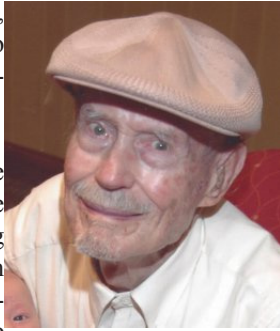

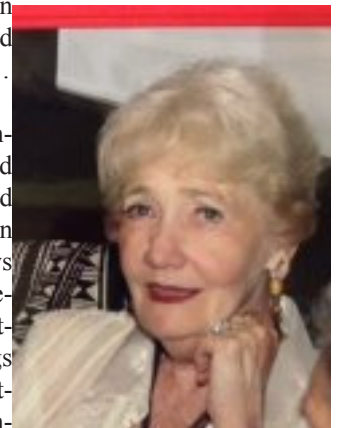


## Vera Jean Harrison

### **Peter Lawrence Marchant**

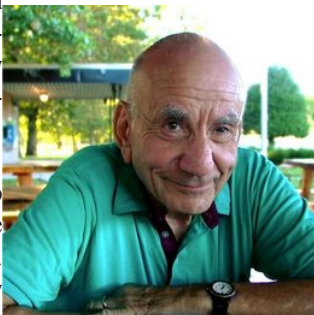
May 14, 1928 - Oct. 26, 2013

Peter Lawrence Marchant, 85, died Oct. 26, 2013, in Washington Regional Hospital. He was born May 14, 1928, in London, England, to Esther and Robert Marchant.

During World War II, he was sent to Uppingham, a boarding school in the country, to escape the London Blitz. At 18, he joined the British Army and was assigned to the education core, where he discovered his lifelong love of teaching.

After military service he went to Cambridge University, Caius College, and after graduating, first went to Canada, where he taught English in Vancouver for a year before enrolling in the Ph.D. program at the University of Iowa, where he met his future wife, the Arkansas novelist, Mary Elsie Robertson. After earning his Ph.D. from Iowa and publishing his thesis novel "Give Me Your Answer Do," his academic specialty became the 19th-Century British novel, which he taught at Penn State and the State University of New York, Brockport. His dedication to teaching earned him the Excellence in Teaching award.

Later in his career, he became more and more interested in the stories and experiences of the survivors from the Holocaust. Even after Peter partially retired, he continued to teach one class a semester, the Literature of the Holocaust. Through that class, and working with director Steven Spielberg's Survivors of the Shoah



Visual History Foundation, he got to know a large contingent of Holocaust survivors, helping several of them write their own memoirs. He continued teaching memoir classes after he and his wife retired to Winslow, Ark., in 2005.

Culturally, Peter was Jewish, but during the Vietnam War he was active in the peace movement and he joined the Religious Society of Friends in the 1970s, becoming an active Quaker. Peter earned a black belt in Judo while in Brockport, and loved animals, movies, food, classical music and dancing.

He is survived by his wife of 52 years; a daughter, Jennifer Marchant of Murfreesboro, Tenn.; a son, Piers Marchant (Audrey) of Philadelphia; one granddaughter, Ella Marchant; a sister, Madeleine Benenson of London; a sister-in-law, Donna Robertson of Asheville, N.C.; two nephews, a niece, several cousins, many friends; and his dogs, Molly and Jessie.

The family wishes to thank the Fayetteville Friends Meeting whose members were so supportive during Peter's decline.

There will be a memorial service for Peter in December.

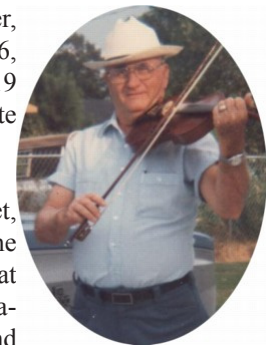

## Message To Those Of You That Have Been Stealing From And Vandalizing My Property

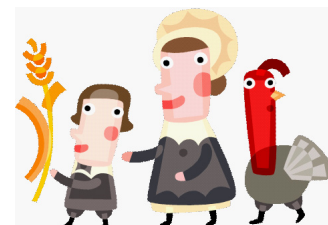
We have been experiencing vandalism, and theft for a while now and I for one am getting really tired of it and it is really upsetting my family.

