WINSLOW GARDENER

Spring didn't get here soon enough so I painted a picture of summer flowers: iris, coneflowers, day lilies, sunflowers. The canvas is 4' x 4'. I had some extra paint left over from a big canvas I'm working on (4' x 6') so I thought I would just use it to paint some flowers – just for a break. My intention was to hang it on the shed by our old house to provide a bright spot and to add some variety. The painting took fewer than five hours to do, and when it was finished, everyone told me it was too good to put out in the weather. It's very free and spontaneous and definitely very colorful. I'll have to do another one for the shed. When I hung the first big oil painting outside, I was warned that the painting would be damaged by exposure to the rain and sun and humidity, but I just replied, "No problem. I own the factory!"

As a gardener, I'm not whining about the weather. We need the moisture so badly, but I felt sorry for the school kids on spring break. There was all of that wonderful sunny weather just before the break. Then the rain, sleet, and snow came along and just about consumed their entire spring break. My grandson wanted to go fishing so badly, but the weather was just too yucky. We were going to build a fence around my garden plot, clean the yard, till the garden, but we couldn't even get that accomplished. On the positive side, it really isn't that long until school is out for the summer. So hang in there.

I did break down and buy a few flowers last Sunday. It was cold and windy, and I stopped by the grocery store on my way home. There was temptation waiting for me on the sidewalk. I bought pincushion flowers, dianthus, dusty miller, sweet william and alyssum. I like the common name pincushion flower better than scabiosa. Scabiosa sounds like a disease that itches. I justified buying the flowers so early by telling myself that I could get them put in planters and pots early and have them ready for warm weather. This summer I am going to try to limit myself to flowers in planters and pots on front porch and really, really try to

balance my flower growing with the water bill this summer. I've got my "greenhouse on wheels" set up, getting ready to plant seeds.

I actually got up very early last Saturday (Hey, I have a witness!) to get to American Milling which was closing its doors forever at noon that day – everything was discounted 50%. I bought 10 bags of cottonseed hulls and 15 bags of cedar mulch and two large hummingbird feeders. I'm sorry about the sale of this important part of our agricultural and gardening lives, and the folks who work there are, too. The old store wasn't much to look at, but I still liked it better than new condos. I'm just sad that another Washington County institution has shut down for the sake of "progress".

My husband likes to put the hummingbird feeders on opposite ends of the porch so that the aggressive male hummingbirds can be distracted long enough for other hummers to get something to eat. Berni Kurze, Washington County Extension agent, has a healthy recipe for hummingbird food: 1 part sugar to 4 parts water, no honey, no red food coloring. We make up large quantities and store it in the refrigerator so that it's ready when the hummingbirds zoom through the drive-in. Talk about dine and dash!

I usually mention the Winslow Farmer's Market in this column, and so I will remind everyone to plant a little extra, or replant a little extra if your garden got bit back or hailed on. We haven't picked an official date to start, but I think the minute anyone has something to sell, just come on down. It doesn't have to be vegetables or fruits or berries, bring eggs, honey, herbs, goat cheese to sell. I don't think we have any rules (no committee meetings, bosses, or dues either) except that everything should be homegrown or homemade, not store bought. The Market will be from 9AM to Noon - or until we are sold out - on Saturdays downtown.

Snow on the third day of Spring! I know I should try to have the same cheery attitude that the daffodils have even when the snow weighs them down to the ground, but I'm ready for spring warmth and sunshine.

Bring it on!



SPANISH CLUB NEWS

On February 17th, the Winslow Spanish Club took off to complete a goal that we set 2 years ago: Spain. We left from Little Rock, and after over 18 hours, we arrived in Madrid. We were met there by Rikardo, our tour guide for the next week. We were taken to our hotel on the outskirts of Madrid, where we met with a group of 20 students from Connecticut. We rested for a couple of hours before taking off on a walking tour of Madrid after taking our first ride in a subway. We walked past the Plaza del Sol, the Plaza Mayor, the Royal Palace, and the Plaza de Espana. We shopped a bit and wandered around before eating at the Museo de jamones (ham museum) and went back to the hotel for an early night.

Sunday was the highlight of my trip. I met the lady who was my host mother 20 years ago when I was a foreign exchange student in Madrid. She met us for the tour of the Royal Palace, where we learned that the king and queen really don't live, they just go there for official functions.

We saw the longest table that I have ever seen, and there was my favorite room that had 4 Stradavarius instruments. My Spanish mother stayed with us most of the rest of the day. We toured the Reina Sofia Museum that has Picasso's most famous painting, Guernica. We also toured the Prado, the main art museum, so most

of the kids had their fill of art. I said goodbye to my Spanish mother, and we went had "tapas," or hearty snacks like potato omlet, squid, ham, croquettes, and bread for dinner. The final group that was to travel with us finally caught up to us about dinnertime. "Michigan" had been delayed by bad weather getting out of the United States, and had ended up in Rome overnight before catching a flight to Madrid.

Monday, we said "adios" to Madrid, and headed for the south of Spain. We stopped about 2 hours into our 5 hour bus ride to view the Mesquita at Cordoba. It was a Muslim mosque during the Arab occupation from 711 until 1492. After the Catholic kings took over this city, they turned the mosque into a Catholic church, but preserved much of its beautiful architecture. The structure is filled with

beautiful pillars and red and white arches.

