This is the second time in the 24 years of Win-Fest that rain has tried to dampen the spirits and activities of the participants. 1996 came to be known as the "Great Win-Fest Mud-Fest"; with the rain, beginning mid afternoon after the crowd was already at the park. That day will forever be history as will this year, 2006. The rain began early in the morning, long before the first band set up. Win-Fest has always said "The Show Must Go On, Shine or Rain!" and that's what it did. History was made again. The emcees and the bands



kept the excitement going. Seven bands were originally scheduled, only one canceled, and the group Township 13 took up the slack, kept the crowd dancing and swaying with the music. Willin & Able kicked things off shortly after 1:00 PM followed by Big Wheel Trike. Their music was upbeat and set the mood for the day. 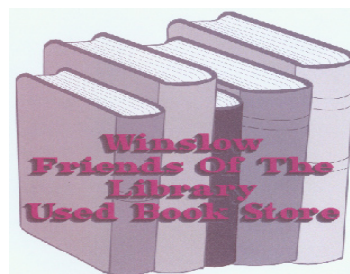
## Writing Creative Non-Fiction Workshop

She also writes a weekly historical feature for *The White River Valley News*, and recently won an award from the Arkansas Press Association for one of her feature articles.

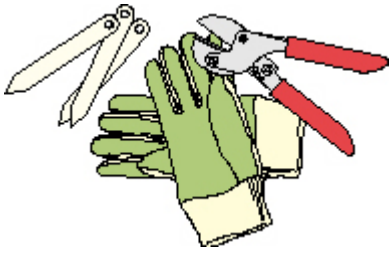
### 4-H Enrollment Open

## **Winslow Gardener**

Sometime in August, on one of those super hot days, I promised my husband that I would never complain again about the cold Ozark winters. That promise lasted until 7:00 a.m. Saturday, September 23rd. The 13-hour long power outage Friday/Saturday had not sweetened my mood all that much to begin with. During the power outage, we got to watch an incredible lightning show off in the north. To get an update on the weather, we put on our raincoats and went out and sat in the car and listened to the radio. We talked about the fact that without electricity, we really can't build much of anything. Lee said he wasn't even sure where his old handsaw was, and he was trying to think of what tools he had that didn't require electricity – not many, that's for sure. That whole thing about men and their power tools is way beyond me, but I did think about all the truly indispensable power tools in my kitchen: can opener, toaster, juicer, coffee grinder, microwave, crock pot, mixer, blender, clocks and timers. Even our toothbrushes are electric. We were pretty much powerless, so we lit two oil lamps and several candles, read by flashlight, and reminisced about the old days.

We did not have electricity or a phone when I was growing up on a ranch in northern New Mexico. I really do appreciate the benefits of electricity, and I have to tell you that without electricity, the good old days weren't all that great, in my opinion. We had a wood-burning cook stove, coal-burning Warm Morning stove, a gasoline-operated washing machine, and a kerosene-operated refrigerator, sad irons and a gas-operated iron, the fumes of which guaranteed a splitting headache after an hour of

ironing. We did our homework by the light of Coleman lanterns and coal oil lamps. My dad had a dry-cell battery radio and we got to listen to the Grand Ole Op'ry and boxing matches. Now, of course, I wish I had all of these "antiques" just to show my grandkids and their friends what a tough life in the old days really looked like. The bedrooms weren't heated but the bathroom was – a kerosene heater. We did have an indoor bathroom, but that was really considered a luxury item – one that my grandmother raising five kids insisted upon when the house was built. My brother and I hauled and chopped a lot of wood. We had to take out the ashes. It seemed to me growing up that we had an awful lot of chores to do before we could go play. It built character, well, actually it built two characters, me and my brother!

With or without electricity, what hasn't changed is raising a garden. We had a big garden. We raised and put up a lot of food. Everybody worked in the garden, hoeing, pulling weeds, irrigating with water from the horse tank. Corn, watermelon, peppers, tomatoes, okra - everything except herbs. My mom had a bed of asparagus, which we kids hated THEN. Now I think of the fortune in asparagus that we turned up our noses at. And rhubarb, which I still pretty much hate; there's not enough sugar in the world to keep that stuff from tasting like rhubarb. Home-made cottage cheese, cream so thick you could slice it, sweet pickles that cracked, roast beef, fried chicken, venison chili, biscuits-bacon-and-gravy, all kinds of beans, and hand-churned butter – the menu goes on forever. All this great food and we still thought a bologna sandwich on store-bought bread was the greatest thing since Grapette and Delaware Punch.

My dad, being a rancher of the old school, could take a beautiful inch-thick steak, flour it and fry it in lard down to something like jerky. I didn't have a real steak with real juice until I was in college, make that medium rare, please. We never had lamb. No sheep. "This is a cattle ranch,"

Dad said, and such is the nature of prejudice that my four siblings and I still won't eat lamb. I've tried, and there's not enough mint jelly in the world to keep that stuff from tasting like a dead sheep.

Well, the electricity finally came back on Saturday morning. No coffee at the Mercantile, but a few brave folks had gathered downtown for Farmer's Market, and I bought some delicious homemade bread and pumpkin muffins in remembrance of the good part about the good old days.

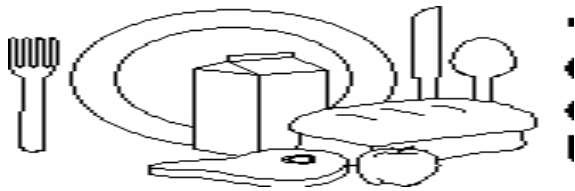
## 30 + YEARS ANNUAL CROQUET TOURNAMENT

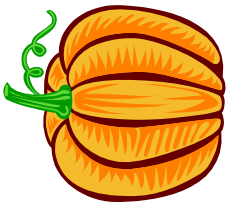

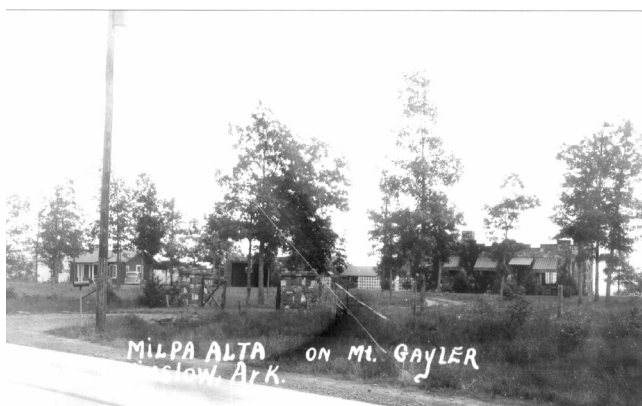