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# You Can Do What?

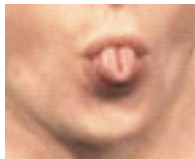

Our brains contain the microchip that controls every function of our bodies. Now, this is not a secret. We learned this from our earliest childhood, but...! The next question is how does it do it. Well, quite frankly, I don't know. I understand much of the simple mechanics, like the nervous system of the body as a network of fibers that carries instructions to every part of the body. This is a very simple aspect of an enormously complex structure that is still a marvel to even the most ardent students of this mass of soft tissue encased in a bony vault.

So, in that I am so bereft of a deep understanding of the complexities of this wonderful system, the brain, I'm not going to discuss the aspect of how it works further. But, there are some very interesting things that are fun to consider.

How does the tongue work? Well, that puts us back to the complex, but I'm going to have you consider a couple of simple tests.

**Test one:** Can you roll your tongue? That's been thought to be a genetic function, but years of testing and studies say it is not. Well, that's not entirely true. There seems to be a genetic connection, but it is a loose one. If you cannot roll your tongue, members of your family most likely cannot either. Try it! It may be possible to learn to do it.



**Test two:** Turn your tongue upside down. Can you do it? That is also a genetic trait that if you cannot do it, the rest of your family likely cannot either. You did? Now flip it the other way. If you can't turn it both ways, check the rest of your family. You're probably not alone.

**Test three:** Put two pills, M&Ms, or two Cheerios in your mouth. With your tongue, push one to the side against your cheek. Chew or swallow the other alone. Simple, Right! Well, think about it. Your brain tells that simple organ in your mouth to separate the two objects, push one to the side and process the other alone. Now, since that was so easy, put that M&M on the other side of your mouth. Hmmm! The first try was pretty much automatic, but the second most likely took some concerted thought.

**Test four:** Put a pacifier upside down in a two month old baby's mouth and it will deftly turn in right side up using only his or her tongue. The tongue is perhaps the only muscle fully developed at birth, rendering it that life sustaining ability to suckle.

How does the tongue work? Don't expect me to answer that, 'cause I don't know. The tongue is a complex set of approximately four "intrinsic" muscles that are a direct part of the tongue. There are as many as six "extrinsic" muscles which attach it to your jaw, the floor of your mouth, and even bones behind your ears. It is controlled by one of the "cranial nerves" that originates at the brain stem at the base of your skull. If that nerve is somehow damaged, the tongue may stop working correctly. If that happens, the sim-

ple, automatic process of swallowing that each of us does several thousand times a day is impaired. It might even cause drooling or hamper one's ability to swallow or even talk.

So, the next time you drink that glass of water or chew up a cookie or watch a baby suck on a pacifier, think about that fantastic organ we take for granted and ask yourself, "did it really just happen by chance?"

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## What Is The "New" Krokodil Drug?

Sept. 30, 2013 -- A deadly, homemade drug known as krokodil may have made its way from Russia to the U.S.

Two people in Arizona are suspected of using the heroin-like drug, which rots the skin from the inside out, says Frank LoVecchio, DO, MPH. He is the co-medical director at the Banner Good Samaritan Poison & Drug Information Center in Phoenix, Ariz.

In the last week, he and his team have consulted with doctors about the patients, but he can't confirm the injections were krokodil because the drugs have not been tested.

LoVecchio says at least two other U.S. cities have unconfirmed reports of krokodil use. It's named for the crocodile-like look it gives users' rotting skin.

So far, there are no confirmed U.S. cases, says Barbara Carreno, a spokeswoman for the Drug Enforcement Administration. "We've been following this drug overseas for several years," she says. "We are very concerned about the possibility of this drug coming to the U.S."

### What Is Krokodil?

Krokodil is a homemade drug. It combines codeine, lighter fluids, gasoline, paint thinner, alcohol, and other ingredients, Carreno and LoVecchio say.

