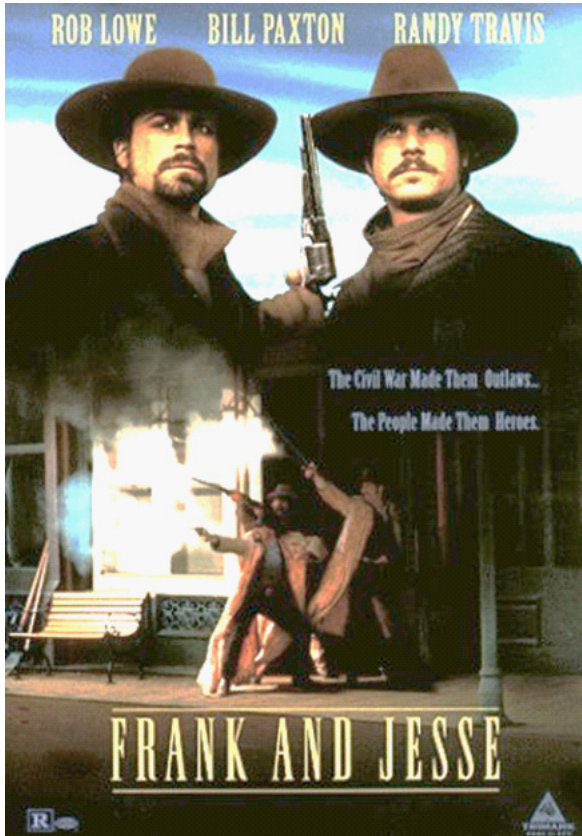

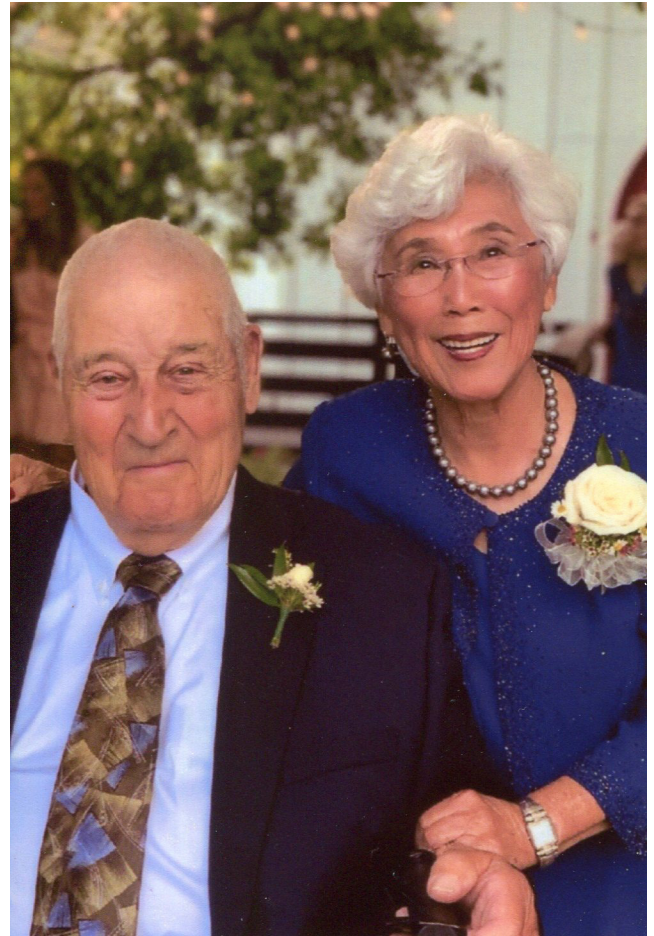
FRANK AND JESSE

We know that we will miss old friends and Winslow. We do hope to see you sometime.

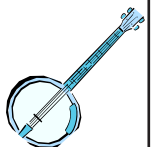

Arkansas-Gazette All-Arkansas Preps Boys Coach of the Year

Renner Reed, originally from Winslow was named the Arkansas-Gazette All- Arkansas Preps Boys Coach of the Year for 2021-2022.

Renner, son of Gary and Donna Reed, graduated from Winslow in 1999. He studied at Arkansas Tech in Russellville. After graduation he started his coaching career at Watson Chapel in Pine Bluff. While there he took his junior boys to the State Championship. His next coaching position was in Greenwood. Prior to the 2012-2013 his career led him to Lavaca coaching the Golden Arrows.

