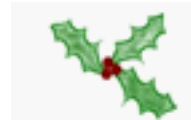

The Winslow City Council and Mayor Jarnagan are deeply appreciative of Water Department employees and the women at City Hall for everything they do for the residents of our wonderful community. We've accomplished a lot of great things this year!

Our Mayor facilitated a citizen committee to complete Phase 1 of our Water System Improvement Plan. Our WWS crew has been diligently finding and repairing leaks. We used American Rescue Plan Act funds to begin replacing old water meters and have applied for grants to help fund more meters, an additional storage tank, and other projects. We had to raise water rates this year to help maintain, improve, and retain control of our water system, but our rates are still competitive with surrounding systems.

In cooperation with the Winslow Community Center Association, the city received a Rural Development Block Grant to install new heaters and doors in the school gym and cafeteria building and give it a fresh paint job.

Last year, we used FEMA funding to repair flood damage to City Hall and to replace the ballpark play area that washed away. This year, we applied for Arkansas Parks Department grant funding to build a paved recreational trail around the ball field.

Council Member Jerry Kidder coordinated yet another fantastic Fourth of July fireworks show. Council Member Dan Dean brought us through the process of having downtown Winslow added to the National Register of Historic Places.

Recorder/Treasurer Ann Malkie, in addition to helping coordinate all the efforts above, has brought back the Winslow Visitors Center program to welcome visitors from near and far and to restart Saturday morning Coffee Klatch gatherings.

Council Member Jim Taylor and his wife moved to New Mexico. We are grateful for Jim's service to our city. David Holcomb was elected to fill Jim's vacant set and appointed to serve out the remainder of Jim's term. The Mayor and all current Council Members were re-elected in November.

All residents are welcome to attend City Council meetings on the third Monday at 6: 00 PM at City Hall.

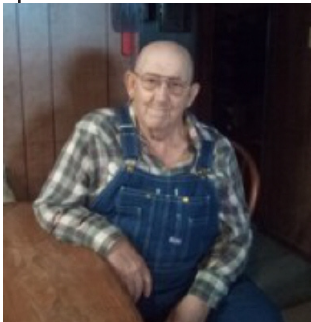
Lucille was a longtime member of Springdale First Assembly Church.

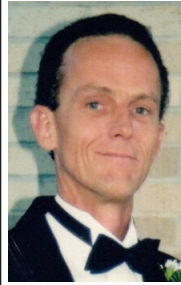

Lu Nell Burnett

February 19, 1933 - November 6, 2022



Lu Nell Burnett, 89 years old and a resident of Fayetteville, AR, died Sunday, November 6, 2022, in Springdale AR. Lu Nell was born February 18, 1933, in Mountainburg, AR to John Quincy Carson Jr. and Mildred Louise (Satterfield) Carson.

Lu Nell's mother died in 1935 when Lu Nell was two years old. In 1941 her dad joined the Navy and served in the Seabees in the Pacific theater through 1945. Johnny died in 1970. Lu Nell and her brother, Tyrol Quincy Carson nicknamed QN and Kit over the years, were raised by their grandfather, John Q. Carson Sr., known to the family as "Pa". Pa died in 1954 and QN passed in 1998.

Lu Nell entered the workforce at 12 years old. She started as kitchen help at the Boston Mountain Lodge near Mount Gaylor between Fayetteville and Fort Smith on Old Highway 71. This was a busy place at the time, with lots of traffic for Camp Chaffee passing through. She began baking pies for the lodge- one of their specialties- and was known for her pies all her life. When she and Pat, her future husband, began dating he would come to the lodge and watch her work- and eat pecans, an ingredient used for many of her pies. She attended school in Mountainburg and played basketball in her high school years. Pat liked to tease her about her shots "rattling the backboards".

On February 2, 1951, Lu Nell was united in marriage to Pat H. Burnett II. They were married 61 years before Pat passed in 2012.

Immediately after their marriage, Pat and Lu Nell moved to Memphis, TN for him to attend a lumber school. They returned to Fayetteville upon completion of his course. In 1954 Pat was drafted into the US Army. They were stationed at Camp Chafee for a short time and then sent to Fort Hood in Texas. In 1956, they came back to Northwest Arkansas and stayed here the rest of their years.

She is survived by her three children: Patty and husband James Sanders of Berryville, AR, Mike Burnett of Springdale, AR, and Debbie and husband Steve Scoggin of Fayetteville, AR. She enjoyed two grandchildren and their spouses: Ty and Lexi Sanders of Elkins, AR, and Jenna and Carl Little of Tulsa, OK. The highlight of her last years was having great-grandchildren, Isabella "Izzie" Hogue of Fayetteville, AR, and Jackson "The Jazz" Sanders of Elkins, AR. Lu Nell is also survived by one sister, Cheryl (Carson) Ford-Bone, and her husband Rocky Bone of Bentonville, AR, along with a nephew, Terry Carson, and niece Pam (Carson) Smith, and many other relatives and friends.