### When And Where Did It Become Popular?

Krokodil was first used in Russia in 2003, according to the Journal of Addictive Diseases. LoVecchio suspects krokodil took off in Russia because it was difficult to smuggle in heroin. Its use spread quickly across the country.

### How Is It Used?

Users inject the drug because it delivers a faster high than in tablet form, LoVecchio says. "If the onset [of effects] was an hour or 2 for pill form, it could be within 5 to 10 minutes if you shoot it IV."

## What Are The Effects And Side Effects?

The drug may be 10 times cheaper than heroin, LoVecchio says. For less money, it is said to give a heroin-like effect of euphoria -- but at a price.

It eats the user from the inside out, he says, rotting the flesh and leaving bone and muscle tissue exposed. The skin takes on a scaly, green appearance, earning its name of krokodil, Russian for "crocodile."

"A common reason for death is the loss of skin," LoVecchio says. He says that users can die of infection and gangrene. The drug also destroys the blood vessels it's injected into, causing blockages.

Regular users in Russia often die within 2 years of starting krokodil, he says.

## How Did It Get To The U.S.?

LoVecchio says drug users here may have heard of it and looked for information on web sites. "Another explanation would be that addiction, whether opiates or alcohol, is a very terrible disease. People get desperate. Taking a pill wouldn't be enough. They might look for ways to make them higher."

## How Are Side Effects Treated?

Medications to reverse effects are one way, LoVecchio says. Wound care, skin grafts, and surgery may be needed if the user survives the injections.



## COFFEE FILTERS

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1. Cover bowls or dishes when cooking in the microwave. Coffee filters make excellent covers.
2. Clean windows, mirrors, and chrome... Coffee filters are lint-free so they'll leave windows sparkling.
3. Protect China by separating your good dishes with a coffee filter between each dish.
4. Filter broken cork from wine. If you break the cork when opening a wine bottle, filter the wine through a coffee filter.
5. Protect a cast-iron skillet. Place a coffee filter in the skillet to absorb moisture and prevent rust.
6. Apply shoe polish. Ball up a lint-free coffee filter.

7. Recycle frying oil. After frying, strain oil through a sieve lined with a coffee filter.
8. Weigh chopped foods. Place chopped ingredients in a coffee filter on a kitchen scale.
9. Hold tacos. Coffee filters make convenient wrappers for messy foods.
10. Stop the soil from leaking out of a plant pot. Line a plant pot with a coffee filter to prevent the soil from going through the drainage holes.
11. Prevent a Popsicle from dripping. Poke one or two holes as needed in a coffee filter.
12. Do you think we used expensive strips to wax eyebrows? Use strips of coffee filters..
13. Put a few in a plate and put your fried bacon, French fries, chicken fingers, etc on them.. It soaks out all the grease.
14. Keep in the bathroom. They make great "razor nick fixers.."
15. As a sewing backing. Use a filter as an easy-to-tear backing for embroidering or appliquéing soft fabrics.
16. Put baking soda into a coffee filter and insert into shoes or a closet to absorb or prevent odors.
17. Use them to strain soup stock and to tie fresh herbs in to put in soups and stews.
- 18 Use a coffee filter to prevent spilling when you add fluids to your car..
19. Use them as a spoon rest while cooking and clean up small counter spills.
20. Can use to hold dry ingredients when baking or when cutting a piece of fruit or veggies. Saves on having extra bowls to wash.
21. Use them to wrap Christmas ornaments for storage.
22. Use them to remove fingernail polish when out of cotton balls.
23. Use them to sprout seeds. Simply dampen the coffee filter, place seeds inside, fold it and place it into a zip-lock plastic bag until they sprout.
24. Use coffee filters as blotting paper for pressed flowers. Place the flowers between two coffee filters and put the coffee filters in phone book.
25. Use as a disposable "snack bowl" for popcorn, chips, etc.
26. Great in the tool room when separating nails and screws then use in to bottom of containers to remove moisture and prevent rust.

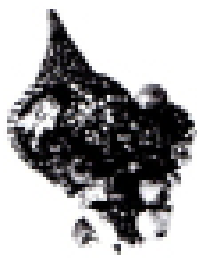