Renner decided that within ten years he would take the Golden Arrows to the State Championship and that is just what happened. For the last six years the Golden Arrows won 81% of all their games. This year the team only lost one regular season game and one game in the regional finals. They went on to win the first three state tournament games and finally winning against Magnet Cove 50 – 34 won the State Championship.

They reunited in 2010, and were married on September 26, 2015. They had a wonderful life together. He was the best husband, father, papa, brother, uncle, son-in-law, and friend anyone could ask for. Shane took pride in everything he did. He was a salt of the earth, and a hard working kind of man, providing for his family. He was a craftsman, baker, and gardener. Using his skills to bestow various gifts upon his family and friends. His dry, sarcastic sense of humor always brought a smile to everyone's face. He was that man. When you met him, you fell in love with him instantly. He enjoyed being out in nature and playing with his grandchildren. He was very laid back and easy to get along with. He wasn't a big talker, unless it was something he truly loved, but he was a great listener. When he did talk, everyone listened. He might have been a calm individual, but his presence was loud. His love for others was loud too, even in his silence. He preferred to live in the shadows, constantly on watch, patient, observant and ready to help anyone in need. He was intelligent. He loved learning new things, Native American history, and finding beauty in things others deemed trash. He would craft those things into something beautiful again and make sure to give it to someone he loved. He was proud of his crafts and giving made him feel good. He was known in his community for his famous cheesecakes and you didn't dare go into the kitchen if you were anything but gentle, as to not make his



cheesecakes fall. He loved nature and animals, he was caring, nurturing and a healer. It was almost like he could talk to animals. It was because he was so trustful and gentle. Nature was his playground and he really loved his old rickety tractor and driving it for no reason at all other than to enjoy the ride, the sun on his skin and the moment. Shane was goofy. He only would completely let loose when around children and then his own inner child would explode out of him. He would shine. He was loved and he loved. He also got a kick out of pranking people. For years he would leave \$100 dollar bills casually laying around the house. He would get chastised for being "irresponsible" and he would shrug it off and say that people don't see the things right in front of their faces. He finally admitted last year that the money was fake and would leave it around purposefully to get a rise out of the household. Only Shane would make a prank drag out for years for his own amusement. He was a penny pincher but he had an odd obsession with buying the most ridiculously funny things he could find from Wish, one of those items being the fake \$100 dollar bills, or the screaming blue pig that he used to annoy everyone in the house with. That is just a small example of the odd things he would collect. He would pay money for a good joke, but forget about buying new shoes. Shane wasn't perfect, he made mistakes in his past that he felt he could never in his life atone for. He felt undeserving of his family and children, but he loved with all he could give. Unbeknownst, to him, he really did atone for his past and much more. He vowed to do his best, do good in the world and he did that plus some. His impact might have been small to the world but to people in his life it was huge. Shane also lived his life being humble. He made a point to remind himself to not be his mistakes and to not repeat passed transgressions. He was a survivor and knew the most random tips and tricks on how to do things. If you asked him questions, he made sure to be transparent about the different stages in his life, but sometimes, at the expense of himself, he wouldn't try to rewrite someone else's narrative. He was selfless and didn't judge. Shane did not like fancy things, he was a home body, didn't care for material things or the spotlight, though if you asked him to dress nicely he would dress to the nines, but not so secretly hate it. He was a hard worker. He worked 8-10 hour shifts, 6 days a week. He was consistent, reliable and highly respected. He was not just his job though, even though that is where he spent 95% of his time and ultimately his last real moments. Shane was so much more, even beyond this text that can never even be put into words. Shane will be missed for as long as anyone who knew him lives. He will live on through our hearts and memories. Shane has a legacy within his children and grandchildren. It really shouldn't have been him, but he was called for a greater duty. He will be joining numerous loved ones. He will see his twin sons, Markus and Mason, whom he has wished to see again his whole life and that will be the most wonderful reunion. He will see Jimmy Wilson, who was like another father to him, whom he created a strong bond with over their love of motorcycles. We can only hope, as his family, that they are all up there together starting a motorcycle club in the clouds, looking down upon us, guiding and protecting us, and most of all loving us as we loved him. This is only a glimpse of his life, but there is so much more to him than this. Shane was multi-faceted and you never knew what you were going to get. He was one in a million. Arkansas; his sister Susan Pokrivnak of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; niece Wendy Pokrivnak and a great-nephew and niece of Fayetteville, Arkansas.

