Broke Dog Custom Boot Shop and Sky-View Lodge are sponsoring monthly community bike rides for the next several months. We have had two successful rides with turnouts of 19 and 16 riders the past two months.

August finds us tackling the north slope of Mt Gayler. This ride will be moderately difficult. We will depart at 6:15 from the parking lot at the baseball fields, head south along US 71, then through Winslow along Main St. and Valley View, and on up the hill along US 71 to the top of Mount Gayler. After a brief rest the group will return to the ballpark north along 71. If there is enough interest for an easier route there will be a second group starting at the same time heading north to the Rest Area and returning along the same route. There will be several experienced riders along to help with any ride related issues and both of these options will have sag support. A helmet and water bottle are strongly suggested for this ride. There will be cold drinks and snacks upon return to the Winslow ball field.

While it is a good idea to always keep your bicycle in tune, if you are planning on riding up the mountain it is very important to have your bike in good mechanical condition before this ride begins. If you don't have the skill to work on your own bicycle there are several good bike shops in Fort Smith and Fayetteville that can help. Next month we will have an easier ride scheduled again.

I agreed to write Lonnie's column for this month, as he is consumed with his book, and since I took a vacation to Colorado with my sister, Charlotte, this seemed an ideal topic as a respite from the area's overbearing heat & humidity.

We began our journey in NE Arkansas, where we were raised, and where most of my family still reside. After a sister's annual community-wide July 4th party, we headed to my little house in the big woods to spend the night. Unfortunately, her clothing remained behind. In an uncharacteristic fit of neatness, I hung her clothing in a closet. We remained blissfully unaware of that fact until our arrival in Muskogee, OK, where we spent a couple of days with our brother in his '20s-era, two-story bungalow.

"That's okay, I honestly don't mind having to hand wash my clothing each night and wear the same thing the next day," Charlotte assured me - the minx!

We went to the Salvation Army the next day, where she replenished her wardrobe with seven or eight tops & an equal number of capris - all for less than \$40.

Somewhat reluctant to leave my brother's home, which was beautifully restored and oozing vintage charm, yet eager to head to cooler climes, we set out for Colorado. Wanting to see some real America, we eventually exited I-40 & meandered through some rural towns, even hitting a thrift store or two, with the aid of Garmin & Tom-Tom GPS devices.

Scenery became evermore rugged as we entered the scrubby Texas panhandle. Pump jacks appeared in the twilight like giant prehistoric birds methodically pecking at the parched earth. This, however, was not an unfamiliar sight, having spent many years in Texas.

Still, as we made our way west, taking that vaunted less traveled road, our eyes vaguely made out, before total darkness, great scooped valley bowls, intersected with nature-made mazes. So eerie, so foreign to a couple of hillbilly gals. We loved it!

Weary, and, most of all scared to miss out on beautiful scenery by traveling at night, we stopped at a motel on the other side of the Raton Pass between Colorado and New Mexico. Then, changing course after consulting tourist brochures, we headed to Colorado Springs the next morning. We were enchanted by the snow-covered peaks, as doubtless millions of tourists before us. We also hoped that no one who lived there ever took it for granted.

Prior to this trip, I stressed, thanks to Facebook friends, the need to bring warm clothing. Charlotte demurred, saying she was always hot. Being my usual bossy self, I insisted. Being her usual bossy self, she resisted. So we ended up taking a cog train to the summit of Pike's Peak, (almost 15,000 ft.) where it had snowed four inches at noon, and both of us waded through slushy snow in sandals! So much for bossy preparedness! I did, however, wear sweat pants and a hoodie, and defrosted my frozen tootsies by wrapping them in the hoodie on the return trip.

It was an awesome experience. Departing, shortly before sunset, we gazed down (yes, down) upon a rainbow striking a delicate pose in the clouds. Reticent, it barely registered on my camera.

The beauty of aspens - their almost ethereal trunks, the flowers, few, yet ferociously clinging to life, the tundra, where grass grows 2 to 3 inches every 100 years - all left an upward notch in our spirits.

Also in Colorado Springs, we visited Garden of the Gods. It's doubtful I'd ever be able to visit every trail if I lived to be 100! The towering red rocks brought out the kid in this 50-year-old. I scabbled up rocks, grabbing at rock points and shrubbery, determined to make it up to the next level - and, make no mistake, there was always a next level! Despite a life-long fear of heights, I could not resist striving for that next level...at least until I looked over the edge!