She was a Christian of the Baptist denomination serving faithfully by teaching Sunday School classes and working in the summer Vacation Bible Schools. Lu Nell served as a room mother at

school for her children throughout the years, as well as a volunteer Brownie and Girl Scout troop leader and a Cub Scout den mother. Loyal and devoted fans of the Arkansas Razorbacks, she and Pat purchased season tickets for football, basketball, and baseball games through the years.

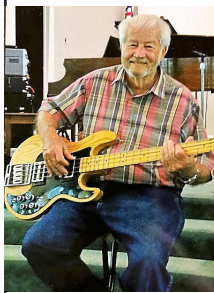
Her family was her life, and she taught us well to love and be loved. She is already missed dearly.

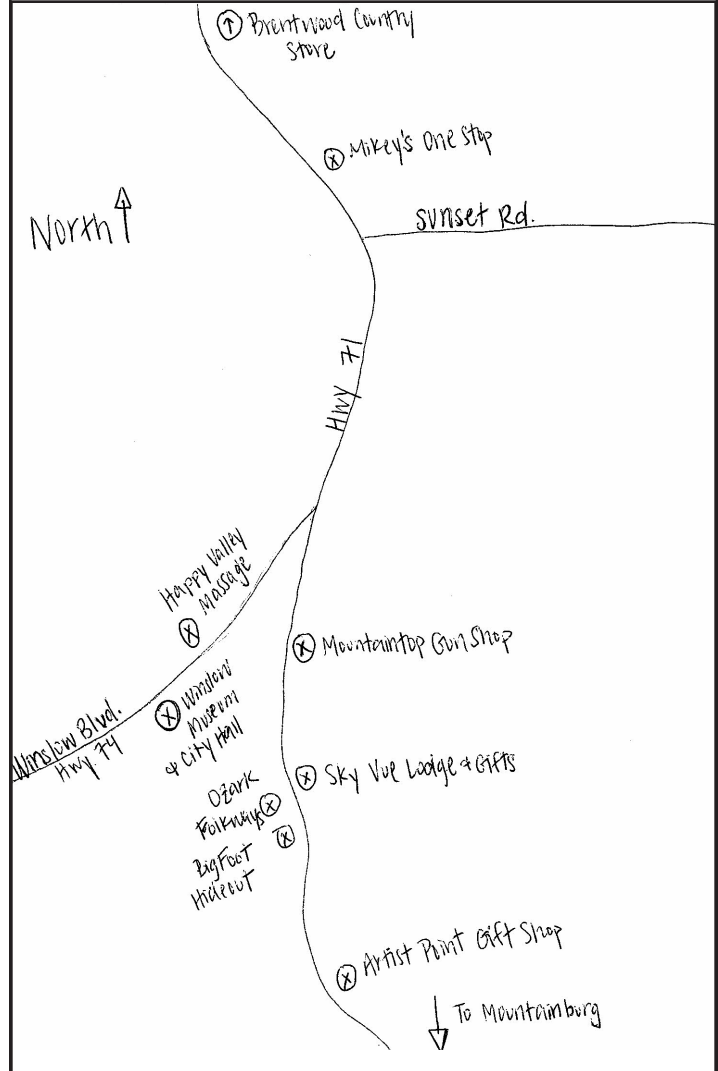
Winslow Graduate Receives PHD

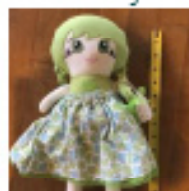

Resolution No. 23022-006

Resolution for Setting Water System Rates - 2023

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ADOPTION OF THE WATER SYSTEM RATES FOR THE CITY OF WINSLOW, ARKANSAS, BEGINNING JANUARY 1, 2023.

WHEREAS, the City of Winslow, Arkansas must maintain sufficient revenues to provide a safe public water system; it is necessary for the City to establish monthly rates to be charged for the water services provided so that a safe water system may be maintained.

WATER RATES beginning January 1, 2023

Adopted via Resolution 2022-006 on October 17, 2022.

\$32.25 minimum of first 1,000 gallons
\$ 7.30 per 1,000 gallons of the next 4,000 gallons
\$12.00 per 1,000 gallons 4,001-35,000 gallons
\$16.00 per 1,000 gallons 35,001-39,999 gallons*
\$30.00 per 1,000 gallons for non-metered customers
*Leak: \$420.00 for the first 40,000 gallons plus
\$6.50 for every 1,000 over the 40,001.