Tuesday, we took a walking tour of Seville. We learned that many of the buildings have been used in movies like Star Wars, Lawrence of Arabia, and Kingdom of Heaven. We toured the Alcazar - another name for a palace, and we found out that the king and queen really do use this palace. The

gardens were lovely, and it was right next to the cathedral, which is the fourth largest in the world. We climbed the tower there which again was a muslim edifice that was incorporated into a catholic church. The the minaret had a ramp where a muslim imam would ride a donkey up to the top to call the muslims to prayer 5 times each day. Most

of the kids had their first chance to taste paella, a Spanish rice dish. It started out as a casserole at the end of the week. The ladies would start with rice and add leftover peas from one meal, a little chicken from another meal, maybe a little seafood from a third, throw in a little saffron, and cook up the stew. It was great.

The next day, we headed to Granada, and another highlight of my trip. We went to the Alhambra, the last stronghold of the last Moorish king in 1492. It is a virtual city within a city. It has incredible Moorish architecture. The fountains were gravity fed, and after all these centuries, they still work. It is still a beautiful site, and it is so popular that it is difficult to get tickets to go through it. Though the day was cold and wet, we still toured the gardens and saw the Generalife, the "summer house" for the king and his harem.

Next it was on to Torremolinos and Malaga. We did a lot of shopping and walked to the lovely beach of the Mediterranean Sea. Unfortunately, it was cold and wet, so all we did was play on the sand in our coats. We went to Malaga one day and went to the Picasso Museum there. It is a relatively new museum, and many of the works were either donated or on loan from private collections of family members. There was nothing there that was really famous, but it was an interesting museum nevertheless. One in our group took an added excursion to Gibraltar that day, and she enjoyed seeing "the rock" and the famous tail-less monkeys.

Then it was time to come home. The kids all decided that they would like to stay another week, but I was ready to see my family, though I would not have missed the trip for anything.

We are so grateful to everyone in Winslow for all your support over the past 2 years of fundraising and the change of schools. We were sad not to represent Winslow High School as planned, but proud still to be Winslow Spanish Club. We will host a thank-you reception for the community from 3:00 to 5:00 on Sunday, April 2nd in the Sky-View Lodge Upper Room. 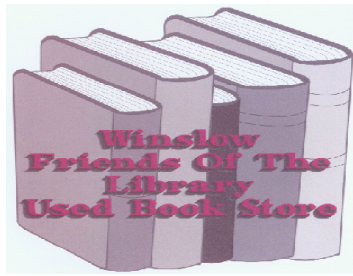

One day, there was a blind man sitting on the steps of a building with a hat by his feet and a sign that read: "I am blind, please help.

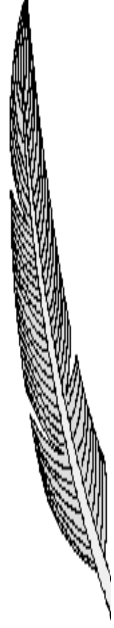

I recall a speech John Kennedy made during the Cuban missile crises. I can't quote any part of the speech but the essence of his words has lingered in my mind all these years. Much of the world today is living as victims of a regime that has a strangle hold on its citizens.

In the late 1930's there was quite a stir in my little town about the little Bavarian with a funny mustache. I heard one man say "Oh he's just a will of the wisp, he won't be around long." His comment brought a spirited debate. It was Hitler's evil objective to live long and build a regime that would exist for a thousand years and he would build it on the ashes of the oldest human race of mankind and all others who stood in his way.

Soon after he seized control over Germany he found other totalitarian rulers; Mussolini, Stalin and Hiro Hito who signed a treaty with the intent to dominate the world. It became necessary for nations who sought good to form a coalition against evil and the resolve of good people won.

What would the world be like if Hitler had not been defeated?

Shortly thereafter emerged another nation with evil intent toward its neighbor and we found ourselves embroiled in the Korean War. We did not call it a war but many of my buddies died and were buried there. There was no surrender. We lost our resolve and a truce was signed. There was something different about our homecoming than the homecoming after World War Two, just a few short years earlier. There were not many people who cared about Korea because there was no resolution.

We had left something unfinished.

And so it was in Viet Nam.

Kennedy said terrorism by its nature will fail because it can not stand against those who are good.

Evil has existed in the heart of man since the beginning of time and if left with no resistance will destroy people, families, communities and nations. The longer it is ignored the more savage it becomes and the more difficult to destroy.

We are clearly in the threshold of another world crisis. We must not lose our resolve. Let's stand for good.

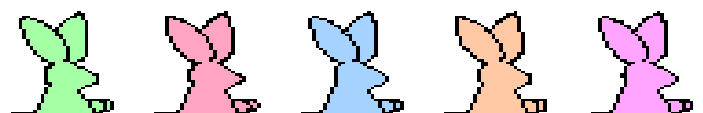

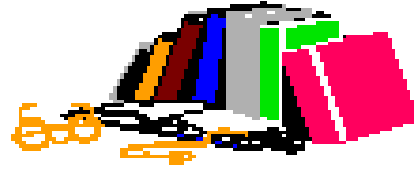