We next ventured over Wolf Creek Pass, which scared the heck out of me, and arrived at the cabin in SW Colorado. Or at least I expected a cabin. It was actually quite spacious: Two bedroom, two bath, towering ceiling with gigantic pine tree acting as wood beam and wrap-around deck. Daytime temperatures hovered between the upper 70's & low 80's, with very low humidity and deliciously cool nights.

We then had a variety of adventures, including a trip to the four corners (Colorado, New Mexico, Utah & Nevada) and a trip to Mesa Verde

National Park, which is also an international park that sheds light on how cliff dwellers lived. Perhaps these experiences can be utilized for a future column.

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
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Attention Pee Wee Football Enthusiasts! Greenland Football Camp

Past, Present, & Future: Income Tax

As I'm sure you're all aware, there is no holiday in August, unless of course you're Canadian; so I had to look long and hard to find an interesting subject to delve into for this month's column. I found many worthy moments that took place during the usually scorching month of August; one I found interesting is that the first Federal Income Tax was levied on August 5th, 1861. Many people already know how many taxes came about, the government needed funding for war, taxes were created, the war ended, taxes were abolished. That's putting it simply, but it's a pretty accurate account of many of our taxes. The Civil War led to Congress passing the Revenue Act of 1861, thus imposing taxes on personal income for the first time. This personal income tax was a 3% tax on all income higher than \$800 a year (that's \$20,100 a year in today's money). However, no taxes were collected until the following year. In 1862, the Union's debt was growing by \$2 million per day and it was clear that the Federal government was going to need even more money, so Congress passed an additional tax law in July of 1862. This law created a two-tier tax rate structure where incomes up to \$10K (or \$251K today) were taxed at 3%, and higher incomes at 5%, but various deductions were introduced as well. Then the war was over, the need for revenue decreased rapidly, and many taxes were once again repealed; income taxes being abolished in 1872. In 1894 a new flat rate Federal income tax was enacted, but in 1895 it was ruled unconstitutional and removed. Eventually the income tax debate pitted southern and western congressmen against the industrial northeast; this debate resulted in an agreement for an excise tax to be imposed on business income, as well as a constitutional amendment allowing the Federal government to impose taxes on individual's income. Thirty-six states ratified the 16th Amendment by 1913; in October of that year, Congress passed a new income tax law with rates ranging from 1%-7%, the latter being for those who made more than \$500,000 (\$11million in today's dollars). Form 1040 was also introduced, and in spite of many changes over the years, it remains in use today. Prior to income taxes, most people were able to earn their wages with little or no interaction with government offices. With the implementation of income tax reporting, the government was given the right to know all aspects of a person's economic affairs. World War I brought about a doubling of the income tax rates, and this scenario repeated itself for the next 80 years or so, with the highest tax rates reaching well over 70%, depending on which tax bracket you found yourself in.

Currently, taxes are considered high to many Americans; with the minimum tax bracket for 2010 being 10% for incomes up to \$16,750 for couples and \$8,375 for single filers. The highest current tax rate is 35% for all incomes over \$373,650. Considering that taxes originally ranged from 1% to 7%, this is a huge increase and hard for some of us to swallow. The economy is still suffering, many people are without jobs, and things don't seem to be getting better, in spite of what you might see on the nightly news. I don't think anyone likes paying income taxes, most people probably look at it like, "This is my money that I worked for". Am I right? Is this what you think?

Unfortunately, it's not likely that the near future will bring about the abolishment of income taxes, in fact, they are likely to only get higher. With the ongoing war, new healthcare initiatives, and the economy tanking as it has been for the last several years, we're not likely to see any reductions any time soon. I don't mean to burst anyone's bubble, I'm simply being realistic and I know that history repeats itself. When the government has needed revenue in the past, they are very quick to increase the tax rates on individuals and create new taxes.



God's Accuracy

God's accuracy may be observed in the hatching of eggs.
For example:

- the eggs of the potato bug hatch in 7 days;

- *those of the barnyard hen in 21 days;
- *the eggs of ducks and geese hatch in 28 days;
- *those of the mallard in 35 days;