Michael loved people. He was known for his rapport, sense of humor, and talent with people – bringing joy and laughter to everyone. He never met a stranger and would make new friends everywhere he went, getting to know people quickly and discovering how they/we are all connected. It was his personal goal to make people smile and laugh. He believed that "laughter is the best medicine", which he learned from his amazing mother. People instantly liked and remembered Michael and vice versa. He had many enjoyable life lessons and stories he loved to share with everyone.

As a child in a military family, Michael was used to moving around a lot. His family lived several years in Heidelberg, Germany where Michael rode horses and was the batboy for the baseball team on the Army base. He finished school in Wethersfield, CT. He lived in many parts of New England, including Connecticut, Massachusetts, and New Hampshire. He also lived in California before moving to Winslow. He loved cross-country road trips (even hitchhiking!), and took multiple European trips. Michael has visited almost every state. He also loved to visit and hang out on the beach with his daughters and their families in California.

Michael enjoyed books, crossword puzzles and continually learning. He received his degree in History, as well as a teaching credential, at the University of Arkansas-Fayetteville. His daughters, Julie and Laurel, are both educators, as are several grandchildren. He was an avid and knowledgeable bird watcher and plant lover – able to tell you all about hundreds of species of both. He spoke Spanish (self-taught) and also learned greetings in multiple languages so he could greet people in their native tongue and make them smile.

Michael loved to take things apart and put them back together, and he was great at it! During his service in the Army, he built and repaired electronics. He was a computer technician for 10 years at Honeywell, Inc., in Massachusetts and in California. He has worked as a maintenance tech, waiter, truck driver, carpenter, and handyman. He was also the first Barista and instrumental in the startup, naming, and success of the Ar-saga's coffee business, 'marketing' and promoting it by word of mouth.

He is also well known for his business "Michael Can Fix It" which he started in the early 1990's, continuing until the COVID-19 pandemic made it necessary to close in 2020. His specialty was repairing espresso machines, but he also excelled at general handyman work and other repairs, such as exercise equipment (for the Sheriff's office and other local gyms and businesses).

In 1976, Michael moved his family to Winslow, Arkansas, where he began building his incredible "Hippie House," with lots of help, from lots of friends, over these last 46 years. He said it was "almost finished!" Always the jokester. He also said that he moved to Winslow along with the "Hippies" and "Hillbillies".. aka "Hipbillies".. and they all got along well! His Winslow home showcases his handiwork everywhere, along with huge flower gardens, and many beautiful plants (indoors and out). All the people in the area and those who came there, were a huge part of him.

One of Michael's biggest joys was his nearly 10 years volunteering at the VA. He loved helping and chatting with patients and staff. Before the VA, he also volunteered at Life Styles, Inc. He was politically active and donated to many charitable social organizations. He often joined Valerie in volunteering, supporting her when she led the Cargill Cares Council. His favorite pastime was hanging out at Ozark Natural Foods – ONF, eating a vegan burrito, and talking to anyone and everyone. He was one of the original charter owners of ONF. The people at the VA, ONF, and Northwest Arkansas in general, were not just great friends – they were like family to him and Valerie.

Everywhere he went—travel, work, volunteering—Michael made many life-long and amazing friends! Michael was well loved in the Northwest Arkansas area and his contributions, charm, and bubbly personality will be greatly missed.

A funeral with full military honors will be conducted at the Fayetteville National Cemetery on Tuesday, April 12, at 2:30 pm. A Celebration of Life memorial will be held in June. More details to follow when plans are finalized.

Community E-waste Event

The City of Winslow and Boston Mountain Solid Waste District have teamed together for an electronic recycling event on **Saturday - May 7, 2022 - 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM.**

What is e-waste? E-waste is a term used for electronics recycling. Electronics contain heavy metals, flame retardants, and other compounds known to cause health problems. Electronics are the fastest growing part of the solid waste stream, yet only about 18% of electronics are recycled in the US. Electronics are banned at most landfills, including the landfill in our District.



Items accepted for electronics recycling include:
