Update on Winslow City Projects

The new pump station with 3 shiny new 40 hp pumps is in full production pushing water up over the mountain into the holding tanks and from there into our homes. The Mayor says we should be set for a good while, hopefully about 20 years.

The Winslow City Council approved, either partially or fully, resurfacing eleven city streets earlier this year. This project was completed April 26th.

The paving around the Winslow Pavilion has also been completed. The Master Gardeners of Winslow will landscape around the Pavilion and Downtown area again this year. They have done a beautiful job in years past.

Winslow Ball Park will soon have a new picnic pavilion ready for use. The slab has been poured and construction on the uprights will begin in a few days. This Picnic Pavilion will have a charcoal unit at each end with tables and seating under the roof. It will be available for the public for reunions, parties, and other get-togethers. Reservations for use of

the facility will be required. Please reserve it for your special function by calling Winslow City Hall at 479-634-3901

Next time you visit City Hall, notice the new doorway that has been cut between the old library and city hall. The room previously occupied by the Winslow Library will soon be a Winslow Museum Room. It will house the diorama of downtown Winslow in 1924 and many of the small items that were donated to the City during the Centennial in 2005. The larger items will be set up for display in the old Rock School Building that currently houses the Winslow Library, the Winslow Internet Café, the Friends of the Library Bookstore and the Washington County Sheriff's sub station.

The 1882 Portal Rock Is Coming Home

Winslow Tunnel opened for railroad traffic through the Boston Mountains on August 30, 1882. There was a Portal Rock with the 1882 date carved in the rock above the entrance to the tunnel on both the north and south side.

By 1967, the tunnel was almost too small to accommodate the larger engines, and railcars traveling the rails. The railroad enlarged the tunnel and the two Portal Rocks were removed. For several years, the whereabouts of these rocks were unknown. The South Portal Rock was believed to be in Frisco Railroad Museum in Missouri and according to Bob Winn, the North Portal Rock might have been damaged or destroyed when it was removed.

In December 2006, a local resident, Beth Reed, was traveling by air and just happened to be seated next to a man from the Rogers Museum. While talking he mentioned that he knew where the Portal Rock was and told her the present owner might be interested in donating it back to the city. She brought the information back to Winslow and the owner was contacted. Denny Luke is working to make the arrangements to bring it home.

All of the logistics have not been worked out at this writing as to who will transport the 2500 pound rock that measures approximately 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ wide x 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ tall x 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ deep or when it arrive.

We all look forward to an important piece of Winslow History returning home.

The Obsessive Gardener And Other Oxymorons I Have Known

My mother is a plantaholic, and an obsessive gardener. She gets so distracted and distant in her garden, like she is on another planet or in another universe. One time when she was kneeling in front of a new flower bed, I said hi, and I could tell she was only barely aware that I had spoken. So I said, "Mom, I'm going to Mars. I don't know when I'll be back". She said, "Well, drive safely, honey" and went back to contemplating her garden. I asked her one time what she was thinking about when she was gardening, and she said, "If I'm doing it right, I'm not thinking at all."

Even when her garden was full and after she had proclaimed there was not one square inch of space left for even a single plant, she would drive off to her favorite nursery and buy a truckload of plants and bring them home. I think she believed that if she bought the plants, surely the soil would somehow magically appear, much like the old joke -"How can I be overdrawn? I still have checks!" She has a variety of excuses for buying plants for which she has absolutely no space: "Well, it looked lonesome.... Look, it's getting ready to bloom.....It just hopped into my cart....Well, if I didn't buy it, somebody else would have....l've never even heard of this plant..... She claims that winters are very convincing in Arkansas. So, when the crocus and daffodil and forsythia appear, it is always a miracle, an absolute miracle.

During the long winter months, she will tell my father her plans for the garden. He nods or says it sounds like a good idea to him. Both of them know her plans will change in a week or so, depending on what the next seed and flower catalogs have to offer. She will make elaborate plans, diagrams, color drawings of where what should be planted. When the actual planting time arrives, she will be like a madwoman. Every available minute, she will be in the yard, elbows in rich compost and soil and manure, filthy jeans, dirt caked on her. She will then step back totally pleased with the results, delighted to see that there may be just barely enough room to squeeze in just a couple more plants. This is the annual rite of spring, the celebration begins. Bye, Mom, see you next Fall!

