Winslow will hold the Spring City-wide clean up on May 15th. All items must be at the curb no later than May 14th and will be picked up on May 15th.

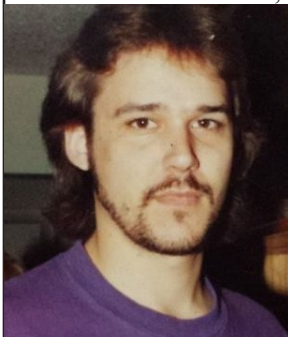
This clean up is for residents within the city limits of Winslow only.

Velda Elizabeth Brotherton

February 1, 1936 - March 9, 2023



Velda Elizabeth Goodgion Brotherton was born February 1, 1936 to Ray Goodgion and Georgia Smith Goodgion at what is now Lake Fort Smith. She grew up in Wichita, KS where she met and married her husband Donald J. Brotherton. He preceded her in death.

Velda and Don had two children, Jerilyn Rae Henson (Farrel) of Winslow, and Chris Randall Brotherton; 3 grandchildren, Benjamin Brotherton, Daniel Henson, Amanda Miller; 2 great grandsons, Aidan Joseph Oakley, and Jace Carter Williams. She was born near Mountainburg AR, raised in Wichita Kansas, lived in Bayshore, NY, returned to Arkansas and settled in Winslow where she helped build her own and her parents' home.

During her life, she worked many acceptable jobs for her era, called secretary at the time. She worked as a feature writer for the Washington County Observer out of West Fork AR, taught piano to many local children and adults, was an accomplished artist and author

On March 9, 2023, Velda Brotherton left this earth and entered a new adventure. Even though all who love her feel her absence, she didn't leave us forsaken. She left us a legacy to be continued in her name and to honor her memory. She was a storyteller, historian, and mentor to hundreds of writers. There is a poem that speaks of the dash between our birth date and our death date. The dash represents how we lived and loved. The reader is challenged to live a life of significance. To have a positive impact. Velda Goodgion Brotherton's dash fulfilled this challenge.

In 1936, Velda Goodgion was born in a log cabin in the Ozark Mountains. Velda once said her father was a storyteller who started her journey into the world of story. Her passion was historical writing, both nonfiction, and fiction. However, while these stories took root in her mind and soul, it wasn't until she turned fifty that they were given life on paper. Before then she expressed her

creativity in painting and music. Along with her husband, Don Brotherton whom she married when she was seventeen, she raised two children, She gardened, canned her produce, milked cows, and made cheese and butter, like the women before her. All the while, her appreciation, curiosity, and desire for preserving history grew within her. Someone had to write them down, stories that needed to be told.

When Velda turned fifty, she began writing in earnest. Her first six books were western historical, which she had to make into romances at the request of her publisher. Then she turned to writing regional nonfiction and worked as a feature writer for a small rural newspaper. This led her on great adventures in the Boston Mountains chasing stories, and interviewing long-time locals, no matter how rough the road or bad the weather. Velda was relentless and fearless when chasing a story, much to her husband's chagrin. Her drive came from her strong belief generational stories must be recorded and passed on before they were lost. She wanted them to be woven in time. Velda was a master weaver.

Writing was a way of life for her. She is the author of forty-three books. She won many awards. Her most proud moment was being a 2008 WILLA finalist. Even so, she was much more than an award-winning author. She was a mentor. There is a quote by Khalil Gibran that describes Velda's contribution to all who have had the honor of knowing her and who have sat under her teaching: "Oh heart, if one should say to you that the soul perishes like the body, answer that the flower withers, but the seed remains." Velda sowed seeds of inspiration, knowledge, encouragement, validation, and acceptance. What a fantastic crop has come from her generosity.

What more can one say about Velda? Her love for laughter, her twinkling blue eyes, her wisdom, her readiness to help anyone who needed her, certainly. Her contribution to preserving the anecdotal history of the Boston Mountains and the west, absolutely. However, for all who were blessed enough to be called her friends, hundreds of us, Velda's light will continue to shine. She has left a footprint on our hearts. She has made that positive impact. She has been faithful and fulfilled her dash.