Washington Co.	1.25%
Crawford Co.	1.25%
Winslow	2.00%

METER / SECURITY and HOOK-UP CONNECTIONS

Within Winslow city limits: \$1,200.00**

Outside Winslow city limits: \$2,200.00**

***Includes the new meter deposit (see Meter Deposits below), transfer fees if any, connection fee, paying for standard labor related costs. The customer will be responsible for any charges for materials and supplies that may occur beyond the standard meter hook-up item, and connection fees.*

METER DEPOSITS:

\$150.00 Property/Homeowners

\$250.00 Renters (as of January 1, 2023, if someone other than the property owner is residing in the home and is paying the property owner to live on the property, the \$250.00 deposit must be paid by either the property owner or renter prior to the water being turned on. Otherwise, the property stays in the owner's name. The property owner is responsible for any unpaid balances or damages to Water Department property.

The City of Winslow is an equal opportunity provider and employer.

OTHER FEES:

\$20.00 Turn on or Transfer Fees

\$20.00 Non-Payments turn back on

METER USAGE FEE:

\$2.00 per month added to water bill of each household or business.

LATE FEES:

\$10.00 – all payments past mailed or received after the 20th of each month will be assessed a \$10.00 late fee.

Dead Cat in the Well

Louis and Velma Duncan bought and started operating the Winslow Motel and Café in October of 1969. We had no clue to the water supply until after they signed the papers. We started cleaning and quickly ran out of water. That is when they were told they would need to have water hauled in.

There was one pool table in the café. On weekends, it was hard to function around everyone waiting for a chance at the pool table. We then decided to add a game room. It was a wise decision since it paid all of our utilities.

Arvil Hughes was on the City Council at that time, but wanted off so he decided Velma needed to take his place. She tried to explain that she knew nothing about the Council. With three kids, a business to run, room mother, Booster Club, PTA, she did not need another headache. He later came in with a petition, had people sign it and the next thing she was on the City Council.

Mozell Hall became a member at the same time. She owned the Market Place on the corner. One day before noon Paul McGuire, who hauled water for everyone sat at the counter drinking coffee while he waited for the tank to drain. He says, "Guess what I found in the school well?" Velma's mind was on prepping for the lunch crowd but she asked him. "What did you find Paul?" He says, "A dead cat". She nearly had heart failure thinking about the kids drinking water with a "dead cat in the well".

Velma hit the next Council meeting determined to solve the problem and after explaining about the "dead cat in the well". The mayor, Amos Watkins explained that a well could be drilled for water at the ballpark, but Winslow did not have the money. Velma's question was, "Where do we get the money"? The mayor said they would have to go to Little Rock and ask for a grant of \$10,000 to drill and hope they hit water.

Velma and Mozell, being the only two women on the council, were selected to travel to Little Rock. Mozell knew how nervous Velma was about having to ask for money without telling about the cat. Winslow received the grant, drilled four wells and with the help of Jack Stockburger managed to get the first water system.

Side note from the editor: "Be thankful for our current water system".

Boston Mountain Fire Association

In the month of November BMFD made 42 runs, this includes medical, rescue and fire.

Station 3 located on Winn Creek Rd is under construction. The main structure is in place. The next step is the electric and plumbing. They hope to have it operational soon.

The Department recently received an \$80,000 generator from the US Forest

Service. This will be on loan for one year and will then become the property of the BMFA.

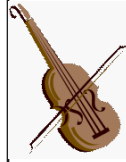

7 Signs of Jesus Soon Return

Harry R. Truman died on May 18 1980 because he dismissed the ominous warning signs of Mt. St. Helens eruption.

Lest we make the same mistake as Harry R. Truman, the Lord has gifted us with His prophetic Word. In the last days of the Savior’s life on earth, His disciples asked, “What will be the sign of Your coming?” (Matthew 24:3). Jesus then proceeded to list those signs that would herald His return at “the end of the age.”

From this verse and others, we see that the Bible equates the Second Coming with the end of the world. Furthermore, “When the Son of man shall come in his glory, and all the holy angels with him, then shall he sit upon the throne of his glory: And before him shall be gathered all nations: and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth [his] sheep from the goats: Mathew 25:31,32 (vv33-46) describes the final judgment. The return of Christ is the most significant day of all mankind because it reveals the ultimate destiny of every person, unveiling who will receive eternal life and who will receive eternal death.

And God reveals particular signs that lead up to that day because He wants us to be prepared for that great event. You are most likely familiar with the signs of “wars and rumors of war” (24:6), “famines, pestilences, and earthquakes in various places” (V 7), all of which we’ve seen ramping up not only in our lifetime but, with even greater severity, in the last couple of years, Christ identified these as the beginning of sorrows” (v 8). But scripture also mentions several more signs that we’re about to examine.
