Carolyn Huenergardt passed away September 9, 2016. She was born January 2, 1964 to Robert and Bonnie Osbourne.


She was preceded in death by her parents and a sister, Tisa Osbourne.

Winslow Embraces Healthy Forests for Array of Benefits

Beaver Watershed Alliance (BWA) was recently awarded an Urban & Community Forestry Assistance Grant made possible by the Arkansas Forestry Commission's Urban Forestry Program and the U. S. Forest Service to foster stewardship of Northwest Arkansas' urban forests and to enhance the character, economic viability, and environmental resilience of the region's communities.

Winslow has embraced the importance of forested lands for their multiple benefits to the community, our environment, and regional drinking water supply. The city of Winslow is working to achieve Tree City USA status to celebrate and support healthy forests and resilient communities. One such measure to achieve this status is to proclaim Arbor Day, and plant a tree. Mayor Randy Jarnagan has proclaimed August 24th as Arbor Day and Winslow and will conduct a tree planting at 4:30 p.m. at Slicker Park, which is located on Highway 71 South in the beautiful town of Winslow.

Forested land in the Beaver Lake Watershed currently accounts for 71% of the land cover, but is anticipated to decline by 10% over the next 35 years as it is replaced by urban areas to accommodate the region's growing population. Working with communities and landowners now to promote benefits of

forestry will assist thoughtful growth and retention of forested land in the future. Healthy forests benefit long term water quality of surface water drinking supplies, increase the health and economic vitality of communities, and provide habitat for wildlife as well as many other ecosystem services.

Jennifer Ogle, Program Coordinator for BWA, stated, "One of the best forestry practices for communities and private landowners is to learn more about the benefits offered by healthy forests and management considerations involved with achieving their goals."

The Beaver Watershed Alliance is formed of a diverse stakeholder group representing agricultural, recreation, conservation, water utility, business, and private landowner perspectives who all work together for the benefit of Beaver Lake and its watershed.
