and more in the likeness of thy son, Jesus Christ, that living in thy fear, and dying in thy favor, I may in thy appointed time obtain the resurrection of the justified unto eternal life. Bless, O Lord, the whole race of mankind and let the world be filled with the knowledge of thy son, Jesus Christ."

Consider these words by John Adams, our second president, who also served as chairman of the American Bible Society. In an address to military leaders he said, "We have no government armed with the power capable of contending with human passions, unbridled by morality and true religion. Our constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other."

How about our first Court Justice, John Jay?

He stated that when we select our national leaders, if we are to preserve our Nation, we must select Christians. "Providence has given to our people the choice of their rulers and it is the duty as well as the privilege and interest of our Christian Nation to select and prefer Christians for their rulers."

John Quincy Adams, son of John Adams, was the sixth U.S. President.

He was also the chairman of the American Bible Society, which he considered his highest and most important role. On July 4, 1821, President Adams said, "The highest glory of the American Revolution was this: it connected in one indissoluble bond the principles of civil government with the principles of Christianity."

Calvin Coolidge, our 30th President of the United States reaffirmed this truth when he wrote, "The foundations of our

society and our government rest so much on the teachings of the Bible that it would be difficult to support them if faith in these teachings would cease to be practically universal in our country.”

In 1782, the United States Congress voted this resolution: “The congress of the United States recommends and approves the Holy Bible for use in all schools.”

William Holmes McGuffey is the author of the McGuffey Reader, which was used for over 100 years in our public schools with over 125 million copies sold until it was stopped in 1963. President Lincoln called him the “Schoolmaster of the Nation.”

Listen to these words of Mr. McGuffey: “The Christian religion is the religion of our country. From it are derived our notions on character of God, on the great moral Governor of the universe. On its doctrines are founded the peculiarities of our free institutions. From no source has the author drawn more conspicuously than from the sacred Scriptures. From all these extracts from the Bible I make no apology.”

Of the first 108 universities founded in America , 106 were distinctly Christian, including the first. Harvard University, chartered in 1636. In the original Harvard Student Handbook rule number 1 was that students seeking entrance must know Latin and Greek so that they could study the scriptures:

“Let every student be plainly instructed and earnestly pressed to consider well, the main end of his life and studies is, to know God and Jesus Christ, which is eternal life, John 17:3; and therefore to lay Jesus Christ as the only foundation of all sound knowledge and learning. And seeing the Lord only giveth wisdom, let everyone seriously set himself by prayer in secret to seek it of him (Proverbs 2:3).”

For over 100 years, more than 50% of all Harvard graduates were pastors!

It is clear from history that the Bible and the Christian faith, were foundational in our educational and judicial system. However in 1947, there was a radical change of direction in the Supreme Court.

Here is the prayer that was banished:

“Almighty God, we acknowledge our dependence on Thee. We beg Thy blessings upon us and our parents and our teachers and our country. Amen.”

In 1963, the Supreme Court ruled that Bible reading was outlawed as unconstitutional in the public school system. The court offered this justification: “If portions of the New Testament were read without explanation, they could and have been psychologically harmful to children.”

Bible reading was now unconstitutional , though the Bible was quoted 94 percent of the time by those who wrote our

constitution and shaped our Nation and its system of education and justice and government.

In 1965, the Courts denied as unconstitutional the rights of a student in the public school cafeteria to bow his head and pray audibly for his food.

In 1980, Stone vs. Graham outlawed the Ten Commandments in our public schools.

The Supreme Court said this: “If the posted copies of the Ten Commandments were to have any effect at all, it would be to induce school children to read them. And if they read them, meditated upon them, and perhaps venerated and observed them, this is not a permissible objective.”

Is it not a permissible objective to allow our children to follow the moral principles of the Ten Commandments?

James Madison, the primary author of the Constitution of the United States , said this: “We have staked the whole future of our new nation, not upon the power of government; far from it. We have staked the future of all our political constitutions upon the capacity of each of ourselves to govern ourselves according to the moral principles of the Ten Commandments.”

Today we are asking God to bless America . But how can He bless a Nation that has departed so far from Him?

Most of what you read in this article has been erased from our textbooks. Revisionists have rewritten history to remove the truth about our country’s Christian roots.