Velda always said that she wanted to die at her computer and that her cold fingers would have to be pried off the keys. Thankfully, this was not the case. However, in the hospital, she asked for paper. Days before her passing, she wrote a beautiful romantic western scene. The woman couldn't stop writing. On Thursday, March 9th, her soul grew too large for her body. Like a butterfly, she emerged into a vast new life.

Frank McCourt once said, "I am teaching. Storytelling is teaching." In that case, Velda is a master teacher. May we all learn from Velda to value our story, to love life, and in whatever we do to have a positive impact on all who cross our paths. In other words, be like Velda.

Cremation arrangements were under the direction of Moore's Chapel Funeral Home in Fayetteville.

Beverly June White

July 26, 1931 - March 12, 2023



On Sunday, March 12, 2023, the moment finally arrived that Bev had been waiting for. Beverly June White was born at home in Tulsa, Oklahoma to Earl and Jennie Neely on July 26, 1931. Her Grandma (Minnie Neely) bathed her plump little body in the white ceramic bowl displayed at the entrance to the chapel.

She grew up with two younger sisters, Carolyn Raines (who preceded her in death) and Janice

Cox.

While still in high school, she met her lifelong sweetheart Bobby Harold "Bob" White, at Wigwam Bakery, where they both were working. And the adventure began (you'd have to have known Bob to understand!) They were married June 3, 1949 and had four children, Connie, Roger, Gerald, and Kevin. They lived in Tulsa until 1969 when they chose to move with their two youngest boys to Winslow, Arkansas. They remained in Winslow for 28 years until they decided to make Florida their home instead of a winter haven.

Through the years of child-rearing, Bev was involved in cub scouts and 30 years of baseball, basketball, and football. We're pretty sure she never missed a game.

And then grandchildren began arriving...and great-grandchildren...30 to date.

In 2007, they moved back to Arkansas to be closer to family. Following Bob's death in 2011, Bev remained in her cabin (her "comfort zone" as she called it) and for the first time in 80 years lived alone.

And although life was not always "easy" for them, they truly lived an exemplary type of life Paul describes in Philippians 4:12:

"I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want."

Bev adored spending time with family, and passed down the simple pleasure of taking time to sit around the fireplace or a campfire sharing stories, reminding each other just how very blessed we are. So much so, that most of us thought every family was just like ours – loving, adventurous, generous, fun, and content. (It's been a bit painful to realize that not all families are like that.)

She was fiercely patriotic, a die-hard Razorback and Dallas Cowboys fan, devoted to Scripture and a faithful prayer warrior. She prayed for her family every single day, her greatest desire being to see each one fall in love with and follow her Savior.

She was 91 years old when that "moment" she had been waiting for arrived...Jesus took her by the hand and walked her home.

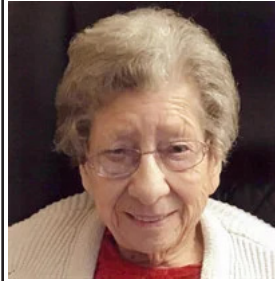

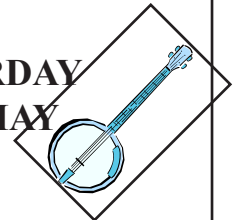

About Beaver Watershed Alliance

The Alliance represents a diverse stakeholder group from conservation, education, water utilities, technical and science, agriculture, recreation, business, and local government groups working together for the goal of clean water.

Our key focus and metrics include Education and Outreach, Technical Assistance and Best Management Practices, and Planning/Analysis.

Education and Outreach: With nearly thirty people moving into the Northwest Arkansas region per day, and 1 in 5 Arkansians relying on Beaver Lake as their drinking water source, a major component of the Alliance effort is to provide outreach and education programming. We provide education and outreach to over 30k landowners, work with hundreds of volunteers, and inform cities, counties and planners on water quality trends and topics.