Have you ever wondered what happened to all the kids that you helped send to Spanish speaking countries? Did those trips make a difference in their lives? Let me catch you up on a couple of young women from Winslow.

Jackie Baltrusch graduated from Winslow in May of 2002. She was with me on the first trip to Spain. During college, she went on several mission trips to Spanish speaking countries. She was able to use her Spanish while ministering there. I remember one class period in particular that she first saw a picture of Machu Picchu in Peru. She told me that day, "I'm going to go see that someday." Little did we know, that less than 5 years later, she would be on a mission trip to Peru. While there, she had the chance to go to Machu Picchu. She was very sick the morning that they were supposed to leave, but thought, "I may never have a chance to see this again." She got on the bus, and went. It was every bit as breathtaking as she imagined.

Last fall, Jackie returned to Spain to study for a semester in Alicante. While there, she did some traveling - mostly in the south of Spain that we did not see during our 10 days there in 2002. She came back with a renewed love for the people of Spain and the beautiful country and architecture there. Now she is finishing her last semester of college, where she has been doing student teaching in preparation for finishing her major in elementary education. She knows that she will be able to use her Spanish in communication with students' parents, because most schools in Arkansas now have a Spanish speaking population.

Another of our former students is in Spain right now. Rachel Yingling studied in Alicante during the 2005 -2006 school year. She returned to the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville last year, and after graduation, got a scholarship to teach English as a Second Language in Madrid, Spain. She has enjoyed her year, and has learned much about being a teacher. She has done some traveling and went to Germany recently to meet Uli and Beata, two former Winslow exchange students from Europe.

Rachel's travel plans will continue next year, as she was recently accepted into a graduate program in North Carolina. She will return home in July, go to the University of North Carolina in the fall, and then return to Madrid, Spain for 11 months next year.

I Learn Lot About God From My Kids

There is a special allure of a mud puddle to a seven-year-old little boy. When I looked out the window to find Titus sitting and splashing gleefully in the muddy mess that once was our driveway, I said to myself, "at least he has his play clothes on, let him have fun." I watched as he painted his body brown with the mud, covering all patches of skin on his arms, legs, and face. Through the muddy mask, I could still see his eyes dance with delight at his resourcefulness. Then I looked out and he was gone. Curious to see where he was going in such a sloppy, messy state and hoping that he hadn't already made his way through the house, I set out on a search. Not in the house—relief, not on the swing set—curious, not racing through the yard as a superhero—surprising. Then, I heard him. A giggle and a splash caused me to look around and find him in the most unsuspecting place.

I had built a small water fountain out of concrete. The little basin is in the ground surrounded by rocks and is barely larger than a garbage can lid. I had put a little fountain in to keep away mosquitoes and to make a splashing sound that I can listen to when I sit in the garden. This little pond it just the right size for an industrious little boy.

I looked to see Titus sitting in the middle of the fountain, his legs carefully folded into the pond so that his whole body was wrapped into this small space. He had the little fountain pump using it as a shower. The clear water, which I had worked so hard, to keep clean was now a brown, cloudy mess. He looked up at me and smiled, "Mom, I knew you might get mad that I was dirty, so I'm getting clean for you."

Naaman had a special kind of dirt. He had the dirt of sin and he had the disease of leprosy. When he wanted a cure he went to the prophet Elisha expecting him to wave his hand over him and make the leprosy fall from his body. Naaman thought that perhaps Elisha would make him do some fancy ritual, complete some great feat, or pay some high price to be healed but Elisha asked him to pay a higher price—his pride. You see, Elisha told Naaman to dip himself into the Jordan River seven times, not the clean nobler rivers of Abana and Pharpar, but the river of the Israelites—the muddy Jordan.

Finally, Naaman turns loose of his anger and turns loose of his pride and the Bible says that his flesh was restored and became clean like that of a young boy.

Speaking of young boys, my son is now done with his fountain bath. It wasn't the water of the Jordan that made Naaman clean, it was his act of obedience. It is not the fountain that will clean my son, but his act of repentance. He is dipping in the fountain to be made clean again. Come to think of it, when I look at me, I realize that I have some cleaning to do. I wonder if there is room for me in that fountain.