Technical Assistance: The Alliance offers technical assistance to address water management on the farm, along waterways, and on forest, pasture and urban properties. We encourage and implement voluntary best management practices (BMPs) such as planting native trees, pasture aeration, rain gardens and riparian restoration to prevent or reduce non-point source pollution and mitigate flooding to help achieve water quality goals. Sediment and phosphorus are currently the two pollutants of highest concern regarding the quality and cost of our drinking water.

Conservation Champions: Local Farmer Highlight: James & Jane Maginot



The National Wildlife Federation “Conservation Champion” program strives to educate local producers on soil and water quality benefits. Soil health is a vital part of any agricultural operation and greatly benefits

the quality of water for nearby areas. These practices also lead to more profitable production and long-term benefits for the growing animals or crops. For livestock producers, rotational grazing is a key tactic in growing healthy animals and maintaining healthy soil for vegetation growth. Vegetation growth in pastures or cover crops for vegetable producers provides better temperature regulation for soil and reduces erosion, especially in important areas near waterways. Water quality depends on vegetation filtering nutrients and sediments from vital water sources.

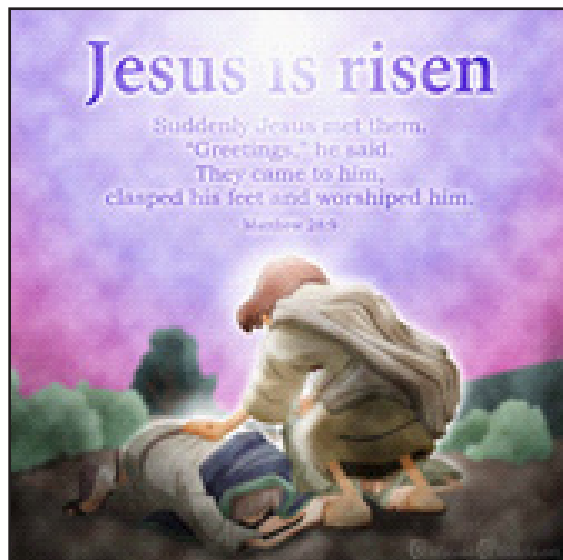
Local farmers to the Winslow and West Fork area, James and Jane Maginot, have lived and worked on their farm for 14 years raising several kinds of livestock and producing vegetables over that time. Currently raising cattle and poultry and growing vegetables, this family-run operation has been growing sustainable products specifically to help bolster soil health along the White River. For the Maginots, cattle production came secondary as their interest was primarily in environmental health. With 80 acres near Winslow and 40 acres bordering the White River in West Fork, the Maginots see their riparian area as an incredible responsibility, but all 120 acres as an opportunity to enrich the local environment as well.

Rotational grazing was a large undertaking for Jane and James that required first establishing a diverse assortment of grasses and then ridding their fields of invasives or weeds. The natural history of Arkansas has a rich variety of prairie ecosystems, with grazing done

by bison and ungulates primarily (www.uaex.uada.edu). The Maginots use this as a guide to design their rotational setup. For rotational grazing, evenly distributing waste products from their cattle and evenly grazing allows the paddocks to have time to recover. Each year they strive for a 300-day grazing window. Such a wide grazing period allows their cattle to be well-fed and happy through winter and keeps the Maginots from buying as much hay each winter as well.

For the Maginots, soil health not only requires sustainable grazing, but also sustainable input of nutrients. The chickens raised at the Maginot's farm also provide litter for the rest of their products. To farm sustainably, all aspects of nutrient management are thought through, even down to the decomposers supported in their pastures. The soil directly benefits from this diversity and balance, which benefits the livestock and their owners. Producing healthier cattle with a year-round food supply has been a major win for the Maginots since applying these practices.

Soil health and water quality go hand in hand. For agricultural producers and farmers, soil health can save time and money for landowners. In the Beaver Lake watershed of Northwest Arkansas, clean water is vital as our community grows and continues to add importance to Beaver Lake, the drinking water source for 1 in 6 Arkansans. The Beaver Watershed Alliance can help landowners, farmers, and producers of any scale learn how to better manage soil and water to protect our vital natural resources. 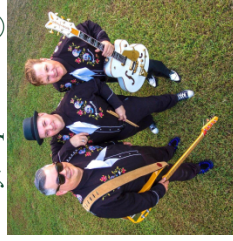

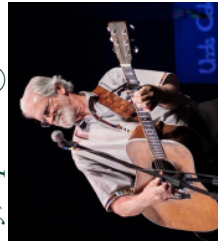

Thank you so much for reaching out about a possible article in the Winslow Paper. I enjoyed our visit last Saturday!

We've been working in the small town of Annan in SW Scotland for 7 years now, spending 2-3 months per year there. We had been advising the council on different perspectives for possible effective measures they can take to help revive the dying "High Street" businesses district. While as an American entrepreneur, I can get creative and build something that would take off, we believe it's important to "do no harm" to existing businesses since our purpose is to help them. It became apparent with the defunding of the public library that they needed a children's bookshop. As we approached the local Members of Parliament and Community Council with the idea, we were told that if we were going to have books, we had to have coffee to support it (Amazon has closed all the small bookshops). I bristled at the idea since there were already 5 other businesses that served coffee and I wanted to "do no harm". Then the idea came that there are no coffee roasters in all of Southern Scotland. Piece by piece it came together and before long I had a roastery in my garage! As I developed the profiles for various roasts, and a brand intended for Scotland, friends were buying it all up as soon as I could roast it. After a recent job loss I had to realize that God has granted me the gift of a personal roastery and a faithful client base to build upon. *Note: we still have plans to relocate to Annan in the future but at the moment, we're delayed as we wait for the purchase of our building to be complete. We are planning for Solway Coffee Roasters to maintain a presence here even after we move.

A little about the name... Solway is the ancient name given to the southern-most water inlet from the Irish Sea. The Scots name for an inlet, or estuary, is a "Firth". The town of Anna is located on the River Annan, where it meets the Solway Firth. Annan is known as the "History Town of Scotland" because their history predates Roman occupation. Farther back than anybody knows, the Haaf-Net was used in the Solway Firth to catch salmon returning to the local rivers from the Irish Sea and North Atlantic. The fisherman would stand in the tidewaters holding onto the cross-shaped net and catch these salmon. The practice continues to this day more for nostalgia than for existence though. By adopting the image of a Haaf-net on our logo, we pay tribute to the bravery of generations who braved the frigid waters and shifting quicksands of the Solway to provide for their families and communities.

As mentioned before, the branding was specifically developed for Scotland but seems to resonate here as well as the story is told. Lockerbie is a village of 2500 people, mostly known as the place where PanAm 103 fell after being bombed by Libyans in 1984. The scars still exist on the land and in the hearts of the residents. Because of this, we speak "Light" over lockerbie and pray for them often, calling our lightest roast profile "Lockerbie Light".

The headwaters for "The River Annan" (which flows through the

town of Annan) begin in the "Lower Uplands" about 55 miles to the north in the town of Moffat. The waters begin as a trickle out a peat bog on the top of a hill. As it emerges, the water is dark (like coffee) from the tannins in the peat. By the time it travels 3 miles to Moffat, it's crystal clear and heads toward the Solway. Moffat is a beautiful market town and is a must stop location in the area.

To the west of Southern Scotland is the Galloway Forest. This area is one of 6 Dark Sky designated areas in the world where there is zero light pollution. I hear the stars and northern lights are amazing to observe from the Galloway forest. However, when we've tried to see the sky, it was overcast and raining! Nonetheless, we have decided to name our darkest roast Galloway Dark. I will add here that Galloway Dark is not a "burned" dark roast which tend to be more bitter. Extreme care is taken with each batch to make sure it's perfect. If it's not, it doesn't get the name!
